
Shop Local on Small Business Saturday


The Dos and Don'ts of Leaf Collection

t won't be long before autumn leaves start falling, and thanks to Vienna's Public Works Department, no Town resident has to bag leaves. Instead, rake leaves to the curb, and public works will take it from there.

Fall leaf collection typically begins in late October or early November. Crews make at least three passes through Town to collect leaves through the end of the year. To ensure safe, efficient leaf removal, please rake leaves just to the curb, and not into the street. Raking leaves into the street can be dangerous because

- Cars parked on leaf piles may catch fire.
- Children playing in the leaves may be struck by a passing vehicle.
- · Leaves may prevent rainwater from reaching storm drain inlets.

Please be sure leaf piles are free of sticks, acoms and other debris. These things can clog the vacuum hose and slow the leaf collection process for everyone.



If you'd rather not wait for the Town's leaf collection crews, you can place leaves in paper yard waste bags or loose in a can labeled yard waste and put them out on your regular, weekly trash collection day for pickup. For more information about leaf collection, call 703-255-6380.

utting your yard to bed for the winter is less work than you might think, and Mother Nature will thank you for following these tips.

Don't cut back native perennials until the spring. Beneficial insects including bees, butterflies and ladybugs overwinter in our yards and may take shelter in hollow stems. Ornamental grasses and stalks with seed heads can be an attractive feature in a winter yard, and seed heads provide food for overwintering birds. However, if your plants had destructive insects or diseases, gardening experts say you should cut those back and dispose of the debris in yard-waste collection, not in your compost, to avoid spreading the disease.

Use fallen leaves as a natural resource. Instead of raking or leafblowing, consider leaving leaves where they fall into garden beds, under tree canopies and around shrubs. They'll decompose, enrich the soil and insulate some plants through freezing and thawing cycles. More tips can be found online: www.leaveleavesalone.org. Mulch your lawn with your mower. Lawn experts advise taking the grass catcher off your mower and mowing over leaves, reducing them to dime-size pieces. You're done when you can see about a half inch of grass through the mulched leaf layer. Any rotary-action mower will work, and any kind of deciduous leaves (not pine needles) can be chopped up. For greater effectiveness, switch your mower's blade to a mulching blade, which has teeth instead of a straight blade. If you use a lawn-care contractor, ask it if it can mulch-mow.

Avoid gas-powered leaf blowers. Not only are they noisy, but gas-powered blowers also emit harmful air pollutants and stir up fine particulate matter, which can linger in the air for long periods and endanger human health. Leaf blowers can destroy insect habitat and contribute to compacting topsoil, which is bad for the lawn and produces more run-off into storm drains. If you must blow leaves, an electric-powered blower is a quieter and cleaner alternative.





Town Water Main Replacement Plan on Track

ienna's water main replacement and rehabilitation projects continue to progress as crews work to shore up the aging infrastructure. Since 2018, 36 projects have been completed, including this recent project on Holmes Drive. It's all part of a long-range, Town Council-approved plan to address maintenance and replacement concerns and to improve water-system functionality. The long-term advantage to water customers is service consistency and stabilized water rates.

There are several steps to a successful water main replacement:

- · Marking existing utilities, removing asphalt and moving equipment and materials to the site
- Constructing the new water main and fire hydrants
- Testing the new water main pressure and conducting water quality tests
- · Disconnecting services from the old water main and reconnecting service to the new main
- Abandoning the old main and removing old fire hydrants
- · Restoring the asphalt and other site features

The Town of Vienna's water utility has come a long way from its 1940s roots as a small system that obtained its water from deep, artisan wells. In more than 70 years, it has grown to a major system of more than 130 miles of pipes that deliver water purchased from Fairfax Water to nearly 10,000 residential and commercial customers. The long-range goal is to continue assessing infrastructure needs and prioritizing replacements to ensure consistent service for the Town's water customers for generations to come.


