## Town Manager Receives State Honor for Liberty Amendments Month

ach year, the Virginia Municipal League (VML) Innovation Awards recognize
communities for excellence in local government. This year at its conference in
Leesburg, Oct. 3, VML will recognize Vienna Town Manager Mercury Payton as its inaugural recipient of a new award, Local Champion, for initiating Liberty Amendments Month.

> "Wow! Town Manager Payton really hit a home run with this idea," said the award judges in their written remarks after viewing the nomination video. "This is an excellent example of a community leader recognizing a need, finding a fantastic solution, and then giving 110% to make it happen. A big success for Vienna and for all Virginians!" In the wake of the racial strife that plagued the

nation in the summer of 2020, Payton wanted to bring the Town together to foster mutual respect and understanding, and to celebrate the Constitutional Amendments that give all citizens a say in how they are governed, regardless of their culture or station in life. The idea caught on, and organizations throughout the community organized their own Liberty Amendments Month activities. By the end of the month-long observance from Juneteenth to July 19, 2021, more

## Afghan Crisis is Personal for Vienna Family

s American descendants of refugees who fled Afghanistan in the 1980s, Sohrob Niaz, a Vienna volunteer firefighter, and his cousins, Vienna residents Sofia and Tameem Rohani, feel duty-bound to help with the current Afghan refugee crisis. All speak Farsi and English fluently, and they spent weeks at the Dulles Expo Center delivering donated supplies and providing translation services for thousands of Afghan refugees who fled in desperation after the Taliban took control of their country.

"The situation with the elderly and the kids is the toughest part," said Sohrob. "One woman didn't have shoes, many people had been wearing the same clothes for a week, and there are a lot of unaccompanied minors who were placed in foster homes."

Sofia, a former nanny and current nursing student, was especially alarmed by what she saw with the youngest refugees.

"Babies were coming in malnourished, some had been in soiled diapers for days, and one was shaking in my hands because it hadn't had a proper meal in days," she recalled. "I started crying leaving in my nice car that night going home to a warm bed after holding that shaking baby. We take it for granted that we have it really good here."

For weeks, Sohrob, Sofia and Tameem collected and sorted donations of clothing, toys and personal care items donated by



Vienna residents who answered the social media call for help. They delivered the items to the Rohani's front porch, and to Mayor Linda Colbert's front porch after she offered to help. The response was so great, the volunteers ran out of storage space and temporarily called off the drive.

"It has truly been a blessing growing up here in Vienna," said Tameem as he helped pick up donations at the mayor's house. "There's a sense of community here, and everyone is just there for you."

The Expo Center is closed now, and thousands of refugees are being temporarily housed at military bases across the nation including Marine Corps Base Quantico,

where Sohrob, Sofia and Tameem are now focusing their efforts. The work is bittersweet as they do it in memory of their 87-year-old grandmother,

Faroghtaj Niaz, who died a week before the current refugee crisis began.

"Her name means crown of happiness in Farsi," Sofia said.

Their hope is that the current refugees find the same happiness their grandmother and the rest of the family found here after fleeing the Russian occupation in Afghanistan more than 40 years ago.

## I Needed Mental Health Assistance

was very intentional when I wrote this headline. I did not say, "I know someone who needed help." I am writing this in the first person; and here is why. Thirteen years-ago I almost died in a tragic accident. Having survived – thanks to cutting-edge medicine and the support of my family and friends – I re-learned to walk, talk and function.

Moreover, by the grace of G-d, I was able to go back to work, continue to be a productive member of society, and even be elected to the Vienna Town Council. Most people don't know how close I came to dying or being confined to a wheelchair for life.

Yet I found that the emotional scars of this experience were in fact much deeper than the physical damage. Despite the advice of my wife and daughter, I did not seek help from a support group, psychiatrist, psychologist, family or friends. My midwestern stoicism told me to, "keep my head down, move forward, and don't dwell on what might have been or the limitations of what now was."

I was wrong. I needed professional counselling. I needed the support from others in similar emotional pain. If I had taken these

actions, my complete healing could have begun earlier. But I was too proud, stubborn, and yes – embarrassed. If I had developed cancer or some other terrible illness, I doubt I would have hidden my struggles. In fact, society celebrates those who tackle



"physical" illnesses – something I can attest to from the support I received during my many surgeries and rehab. But far too often, the need for mental health assistance is still seen as a sign of weakness.

This must stop! Modern life is full of stress – for persons of ALL ages. And living through the pandemic has heightened these stresses and added a sense of isolation for far too many.

There are numerous ways to seek help. Medical treatment and insurance laws have been improved. There are government and foundation services available to those in need. And perhaps one of the few good things to come out of the pandemic is that more treatment options and support groups can be found online.

I can attest that no one treatment or support is correct for every individual. So, if the first or second or third option does not work for you, please keep trying. You are worth it.

I am not a doctor nor a therapist. I do not know what others are dealing with any more than others can know my struggles. But I do know this. The key to getting better is to start by using these three words. "I need help."

### **Controlling Invasive Species**

hose Chinese wisteria and Japanese honeysuckle blooms may be beautiful and smell wonderful, but they are among invasive species that can take a terrible toll on the ecosystem. Like an invading army, invasive plants take over and degrade natural ecosystems. They displace native plants by outcompeting them for soil nutrients, water, and light. They replace natural wildlife food sources with exotic plants that are inedible, toxic, or otherwise harmful to wildlife. They draw pollinators away from life-supporting native plants and push rare species closer to extinction.

As a walk through many local forests, meadows, and wetlands amply demonstrates, some invasive species spread rapidly

and can

quickly change natural plant communities into landscapes dominated by single species with little ecological value. Once established, invasives require enormous amounts of time, labor, and money to control and are often virtually impossible to eliminate.

Vienna is not immune to this threat! Local volunteers have spent countless hours removing invasive species from Vienna and Fairfax County parks. Many of these species have entered the parks from adjoining residential properties. For each of these species, it is far easier to stop the spread early in the process than try to control the damage once they have become fully established.

Here's what you can do to stem the non-native invasive tide:

Avoid planting invasives like English ivy, bamboo, periwinkle and Norway maple in your yard. Each exotic, invasive plant has a native alternative that will enhance rather than detract from our natural ecosystem. Head to local native plant sales each fall and spring to find what's right for your yard.

> **Remove non-native invasives** from your property. The Fairfax County Park Authority Nonnative Invasive ID and Control guide online can help you identify invasives that may be growing on your property. https://bit.ly/invasiveguide

Volunteer to help remove invasives from public lands during community removal events.

Healthy natural ecosystems are vital for human survival and quality of life. By working together to remove non-native invasives, we can help assure a healthy ecosystem for generations to come. **V**

## **Bird E-Scooters Roll into Town of Vienna**

ienna residents now have a new way to get around town and beyond – electric scooters. Bird e-scooters started supplying the rentable shared mobility devices (SMDs) to the Town as part of a one-year pilot program in September. After an e-scooter demonstration and safety inspection by the Town transportation engineer in September, Mayor Linda Colbert and Town Manager Mercury Payton each took one for a spin on the Town Green.

"The operation is pretty straightforward, and it seems very userfriendly." Colbert said Like bicycles, electric scooters are permitted for use on streets, sidewalks and shared-use paths in Vienna. Speed is regulated by GPS technology, depending on location. Due to the roadway speed limit and volume of vehicles on Nutley Street SW and Maple Avenue, it is anticipated that riders will use the sidewalk for safety reasons. On these streets, and in the vicinity of any Town school, park and recreation center, the e-scooter speed is limited to 8 miles per hour. In less congested areas, the scooters can travel up to 15

friendly," Colbert said. Payton agreed. "For many people, this seems to be a low-cost and environmentally

friendly way to get around." The Vienna pilot SMD

program was established after a state law was passed requiring local jurisdictions to have an ordinance or pilot in place to regulate e-scooters and other SMDs by January 2020. If no ordinance or pilot was in place, the law would allow e-scooter companies to operate in Town without regulation. The Vienna Town Council approved the SMD pilot in December 2019,



and Bird is the first company to be approved to operate e-scooters here. Bird also operates in other jurisdictions throughout Fairfax County.

"Our SMD pilot is for one year during which time we will gather information about use, safety and other details to present to the Town Council," said Town Transportation Engineer Andrew Jinks. "The Town Council will use the report to inform the direction of a permanent Town SMD ordinance." miles per hour. Speeds also vary in other jurisdictions throughout Fairfax County according to local regulations.

The e-scooters are available for rent between 4 a.m. and midnight through Bird's mobile phone application. Riders pay a per-minute fee to use the scooter, and discounts are available for veterans, senior citizens, healthcare workers, qualifying students and select community groups. Riders can use their own safety helmet or obtain one through the company's free helmet program.

When renting an e-scooter, riders agree to park the devices in an upright position in a manner that does not obstruct any public rightof-way or impede pedestrians or access to buildings. The company uses GPS tracking to retrieve the scooters overnight and place them in locations on the Bird map. ### **Town Council Approves Zoning Change on Courthouse Road** *Modification Makes Way for Multifamily, Cottage-Like Development*

t its regular meeting Sept. 13, the Vienna Town Council approved the rezoning and requested modifications for a new cottage-like housing development planned for 117-121 Courthouse Road, SW. The developer will construct six, two-family, cottage-style duplexes facing a common green area and a shared clubhouse.

The architectural style of the two-family dwellings is similar to the architecture often seen with cottage housing developments, which includes a relatively short building height, a compact footprint, and a maximum height of one-and-a-half stories. The proposed three-bedroom, 1800-square-foot units in this development will also include two-car garages on the basement level that can be accessed from a vehicular service drive located around the perimeter of the site. Additional visitor parking spaces are planned along the service drive.

The property had been zoned for single-family homes. The zoning change to accommodate the low-density duplayes is consistent with Vienna's Comprehensive Plan
