

All participants will get a souvenir of the event — a Clean & Green football, frisbee or a bag of tulip bulbs. There will also be free hot dogs and Pepsi.



Public Hearing on Stop Signs

Citizens are reminded that the Town Council will hold a public hearing on Monday, June 28, to consider recommendations from the Transportation Safety Commission (TSC) concerning 10 intersections in Vienna controlled by stop signs. The hearing will begin at 8 p.m. in the Council Chamber at Town Hall.

At Council's request, the TSC has studied the traffic volume, number of accidents and sight distance at each of the intersections, as well as the reason the stops were originally installed.

The TSC has recommended the following modifications:

Cottage & Patrick — downgrade the existing 4-way stop to a 2-way stop on Patrick;

Cottage & Elm — downgrade the existing 4-way stop to a 2-way stop on Elm:

East & Ayr Hill — downgrade the existing 3-way stop to a 1-way stop on Ayr Hill;

Kingsley & DeSale — downgrade the existing 3-way stop to a 1-way stop on DeSale;

Yeonas & Ware — downgrade the existing 4-way stop to a 2-way stop on Yeonas.

The TSC recommends retaining the existing stop signs at these intersections: Glyndon & Ayr Hill; Center & Ayr Hill; Kingsley & Ware; Cottage & Oak; and Courthouse & Locust.

Copies of the TSC report to Council are available for inspection in the Town Clerk's office at Town Hall.



FEBRUARY 22, 1982

The Town Council voted, regretfully, to take no action to acquire the Minipark at the corner of Maple Avenue and Center Street. The Town has never owned this property, but has used it rent-free for many years. The property is now reportedly being sold for commercial development at a price of \$360,000, a price the majority of Council feels is too high for the Town to pay for the limited recreational use of the Minipark.

Other Council Action:

* Authorized the Vienna Area Metro Station Citizen Action Team to ask Metro officials for preliminary drawings and costs of covered walkways at the Vienna Station.

No Dumping in Streams

The streambeds throughout the Town of Vienna are public park property. They provide a habitat for a variety of plants, birds and small animals.

Vienna residents are urged not to use the streambeds as a dumping ground for brush, old furniture and other debris. Illegal dumping is not only unsightly, it also upsets the delicate ecological balance in these areas.

The Town simply does not have enough money or manpower to constantly clear the streambeds of refuse. You can help by disposing of trash properly.

MARCH 1, 1982

A bill introduced in the General Assembly by Delegate John Rust dealing with condominium conversion caused concern among Council members. They authorized the Town Manager to testify at public hearings on the bill and convey Council's desire that the bill protect tenants and not diminish the zoning authority of local jurisdictions.

Other Council Action:

* Approved the final plat of Lot 224, Block 4, Onondio, Glyndon Street, S.E., but denied a request to waive curb, gutter and sidewalk requirements.

MARCH 15, 1982

After many drafts and several public hearings, Council adopted an ordinance to restrict parking of certain commercial vehicles in residential zones. The new law applies only to vehicles over 7,500 pounds gross weight. Interested citizens may obtain copies of the ordinance in the Town Clerk's office at Town Hall.

Is Your Sign Legal?

Town ordinance prohibits attaching signs or advertisements to utility poles and trees. This includes real estate signs and notices of yard sales. These types of signs may be placed only on the property where the sale will be held.

Illegally placed signs may be confiscated and stiff fines imposed on anyone convicted of posting them.

1-66 Open to Metrobuses Starting June 21

Seven Fairfax County Metrobus routes, including two serving Vienna, will gain exclusive access to Route I-66 inside of the Beltway beginning June 21. As a result, travel times to Washington, D.C., and the Pentagon will be reduced significantly.

The greatest time savings will be provided by the new 2X route, which replaces the 5X and the Route 123 portion of the existing 2V. Using the Metrorail at Ballston, downtown commuters will reduce their travel time to Farragut Square by up to 23 minutes. Pentagon riders will save nearly 10 minutes on their rush hour trip.

The new routes are shown here. At least two weeks prior to the changes, new schedules will be available from bus operators as well as at the Ballston and Pentagon Metrorail Stations and Vienna Town Hall. Riders may request schedules by mail by calling 637-1261.

For personalized information and trip planning, Metro's Omnibus information center will be at the Pentagon Station from 6:30 to 10 a.m. on June 9 and from 2 to 6:30 p.m. on June 17. The Omnibus will be at the Ballston Station from 6:30 to 10 a.m. on June 7 and 18 and from 2 to 6:30 p.m. on June 11 and 14.



Cyclist Meeting



Rabies Reported in No. Va.

Several cases of rabies have been reported in Fairfax County this year, including two in the Town of Vienna. The possibility of human exposure to rabies is of special concern in Northern Virginia. As more wildlife habitat is destroyed by urban development, wild animals become more concentrated in the natural habitat that remains.

Wild animals are normally shy and avoid contact with humans; therefore, any wild animal that allows itself to be approached may be dangerous. If you or one of your family see an animal acting strangely or are bitten by an animal, call the Town Animal Warden at the Vienna Police Department, 938-4900.

Vaccination of dogs and cats is the single most important measure against transmission of rabies to humans. Contact your veterinarian for information on rabies immunizations. Make sure your pet is protected.
