# **Liberty Amendments Month**

he Town of Vienna's inaugural Liberty Amendments Month celebration kicks off this month with community organizations, businesses, and individuals helping shape the four weeks of festivities taking place from June 19-July 19, 2021. A celebration of the 13<sup>th</sup>, 14<sup>th</sup>, 15<sup>th</sup>, and 19<sup>th</sup> amendments, which extended rights to those who had previously been excluded from full participation, Liberty Amendments Month is the brainchild of Town Manager Mercury Payton, who during this past summer of discourse and strife, sought a way to bring us together and to find common ground. "We all can celebrate these amendments that ensure rights and liberties for each of us," he says.

Liberty Amendments Month will kick off June 19 at First Baptist Church of Vienna's annual Juneteenth Celebration. This year's celebration will include an opening ceremony for Liberty Amendments Month that will offer thoughtful reflection on the liberties assured by these four amendments to the U.S. Constitution. The month-long celebration will culminate with a multicultural festival featuring food, drinks, crafts, and entertainment from around the world on July 17.

#### What are the Liberty Amendments?

The Liberty Amendments are the 13<sup>th</sup>, 14<sup>th</sup>, 15<sup>th</sup>, and 19<sup>th</sup> Constitutional amendments, which abolished slavery, granted citizenship to anyone born or naturalized in the U.S., and extended voting rights to all citizens regardless of race and gender.

The 13<sup>th</sup> (1865), 14<sup>th</sup> (1868), and 15<sup>th</sup> Amendments (1870) were the first amendments made to the U.S. constitution in 60 years. Known collectively as the Civil War Amendments, they were designed to ensure the equality for recently emancipated slaves.

13<sup>th</sup> Amendment – Abolition of Slavery. This amendment explicitly banned slavery and involuntary servitude in the United States. An exception was made for punishment of a crime. This amendment also gave Congress the power to enforce the article through legislation.

14<sup>th</sup> Amendment – Citizenship and Equal Rights. This amendment set out the definitions and rights of citizenship in the United States. The first clause asserted that anyone born or naturalized in the United States is a citizen of the United States and of the state in which they live. It also confirmed the right to due process, life, liberty,

and property. This overturned the Dred Scott v. Sandford (1857) Supreme Court ruling that stated that black people were not eligible for citizenship.

15th Amendment – Voting Rights. This amendment prohibited governments from denying U.S. citizens the right to vote based on race, color, or past servitude. While the amendment provided legal protection for voting rights based on race, there were other means that could be used to block black citizens from voting. These included poll taxes and literacy tests. These methods were employed around the country to undermine the Civil War Amendments and set the stage for the Civil Rights Movement.

19th Amendment – Extended Women's Right to Vote. This amendment declares that the right of citizens of the United States to vote shall not be denied or abridged by the United States or by any State on account of sex. Congress shall have power to enforce this article by appropriate legislation. 2020 marked the 100th Anniversary of this amendment.

In addition, each week between June 19 and July 19, one of the four liberty amendments will be celebrated with contests, entertainment, lectures, performances, classes, themed restaurant specials, art exhibits, films, shows, walks, and more. All events are open to the public and will follow COVID protocols.

Liberty Amendments Day has been recognized as an official 2021 Town holiday and the month long celebration has been officially recognized by the commonwealth of Virginia, having been adopted this year by the General Assembly.

"I'm so proud that the Town of Vienna is leading the way in initiating this holiday and month-long commemoration of these fundamental rights that we all cherish," says Mayor Linda Colbert. "I'm especially proud that Town Manager Mercury Payton came up with the idea and has worked hard to see it become a reality."

## **Incumbent Councilmembers Retain Seats in 2021 Election**

hree Vienna Town Council seats were up for grabs for the 2021 election. Town Council elections are held every year during the first Tuesday of May and councilmembers are at-large representatives that serve two-year terms.

Incumbent councilmembers that will return to Town Council are Nisha Patel, Steve Potter, and Howard Springsteen.







Each voter could cast a vote for three Councilmembers. Unofficial vote totals for Council positions were:

Nisha Patel	1,092
Steve Potter	1,181
Howard Springsteen	1,217
David Patariu	750
Absentee By Mail and In-Person	657

The in-person election day voter total was 1,311, and the unofficial total voter count was 1,968 including both absentee ballots requested (not necessarily returned and counted) and in-person voters, or 16.9% of active registered voters.



# **Update on Maud Robinson Charitable Trust Sidewalk Project**

n 2019, the Town of Vienna received an extremely generous gift from the Maud Ferris Robinson Charitable Trust. The Trust enables the Town to spend over \$10 million to install sidewalks over the course of a five-year period—and expires in the fall of 2024.

#### **Maud Robinson**

Maud Robinson, a longtime fixture in Vienna social and political life, was 96 years old when she passed away on March 11, 2019. She volunteered countless hours for various community organizations, enjoyed the Vienna Garden Club immensely and served on the Town Council from 2000 through 2009. Her gift demonstrates her longstanding devotion to the Town of Vienna and recognition of the value of

with new sidewalks that create a safer, more pedestrian accessible community. Sidewalks promote good health and pedestrian safety, connect individuals and destinations in the community, support Town business and sustainability goals, and enhance the "greater good" of the whole community—today and in the future.

The process of choosing potential sidewalk projects begins with developing and adhering to criteria first established in the Robinson Charitable Trust and additional criteria created by the Town, which include:

- Funding from the Trust should be used for projects not already funded
- Funding from the Trust may be used on sidewalks which would otherwise be extremely delayed or deferred due to budgetary reasons
- Funding from the Trust can only be spent on sidewalks, not other substantial infrastructure (this may exclude projects that do not have curb and gutter)
- Staff gives general priority to streets where there is no sidewalk on either side of a street.

#### **Sidewalk Selection Process**

This effort to use the funds provided by the Trust for sidewalk installation is in conformance with the Town's Comprehensive Plan and Pedestrian Master Plan. It is truly a community effort that includes Town Council, Town staff, members of the Pedestrian Advisory Committee and input from residents. Project locations are determined and prioritized using the Town's sidewalk rating system that considers roadway safety, construction feasibility, vehicular traffic volumes and proximity to high pedestrian uses such as churches, schools, trails, parks, commerce, bus stops and Metro.

These sidewalks are being built in the public right-of-way. Nevertheless, community outreach is also a component of the assessment. The outreach program includes sending letters to residents on streets where a potential project is being considered to solicit initial feedback; and hosting citizen meetings via phone or in person to discuss any concerns, answer questions and receive feedback.

Once a project is authorized by Town Council to begin design work, it takes approximately nine months of preparation to get ready for construction. During both the design process and construction staff is continually accessible to the public to any address concerns. The first four projects will be constructed later this year at Pleasant Street SW (from Maple Avenue to Surveyor's Court SW), Cabin Road SE (from Glyndon Street SE to Branch Road SE), Plum Street SW (from Cottage Street SW to Tapawingo Road SW), and Holmes Drive NW (from Upham Place NW to John Marshall Drive NW).

Next year, the Town hopes to build approximately 6,000 feet of sidewalk. We are grateful for the opportunity that the Maud Ferris Robinson Charitable Trust has provided, and we look forward to making Vienna safer and more pedestrian accessible for us all. # **Canine Cottage Court Took Center Stage on Town Green**

ast month, On Deck with Mercury featured a 3-D scaled version of a cottage court housing development set up on the Town Green. The exhibit cottage houses doubled as dog houses. Each doghouse was sponsored and customized by a Vienna business or organization.

The exhibit allowed residents to see what a cottage housing development may look like. Cottage housing is a type of housing being reviewed right now to possibly be allowed in areas currently zoned for multi-unit residential uses and transitional office/commercial uses. Cottage housing is a grouping of small, single-unit houses clustered around a common open area.

The houses are smaller in scale than a typical single-family house. Because cottage communities are usually condominium ownership, there is no yard upkeep for residents. This makes them appealing to older individuals who want to downsize from a larger, single-family home into a smaller home in the same community, also known as "aging in community."

The community bid on the dog houses in which the proceeds will be used to fund solar lighting at the Town of Vienna Dog Park located at 700 Courthouse Road SW. The exhibition was created by Code Create Vienna, the Town's online engagement platform for the Zoning Code and Subdivision Ordinance Update.

## **Curbside Mailboxes: What is the proper distance from the** curb to install?

Where to Place the Mailbox Here are some helpful guidelines to follow when placing your mailbox:

- Position your mailbox 41" to 45" from the road surface to the bottom of the mailbox or point of mail entry.
- Place your mailbox 6" to 8" back from the curb. If you do not have a raised curb, contact your local postmaster for guidance.
- Put your house or apartment number on the mailbox.
- If your mailbox is on a different street from your house or apartment, put your full street address on the box.

#### Installing the Mailbox Post

The best mailbox supports are stable but bend or fall away if a car hits them. The Federal Highway Administration recommends:

- A 4" x 4" wooden support or a 2" diameter standard steel or aluminum pipe.
- Avoid unvielding and potentially dangerous supports, like heavy metal pipes, concrete posts, and farm equipment (e.g., milk cans filled with concrete).
- Bury your post no more than 24" deep.

# **Proper Fertilization Techniques to Meet State Requirements**

ot in the Spring! Spring fertilizing encourages leaf growth at the expense of root development. It also feeds weed species and can lead to disease and insect problems later in the season. In addition, you will have to mow the lawn more frequently. If you must fertilize in the spring, limit it to a light feeding (half-pound of 10-10-10 per 1000 sq. ft.) after the initial flush of growth has subsided in May. Excess fertilizer negatively impacts water quality in our local streams and the Chesapeake Bay. 🔱
