Vienna pedals to 'medal' as bronze-level, bicycle-friendly community

ienna joins 487 communities across the country in the movement for safer streets and better bicycling for all by receiving the bronze-level Bicycle Friendly Community certification award from the League of American Bicyclists. The award recognizes communities for their commitment to creating transportation and recreational resources that benefit their residents of all ages and abilities while encouraging healthier and more sustainable transportation choices.

"We worked with the community and Town to provide data in our application for the award, which included information on infrastructure, existing programs, and what improvements we want to see for the future," said Beth Eachus, who is the Chair of the Town's Bicycle Advisory Committee (BAC).

More than 850 communities have applied for recognition by the Bicycle Friendly Community program, which provides a roadmap to making biking better for communities of all shapes and sizes. In recent years, the League of American Bicyclists has been looking for new ways to increase bicycling through bike education and encouragement at community events – a bell which the BAC answered in its application to demonstrate how Vienna uniquely meets these goals.

"We have partnered with several local entities to help educate children and even

give them the tools to increase bike transportation and encourage safety." Eachus said. "Along with the Committee for Helping Others (CHO) and James Madison High School, we identified youths in need of a form of local transportation and raised money to purchase and place bikes with students in need."

The Town was previously awarded the bronze-level certification in 2016 and submits its application for renewal every four years. The BAC hopes to both continue and develop bicycle community events and to improve safety through enhanced infrastructure to make Vienna even more bicycle friendly. "Last year the BAC partnered with Supervisor Alcorn and the Hunter Mill District Office, and the Fairfax Alliance for Better Bicycling (FABB) on a very successful multi-communal bike ride, 'Tour de Hunter Mill,'" Eachus said. "We will continue to work with the Town of Vienna and the Town of Herndon for the 'Caboose to Caboose' community rides and help promote local community rides around town."

The BAC also plans to continue its youth bike education by creating smaller, more family-oriented rides geared toward children.





Vienna Little League Baseball – A Winning Tradition

rom the batter's box to the grandstand, the 2021 Vienna Little League season is one for the record books! This year, two teams in different divisions emerged state champions, and the Vienna National "Blue Storm" reached the semi-finals in the 2021 Virginia State Little League Majors All-Star Tournament held at Vienna's Yeonas Park for the first time since 2004.

"It's the best group I've ever been around in seven years of coaching," said Vienna National coach Josh Cilman, who grew up playing baseball in Vienna and who competed on the 1990 Vienna all-star team. "You could just tell how much they loved playing the game together and being around each other."

As Cilman's team of mostly 12-yearolds moves on to the big field in regulation

baseball, it takes along memories of a magical season. It culminated with a post-season hometown parade of 16 district champion teams, the Washington Nationals Racing Presidents, and hundreds of athletes, families and dignitaries, including Governor Ralph Northam, who along with Vienna Mayor Linda Colbert threw out the first pitch in the state tournament. Though Vienna National played with heart, the home team fell just short of the championship and its dream of ultimately playing in the Little League World Series in Williamsport, Pa.

"That's baseball," Cilman said matter-of-factly as he focused on the team's successes. "They put in the time and effort to get where they were, and they learned how to be great teammates and sportsmen."

Among the Blue Storm's greatest fans were members of the two Vienna teams that won state titles. The first-season Vienna Intermediate all-star team of 13-year-olds won its state championship playing on a bigger diamond, and the Vienna American "Big Red Machine" 8-10 age team dominated the state contest in The Richlands winning all six games by the "mercy" rule, which declares any team leading by 10 or more runs after the 4th inning the winner.




"There were a lot of nerve-wracking moments and a lot of proud moments," said Keith Aimone, whose son, Ryne, plays on the team. "For both the players and the parents, it was a lot of fun representing Vienna."

"The kids were just amazing, and I was in awe of what they were doing," said Vienna American coach Chris Leggett, who played Vienna Little League baseball in the 1980s. "In my 20 years of coaching, I've rarely seen a team come together as well as this team did. They worked hard and it paid off, and that's an incredible life lesson for them."

Leggett credits the Town's commitment to baseball for producing multiple championship-level teams. From

the players to the volunteers to the community support, Vienna Little League baseball is a winning tradition that is sure to continue for generations to come.

Public Input Needed for Zoning Proposal

f you felt a little crowded in your own home during the pandemic, you weren't alone. Many homeowners nationwide added rooms and accessory structures to their property over the past 18 months to give teleworking family members more breathing room. Of course, the additions had to be in line with zoning regulations.

This fall, the Vienna Town Council will consider proposals to amend the zoning code lot coverage and front porch encroachment provisions, and the council wants to know what you think about the options. Currently the code states that no more than 25% of a lot shall be covered by a house, accessory structure, driveway and parking areas, sport courts, patios, and terraces. Open decks without a roof are allowed for an additional 5% of the total area of a lot. Elements that are currently exempt from lot coverage include any walkway less than 5 feet wide,

steps, chimneys, cantilevered features, areaways, window wells, and pools.

The Mayor and Town Council will consider three options for lot coverage calculations at a future meeting, and they would like your input to help inform their decision. Under consideration are:

Option 1: Retain the existing lot coverage definition of no more than 25% and deck provision of 5% for a total of up to 30%.

Option 2: Retain the existing lot coverage definition and deck provision and allow an addition of up to 5% for outdoor living space such as single-story covered decks, patios and single-story screened porches that cannot be converted to interior living space for a total of up to 35%.

Option 3: Replace the existing lot coverage definitions with new ones. Building coverage would include but not be limited to the house, garage, sheds, covered porches and covered decks, and would be restricted to a percentage* of the total lot area. Outdoor living/non-buildings coverage would include but not be limited to driveways, uncovered patios, open decks and sports courts, and would be restricted to a percentage* of the total lot area. No more than 30% of the front yard could be covered by outdoor living or driveways and would count toward the total allowable lot coverage.

*These percentages would be determined by the Council at a later date. $\boldsymbol{\heartsuit}$

It's Not Too Late to Plant a Tree

n old saying goes, "The best time to plant a tree was 20 years ago. The second-best time is now." In fact, the best time is in the fall, when the tree has a better chance of establishing itself without stress from summer's hot, dry weather. Tree roots also grow more during the fall than other times of year, says Scott Diffenderfer, urban arborist for the Town of Vienna. Here are a few tree-planting tips to get you started:

- Choose native tree species that have adapted to local conditions. Unlike many non-native species, natives are naturally immune to disease and resistant to pests. Native species can also support local wildlife and native Virginia insects, such as the caterpillars that songbirds feed their babies. To see trees and other shrubs and plants that are well-adapted to Northern Virginia, visit www. plantnovanatives.org/native-trees.
- Be sure to plant the right tree in the right place. Choose a tree whose mature size will fit your chosen location, for example, small trees for small spaces. Avoid planting too close to your house or utility wires to avoid the need for severe pruning later.
- Be sure your chosen tree location is far enough away from your driveway or sidewalk, so tree roots won't lift them over time.

• Consider planting bare-root seedlings. They are the cheapest and easiest way to plant a tree, and Diffenderfer says in three-years' time, bare-root seedlings will be much bigger and healthier than those that are containerized.

Stop by the farmers market on Saturday, Oct. 23 for a chance to pick up a free tree. 
Town Council Considers Options for American Rescue Plan Act Funds

fter holding a public hearing on Aug. 30, the Vienna Town Council will soon begin considering how to spend the first installment of \$17.1 million in American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) funds. Because the federal funds are in excess of 1% of the Town budget, the public hearing to amend the budget was required by State Code.

ARPA was passed by the U.S. Congress in March 2021 to provide additional pandemicrelated relief to state and local governments. The Town of Vienna received \$8.5 million on June 30, 2021 and will receive the balance in 2022.

Funds distributed through ARPA can only be spent for specific purposes:

- Respond to the public health emergency or its negative, economic impacts
- Provide premium pay to essential workers or grants to employers of essential workers by providing premium pay to eligible workers
- Provide government services to the extent of any revenue reduction resulting from the pandemic



• Make necessary capital investments in water, sewer, and/or broadband infrastructure.


Most ARPA funds must be spent by December 31, 2024. ARPA-funded infrastructure project must be committed by 2024 and completed by December 31, 2026. Due to the longer time frame, the Town Council can be deliberate in addressing vital needs first and planning for additional needs. The Vienna Town Council will begin discussing potential ARPA fund options in a Sept. 20 conference session at 7:30 p.m. at the Town Hall. The meeting is open to the public. Although there will be no public comment at this meeting, residents are invited to submit ARPA fund suggestions via email to Town Clerk Melanie Clark, mclark@viennava.gov or by calling the Town Clerk's Office at 703-255-6304 prior to the meeting.

COVID-19 Relief Funds Available for Eligible Residents

re you struggling to make ends meet due to the COVID-19 pandemic? If so, you may be eligible to receive federal grant funding through the Town of Vienna to pay for your water and sewer bills.

Residents who are 30 or more days behind on their water and sewer bill payments and who have experienced pandemic-related financial hardship are eligible to receive relief funds through the COVID-19 Municipal Utility Relief Program. Examples of pandemic-related hardships include a loss of job, a reduction in work hours or having to quit a job to stay home and care for children. There are no income limits or requirements.

Relief funds are still available, and residents are encouraged to apply by Oct. 1, 2021. How to Maneuver Vienna's Form of Government

ne of the most rewarding parts of being a council member is listening to citizens' concerns and providing assistance wherever possible. It's not uncommon to be out walking, shopping, or dining and being approached by citizens who are looking for guidance mostly in two general areas: (1) how to maneuver through bureaucratic red tape or (2) how to effectively communicate their thoughts on better ways to run the town. The common thread in these conversations is that a large majority of the people are unaware of Vienna's form of government, how it works, or why. I'd like to take this opportunity to shed some light on this.

There are two forms of municipal government in Virginia: Council-Manager and Mayor-Manager. Vienna operates under the Council-Manager form, which is similar in style to a corporation where the stockholders (voters) elect a board of directors (Council) which then hires a president (Town Manager) to run the company (Vienna). By law, the Council-Manager format requires the Council to make policy on the legislative side of government while the Town Manager leads his staff to implement those policies on the administrative side of government.

The use of "side" suggests opposition, but nothing could be further from the truth. The Mayor, Council, and Town Manager work closely together in furtherance of a common purpose to ensure Vienna remains fiscally strong and well-prepared for the future.

Strict adherence to legally prescribed roles and responsibilities is necessary to maintain organizational balance and effectiveness. Knowing who is responsible for the topic you wish to address is key to success.

Here are some helpful hints on how to get things done and/or how to communicate concerns most effectively:

For routine non-emergency issues:

- Call the Town Hall front desk at 703-255-6300 and ask to be connected with the department responsible for the issue(s) you wish to be addressed; or
- Submit a service request by going to go the "Engagement Central" section of the Town website and click on "Make a Service Request". Your request will be time-stamped and responded to as quickly as possible.

For more serious issues requiring discussion:



- Contact the appropriate department head by going to the "Your Government" section of the Town website and clicking on "Town Departments at Your Service". This will give you access to each department's list of services along with department head contact information and any necessary forms;
- If in any of your written correspondence you feel it is important to make the Town Manager, Mayor and Council aware of your concerns, please Cc. them. This will make them aware of your concerns and help with oversight if needed.

And lastly, always remember that the Mayor and Town Council are here to serve. Don't be shy in seeking our help if or when needed. \checkmark
