Public Comment vs. Public Hearing What's the difference?

s the chief records administrator who supports the Mayor and Town Council, part of my job is to prepare public meeting agendas and maintain public records. At the beginning of every regular Town Council meeting, time is set aside to allow for public comment. During this time, anyone who lives in the Town of Vienna may come and address the Town Council on any matter that is not on the agenda for the evening. It's the public's opportunity to make the Council aware of public concerns, issues that may require Council attention, upcoming events, or to present other information for the Council's consideration. The Vienna Town Council always welcomes public comment at every regular meeting.

Public hearings offer a different opportunity for public input. Public hearings are formal opportunities for residents to voice their concerns to the Town Council about local legislation or pending issues of public concern. Some public hearings are required by law, such as those pertaining to the Town budget, tax rates, rezoning or property purchases. Our Town Council often goes beyond what is legally required by voluntarily calling public hearings to seek input on other issues of great interest to the community, such as proposed development plans.

Vienna Town Council meetings and public hearings are advertised in advance on the Town website: www.viennava.gov. You can also see meeting agendas and supporting materials in advance of each public input opportunity, and if you can't make it to a public meeting or a public hearing, you can still make your



voice heard, by email, by phone or by speaking in person with the Mayor or any of the Town Council members. Contact information is available in the Contact Vienna section of this newsletter and on the Town website at this link: www.viennava.gov/yourgovernment/town-council. You can also make an appointment to meet with the Mayor by calling my office, 703-255-6304.

The Vienna Town Council's goal is always to make decisions in the best interest of the Town as a whole. The Council knows it can best accomplish that goal by listening to the people it represents.

Forward to the Past

s the 19th century gave way to the 20th, bicycles were quickly evolving as a form of urban transportation. The invention of the "safety bicycle" along with mass production, made cycling a safe and accessible transportation option, and cities like St. Paul and New York built new paved bike roads. But along came the car, which killed the bicycle as a form of mass transportation. For the rest of the century, bikes in the United States were pushed off



the growing web of highways and relegated to the status of toys or exercise machines.

In the past year and a half, many of us started using our bikes more and more for transportation. Whether driven by health concerns, traffic congestions, the growing availability of e-bikes, or more time spent around home and making short local trips, cycling as a mode of transportation has become increasingly popular, which has the potential to change our urban landscape significantly.

Perhaps we're starting to recognize what many European countries have known for years. Bike paths offer a transportation alternative that can reduce the number of cars on our congested streets and reduce the need for automobile parking. Dedicated bike routes are much cheaper to build than roads, and they can support local business growth. This is already happening in Vienna, where an entire health and wellness district has sprung up on Mill and Dominion Streets, along the W&OD Trail.

The W&OD Trail winds through the heart of our town and is used by approximately 3 million users a year. Soon, the Northern Virginia Park Authority will widen and split

the part of the trail running through Vienna into separate bike and pedestrian sections, but why stop there? Our evolving bike culture calls for the community to



be creative and come up with a comparable north/south bike path in Vienna connecting Tysons with the W&OD, and ideally, go all the way to Fairfax. Such a trail undoubtedly would reduce traffic on Route 123, while making Vienna an even more popular stop for cyclists.

Making a north/south bike transportation way through Vienna a reality would require the cooperation of many different government agencies at the local, county and state level. But we need to start working in that direction now, so we can pedal forward to the past with all deliberate speed.

Plastic Bags in Fairfax County

ne of my environmental science students in Fairfax County Public Schools once told me about a little experiment she conducted. She tried to count all the plastic bags she saw as she drove along the Beltway, and she sadly reported giving up after counting more than 30 bags in just 15 minutes.

This student was not alone in lamenting the impacts of plastic bags. Americans use approximately 100 billion plastic bags per year, or an average of 365 bags per person, which has an enormous environmental impact. Plastic bags are made of polyethylene, derived from fossil fuels, and persist in the environment without ever fully breaking down. They leach chemicals into the environment, become microplastics ingested by fish, wildlife and humans, and release toxic chemicals into the air when burned as trash.

But now, there is some good news for this student and others concerned about plastic pollution. In September, the Fairfax County Board of Supervisors adopted an ordinance imposing a five-cent tax on any disposable plastic bag provided at grocery, convenience or drug stores. The tax will take effect on Jan. 1, 2022, and will help fund:

- · Environmental cleanup programs
- · Pollution and litter reduction
- · Educational programs on waste
- · Reusable bags for low-income residents



Additionally, some retailers will be eligible to keep two cents per bag during the first year to help with implementation. For more information about the Fairfax County plastic bag tax, visit https://bit.ly/BagPlastic.

Tidy up with Quarterly Recycling Day

lear the clutter from your home by disposing of hard-to-recycle items at the Town's next Quarterly Recycling Day, Saturday Dec. 4, 2021 at the Northside Property Yard at 600 Mill Street, NE. Town residents may drive up between 8 a.m. and 2 p.m. and drop off auto waste (such as used oil and antifreeze), electronics (no TVs or computer monitors please), and scrap metal for recycling. The Vehicle Maintenance Department will also be collecting rechargeable batteries. No tires or hazardous materials such as paint, insecticides or fluorescent bulbs will be accepted.
