\$2 Million Bond Issue Proposed

The Town Council will hold public hearings April 6 and 20 to consider issuing \$2 million in general obligation bonds. The hearings will be part of the regular Town Council meetings, which begin at 8 p.m. in Town Hall.

Funds from the sale of the bonds would be used for the following purposes:

Police telecommunications facility	\$300,000
Water storage facilities	664,500
Sewer system improvements	270,000
Storm drainage improvements	280,000
Salt storage facility	65,000
Traffic lights	70,000
Contingencies	350,500

A complete list of proposed projects is available in the Town Clerk's office at Town Hall. At the public hearings, citizens may comment on these projects and any other substantial community projects they feel are needed.

For a 15-year issue, town property tax rates could be increased by 3¢ per \$100 assessed valuation. Such an increase would add \$22.50 to the tax on a \$75,000 home, \$25.50 to an \$85,000 home, \$27 to a \$90,000 home, \$30 to a \$100,000 home and \$37.50 to a \$125,000 home.

Sewer rates could increase in line with Fairfax County rates in order to cover the cost of the debt service associated with the proposed improvements in water and sewer operations.

Everyone who brings back a filled bag will receive a frisbee bearing the beautification slogan, "I Keep Vienna Clean & Green," refreshments and a chance to win prizes donated by Vienna merchants.



Cleanup Begins March 30

The Town's annual Spring Cleanup will begin on Monday, March 30. During the cleanup, Department of Public Works crews will pick up free of charge any discards left at the curbside, including building materials, furniture, scrap metal, household appliances, tree limbs, brush and other debris.

The cleanup will start in southeast Vienna and move clockwise through the southwest, northwest and northeast. The time needed to cover each section is hard to determine; therefore, all residents should have their discards at the curbside as soon as possible.

Because cleanup crews comprise the same personnel who perform street maintenance and other necessary public works duties, there is time for only one cleanup sweep of the town. Once a section has been covered, crews cannot double back.

Debris should be piled at the curbside, away from fire hydrants and water meters. Brush and branches should be placed in a separate pile to help the cleanup go faster.

The Committee for Helping Others (CHO) assists needy families in the Vienna area and always needs clothing, furniture, kitchen equipment, tableware and appliances in good operating condition. Residents are encouraged to call CHO rather than discard such items during the Spring Cleanup. Call Earl Sawyer (573-6198) or Walker Smith (560-1980) and they will pick up your donation promptly. Contributions to CHO are tax deductible.

Celebrate "Moorefield Day"

"Moorefield Day," sponsored by Historic Vienna, Inc. and the Town of Vienna, will be held on Saturday, May 2, from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m.

The purpose of Moorefield Day is to acquaint citizens with the historic significance of the Moorefield house and to encourage support for efforts to restore the house.

All Vienna residents are invited to visit Moorefield on May 2. The house is located just off Nutley Road in the Townes of Moorefield subdivision. Look for the directional signs at the entrance to the subdivision at Nutley and Tapawingo Roads, S.W. Visitors may want to consider using the Jitney-bus to get to and from Moorefield.

A ceremony to open Moorefield Day will be held at 10 a.m. The day's activities will feature displays and information about Moorefield, the oldest house still standing in Vienna, and about Jeremiah Moore, historic fighter for religious freedom in Virginia who built Moorefield around 1790.

Although the house is usually boarded up to protect it against vandalism, on Moorefield Day some of the boards will be removed so that visitors can take a peek inside at some of the original interior features.

Other activities planned for Moorefield Day include musical entertainment, craft demonstrations and a skit depicting scenes from Jeremiah Moore's life. Members of Historic Vienna will be selling refreshments and souvenirs to help raise money for the Moorefield Restoration Fund. Contributions from individuals and community organizations will be welcomed.

Three Seek Reelection May 5

Vienna voters will elect three Town Council members in the Town's annual general election on Tuesday, May 5. Polls will be open from 6 a.m. to 7 p.m. at the Community Center. Voters arriving at the polls after 7 p.m. are prohibited by law from voting; however, those already in line at that time will be allowed to vote.


Councilmen Ray Hicks, Don Upchurch and Doug Brook are all seeking reelection this year. Town elections are nonpartisan. Winners are determined by popular vote and will serve two-year terms beginning July 1.

Raymond E. Hicks has been a Town Councilman since 1973. He previously served on the Transportation Safety Commission, Planning Commission and Board of Zoning Appeals. He is currently a member of the Town's Police Pension Advisory Board. Councilman Hicks has been with Rockwell International for over 30 years and has lived in Vienna for 18 years.

Donald E. Upchurch, a retired Air Force officer, is a 20-year resident of Vienna. Before being elected to Council in 1975, he served as chairman of the Town's Economic Policy Advisory Commission and as president of the Madison Park Civic Association. Councilman Upchurch is currently the Town's representative to the Northern Virginia Planning District Commission.

Douglas A. Brook was first elected to Council in 1979. During this first term, he chaired a committee to study cable television for Vienna. He is currently mayor pro tem. Councilman Brook has lived in Vienna since 1977 and is vice president with Libbey-Owens-Ford Company.



Results of Town Council's January 19, 1981, Meeting

- * Approved the installation of a street light between 204 Mashie Drive and 804 Hine Street, S.E.
- * Denied the request for a site plan modification at 223 Tapawingo Road, S.E., to permit stacked parking. Reduced the parking requirement from 25 to 23 spaces.
- * Approved Town participation in the county-wide 911 emergency number, although use of the 938-4900 number for police calls will continue to be emphasized. The Town does not expect to incur any direct costs of implementing 911 now or when the Enhanced system becomes available. The Council also indicated that it does not support placing any additional fee on customers' phone bills to support the system.
- * Accepted the off-site improvements of the Havenner Subdivision into the Town's maintenance system.
- * Expressed no objection to County rezoning application 79-P-143, subject to the applicant's acceptance of proffers recommended by the County staff and County Planning Commission.

Free health tests for persons 18 and older will include blood pressure, anemia, vision, hearing, glaucoma and oral cancer. There will also be an optional blood test available for a charge of \$8.50. A four-hour fast is required for blood work. You may eat breakfast between 8 and 9 a.m. and then come for blood work between 2 and 3 p.m. Results of all tests will be mailed to you and your doctor if you so request.

News from Vienna Fire Dept.

Recently, a Vienna resident severely injured his hand in the middle of the night and headed for the hospital in his own car. Enroute he became worried and stopped at the Vienna Fire Station for help, but he was unable to rouse any of the sleeping crew. Fortunately, he was able to get to the hospital on his own without any difficulty.

Such incidents can be prevented by remembering a few points. If you need emergency medical or fire assistance any time, call for help from the nearest phone by dialing 691-2233. This number connects you with the Fairfax County Emergency Operations Center, which will dispatch fire and rescue assistance by radio.

If you come to the fire station in the middle of the night, use the red phone outside the big doors in front. A red light shows the location. Simply open the box and you will be connected with the Emergency Operations Center. Tell the dispatcher you need help and he will sound the alarm to rouse the crew inside. You may also use the doorbell at the side entrance on Cherry Street. This will work well in the early evening hours, but it may not rouse the crew in the middle of the night.

The Vienna Volunteer Fire Department thanks the citizens of Vienna for their continuing support. The response to VVFD's annual fund drive has been very good.
