Sign Replacement Costs Citizens



Bond Issue Hearings Set

Two public hearings will be held next month on a proposed 1981 bond issue. The hearings will be part of the regular Town Council meetings on April 6 and 20.

Among the items proposed by the Town Manager for funding are several public works projects. Much of the Town's water and sewer system is more than 30 years old and will probably require replacement before long. Additional water storage facilities and a number of storm drainage improvements are also needed.

Replacement or major upgrading of the Police Department's communications system is another project that could be funded by a bond sale.

Interested citizens are encouraged to attend the public hearings in April and comment on these proposed uses for bond funds as well as the effect a bond issue would have on the Town's tax rate and water and sewer charges.

The March 2 Town Council meeting will begin at 9 p.m. so that Council members may attend the Virginia reception for the National League of Cities Legislative Conference in Washington, D.C.

Voter Registration Deadline

April 4 is the last day to register to vote in the Town election on May 5. You are eligible to vote if you are a citizen of the United States, at least 18 years old and a town resident.

Voter registration is conducted at the General Registrar's office, 4031 University Drive in Fairfax, Monday through Friday from 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. and at Fairfax County libraries each Wednesday from 7 tp 9 p.m. Registration will also be held at the libraries on Saturday, March 28, from : to 5 p.m. and Saturday, April 4, from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m.

Comment from the Council Table:

Too Many Traffic Signs?

Stop signs in Vienna are at the point of being ridiculous. They are now facing sustained and intense opposition. Most of our four-way stops are illegal because they meet no criteria as required. They are there to slow traffic. That is not their purpose and it is in violation of the State Code. What is worse is some Councilmen confess to the fact that the signs are there only to slow traffic. By request Council felt forced to do something.

A perfect example is the most recent request to remove the stop signs at the Lawyers/Upham intersection. It was said that if those signs are removed, there would be no break in the traffic to let cars out of other streets up the way (toward Maple Avenue). What really happens with a four- or three-way stop sign on a busy road like Lawyers is that traffic starts to back up coming into Vienna in the morning to such a degree that a car is

released every two seconds from the stop sign (like the starting line at a race track) heading for the next stop sign, and so on. Now try to break into a line of traffic like that, especially when everyone is aggravated. In the evening it is just reversed; traffic is stopped at the starting line (stop sign) and backed up into Vienna, which makes it impossible to get out of the side streets. Again the situation is - - no criteria, just a bottleneck.

Another case at hand - - the three-way stop at Locust Street and Court-house Road. Now this is one of the most ideal intersections for visibility you have. The traffic flow is smooth and has never been a problem. The criteria in this case was an accident involving an auto going 80 mph and hitting a pole, killing the driver. I don't think a stop sign, a chain link

fence or a red light would have slowed anyone going 80 mph in that case. The town is full of bottlenecks of this type.

How about this one . . . a four-way stop sign, "no turn" signs and a powerful mercury vapor street light all at one intersection. But that's not all - - there is also a police officer there. Why the police officer you ask? Well, he's there to wave traffic through the four-way stop sign! But let me warn you, don't say anything to the police officer; he doesn't like it any more than you do; he is only following orders. If you've never seen a street circus like this before, go to Follin Lane and Echols around 4 p.m. any weekday. One person even wrote to one of the Washington papers asking for help in this area because she can't make the turn to go home. This situation should not be called a bottleneck; let's just call it ridiculous.

I know I'll get calls telling me of many more situations that have a similar story, but I'll get just as many calls from special interest groups squarely at odds, saying that stop signs are needed in their neighborhoods to slow

down the speeders. Again I tell you that is not the answer to speeding. Mr. Dave Gehr, Regional Transportation Engineer, Virginia Department of Highways and Transportation, said, "Four-way stop signs and speed bumps do not slow people down. As a matter of fact, most people drive faster over speed bumps." He was quoting a study. Last year just before election, the people told the Councilmen that they were very irritated with traffic and stop signs in Vienna. It is election time again so I remind you to let them know how you feel, for it left its mark last year.

If you want to see how bad the problem really is, come down to the Council Chambers and see the map showing where all the stop signs are. As a matter of fact, it looks like a map with a bad case of the measles, there are so many red dots on it. I could think of no better reason for forming a citizenry group to insist that Council take inventory of all the stop signs in Vienna and remove all that do not meet the criteria for their existence and start complying with the State Code relative to traffic signs. There comes a time when we get too accustomed to too many stop signs and we just cruise through them. You know what I mean -- we just almost stop.

Many articles have been printed on the fuel wasted at stop signs and Council has received copies of these articles. I honestly believe Council will take no action unless you, the people, let us know how you feel.

My own feelings on this subject are that we should understand that the streets in Vienna are public roads to be used by all of us. I would urge you to give a little more thought to the problem before asking Council to erect any more traffic control signs. Many times Council has to bend the rules in order to comply with your requests. Perhaps a little more thought should be given toward others who also have a right to use the road that runs in front of your home. In trying to hold down the speeding, we are bottlenecking our friends and neighbors as well. Let's work together for harmony for all. We need our open roads.

Park with the Flow of Traffic

Citizens are reminded that vehicles should always be parked heading in the same direction as the normal flow of traffic.

Parking against the traffic flow is prohibited by Town ordinance. A vehicle pulling out from such a position is hazardous both to pedestrians and to other vehicles.

Town police will issue warnings to offenders and summons to those who continue to park against the direction of traffic flow.
