


HALLOWEEN PARADE

The annual Halloween Parade, sponsored by the Vienna Chamber of Commerce, is scheduled for MONDAY, OCTOBER 31ST, AT 7:30 PM. This year's parade will reverse direction and move along Maple Avenue from Court House Road through to Glyndon. Mayor Martinelli has proclaimed SATURDAY EVENING, OCTOBER 29TH, AS "TRICK OR TREAT NIGHT" in Vienna.

CHRISTMAS DECORATIONS

There will be a significant change in this year's arrangement of Christmas lighting in the downtown area. Because of the limitation on available funds, attention will be focussed on the center of Town, tying into the civic area. Town Hall, the Vienna Elementary School, the Fire Station, and the Community Center will all be decorated. The Third Annual Program ushering in the Christmas Season in Vienna is scheduled for late afternoon on Sunday, December 4th. All of the Christmas lights will be turned on at dusk on that day.

Fellow Citizens of Vienna:

The general election of Tuesday, November 8th, will be one of the most important elections held in Fairfax County in recent years. In addition to the regular general election, a number of referendum proposals have been submitted by the Fairfax County Board of Supervisors. These should all be weighed carefully.

Perhaps the most important of these, the Urban County Executive Form of Government, is discussed briefly in this NEWSLETTER.

Several bond referendums will also be included on the ballot. The bond referendum on library funds is of special importance to Vienna's residents because funds are included for the permanent library branch building for the Vienna community. Recent negotiations have been fruitful in releasing the land at the corner of Center and Maple for the proposed building.

The remainder of this NEWSLETTER is devoted to a number of significant items which we feel will be of interest to the residents of Vienna. Attention is particularly directed to the Fall Cleanup Program scheduled to begin on Monday, October 24th. Every resident is urged to take advantage of this program which is being furnished by your Town government at no additional cost.

FALL LEAF PICKUP SCHEDULE
The Fall Leaf Pickup Program will begin on MONDAY, OCTOBER 31ST IN THE SOUTHWEST CORNER OF TOWN, and will move progressively counter-clockwise around town. (For more detail, see page 3).

FALL CLEANUP WEEK
The Town will initiate a Fall Cleanup Program (in addition to the customary Spring Cleanup), beginning MONDAY, OCTOBER 24TH. Anything, with the exception of the residue from a building project, which you want to discard will be picked up by Town trucks during the week of October 24 through 29. The material must be placed at the curb on either day of your regular weekly garbage pickup. DO NOT DEPOSIT LEAVES--THESE WILL BE PICKED UP LATER.



U R B A N C O U N T Y E X E C U T I V E F O R M

On November 8th the citizens of Fairfax County will be given an opportunity to vote on the adoption of the urban county executive form of County government. The ballot title will read as follows:

"Shall the county adopt the urban county executive form of government and be empowered to assume the debts and acquire the assets of all towns within the county in which the voters determine to dissolve their town charters?

For
 Against"

The principal changes would be as follows:

1. The number of magisterial districts (now 7) may be set between 5 and 11. The arrangement of districts will be based both on population and community of interest. There will be no limitations on geographic area. One supervisor will be elected from each district, with a chairman elected at large. Terms will remain at 4 years. Salaries of members shall not exceed \$10,000 per year.
2. Each magisterial district becomes a sanitary district, except that towns will be excluded from the regulations covering sanitary districts. Present sanitary districts will be recreated by the Board as small districts.
3. Taxing power will be broadened to permit taxing or raising funds by any means not prohibited by law. The levying of a utility tax would be authorized. (Residents of towns levying a utility tax would be exempt from County tax).
4. Members of the School Board would continue to be appointed by the Board of Supervisors with at least one named from each district.
5. The decision as to whether the County should take over all or any part of its road system would be subject to a referendum. (All roads and highways in the County today are a part of the State road system).

CODE REVISIONS

The Council recently amended the provisions of the Business License and the Solicitors and Canvassers sections of the Town Code to exempt certain not-for-profit groups from the provisions of these ordinances. Representatives of organizations who are raising money to be used "solely for charitable, community service, not-for-profit recreational or religious purposes" shall be exempt from the requirements of the ordinances. Exemptions, however, are not automatic. A repre-

sentative of any organization requesting an exemption must submit evidence of the organization's not-for-profit status and a statement of the purpose for which funds are to be raised.

The Council recently adopted an amendment to the Fireworks Code, limiting the sale and the exploding, igniting, or otherwise discharging of fireworks within the Town of Vienna to June 24 through July 4 inclusive. Neither the sale nor the discharging of fireworks shall be permitted at any other time.

L E A F R E M O V A L P R O G R A M

The regular Fall Leaf Pickup Program will begin on Monday, October 31st. The Town will be divided into four sections, with Center Street and Maple Avenue as the boundaries. The pickup program will begin in the southwest corner of town (south of Maple and west of Center) and move progressively counter-clockwise. It is estimated that it will take 3 to 4 days to cover a section. The actual time, however, will be governed by the amount of leaves that have been raked to the curb lines. For this reason, no definite schedule can be developed. We should not, however, be in the northwest corner of town (north of Maple and west of Center) before the second or third week in November.

On streets with curb and gutter, the leaves should be raked to the grass strip just back of the curb. On streets without curb and gutter, the leaves should be raked to the ditch line. Since the vacuum pickup equipment will not handle brush or other debris, nothing except leaves should be raked to the street.

All residents are urged to take advantage of this first pickup period, since we will be allowing a 2- to 3-week interval before the second pickup, which will begin either the last week in November or the first week in December. The announcement of the date for the beginning of the second pickup program will appear in the local papers, or information can be obtained by calling the Public Works Department. In addition to the two pickups being made this fall, a third pickup will be scheduled next spring.

STREET IMPROVEMENTS

THE COURT HOUSE ROAD WIDENING PROJECT, which will extend from Maple Avenue to Glen on the right and to Cherry Street on the left, is scheduled for completion about mid-December. In order to keep public inconvenience to a minimum the contractor is hoping to complete this section by November 15. This project also includes the opening of Locust Street from Court House Road through to Center. If weather permits, this project will be completed this fall also. Should weather be a delaying factor, however, only the crushed stone base material will be placed this fall.

ADDITIONAL STREET IMPROVEMENTS authorized by the Council recently are four new projects which will be let to contract early next spring. These projects are: Nutley Street from Maple Avenue to Malcolm; Kingsley Road from Cottage to Park Street; Court House Road from Plum to Nutley; and Beulah Road from Maple Avenue to the town limits.

MAPLE AVENUE WIDENING--Bids originally received in September for the widening of Maple Avenue from East St. to Tyson's Corner were all rejected by the State Highway Department as being too high. The project has been re-advertised for opening of new bids in late October.
