Light Opera's "Student Prince"



Rabies Clinic at Fire Station

Rabies inoculation clinics for dogs and cats will be held on Sunday, May 17, from 2 to 4 p.m. at fire stations throughout Fairfax County, including the Vienna Volunteer Fire Department at 400 Center St., S. These annual clinics are sponsored by the County Health Department, the Northern Virginia Veterinary Medical Association, and the fire companies and their ladies auxiliaries.

Dogs should be brought to the clinic on a leash, and cats should be confined to a box or basket.

Vaccinations for dogs over a year old cost \$5 and protect against rables for three years. For all cats and for dogs under a year old the cost is \$4 for a vaccination against rables for one year.

Certificates will be given to verify vaccinations. These certificates are necessary in order to obtain dog licenses and should be kept for your records. Town dog licenses will be sold at the clinic in Vienna for \$5.

Town Joins U.S. Flood Program

The Town of Vienna is participating in the National Flood Insurance Program. This federal program enables property owners to buy flood insurance at a reasonable rate.

The Town in now enrolled in the Emergency Phase of the Flood Insurance Program, which provides a limited amount of flood insurance for property owners. In order for property owners to receive the full limits of flood insurance coverage, the Town is required to enter the Regular Program.

As part of the Flood Insurance Program, the Federal Emergency Management Agency prepares a Flood Insurance Study and a Flood Insurance Rate Map to establish the base (100-year) flood elevations for selected areas within the town. These base flood elevations are the basis for the flood plain management measures that the Town is required either to adopt or show evidence of being already in effect in order to remain qualified for participation in the program.

The Town is soliciting comments on the proposed base (100-year) flood elevations from any citizen up to July 9, 1981. The Flood Insurance Study affects the areas along Bear Branch, Piney Branch and Wolftrap Creek. Any owner or lessee of real property in the town who believes his property rights will be adversely affected by the proposed flood elevation may appeal to the Town. The sole basis for such appeals is the possession of knowledge or information indicating that the proposed base flood elevations are scientifically or technically incorrect.
