New Police Department on Target for Summer Opening

t won't be long before the entire Vienna Police Department reports for work under one roof. The new building is on schedule to open in the summer of 2022 enabling all officers to report to the same location for the first time in more than two decades.

"The last building was completed in 1994, and the department outgrew it 13 years later," said Vienna Police Chief Jim Morris. "Currently, our detectives and dispatchers are working out of the Town Hall, while the rest of the department reports to the temporary headquarters building on Center Street."

Morris, the police command staff and the Town's elected leaders got a first-hand look at the new building's layout when they toured the construction site recently. The new facility located at 215 Center Street, South will be nearly three times the size of the old building, and it will include a property and evidence storage area that conforms to current legal standards and a modern firing range for training and qualifying.

"The new range will be bigger than the range in the old building, and it will enable our officers to qualify both with service weapons and rifles," Morris said. "It will be nice to eliminate the need to compete for time at another rifle ange in Fairfax. County, which is and to come by."

Morris says the new Vienna Police Department building is about 65 percent complete. In addition to modern police amenities, the facility will also feature a large, flexible space that will have multiple uses. The police department will use the space for classroom training, an emergency operations center when needed and public

safety presentations to community groups. The Town will also use the space for nonpolice activities such as cable broadcasting, public meeting overflow, staff meetings and a potential voting location. Public Meetings to Return to Town Hall

year ago at this time, virtual public meetings were the only way the Vienna Town Council could safely conduct the public business and include public participation during the pandemic. Now, thanks to the development of an effective vaccine, the Town is seeing the hopeful signs of recovery. Between vaccination rates and continued prevention measures, such as mask-wearing and social distancing, residents seem more confident in resuming life as we knew it before the pandemic as they move freely about town. The declaration of the public health emergency has also ended, and to that end, the Vienna Town Council has decided to suspend virtual public meetings and return to Council Chambers in January 2022.

The decision to resume in-person meetings was carefully considered. While virtual meetings provided a convenience that didn't exist before the pandemic, conducting virtual meetings with public participation came at a high cost to staff and to taxpayers. Virtual meetings increased the Town's technical staff's workload from 3 to 16 meetings per month, exhausted the annual overtime budget within five months' time, and resulted in an improper work-life



balance for staff members who were needed to work longer shifts to accommodate ongoing technical needs and challenges. After weighing the facts, the Town Council ultimately determined the cost-benefit analysis does not support continuing with virtual public meetings in 2022, especially since local vaccination rates are high, which further reduces the risk of serious illness.

Vienna Town Hall is centrally located and the greatest distance any resident would have to travel to reach the building is about two miles. Those who prefer to stay home can still watch public meetings via live stream on the Town website, live on television via Cable Channels 27 (Cox) and 38 (Verizon), and on demand via posted recordings on the Town website. As always, residents can share their views with the mayor and councilmembers via email, phone calls or private appointments. The mayor is also available to meet during regular office hours. Resolve to Make it a Clean, Green New Year

fter the whirl of the holidays comes a natural urge to clear out, declutter and start a new year fresh and clean. What most people don't realize is that what you clean with and how you clean is as important to the planet as it is to your home. Many cleaning products are laden with chemicals that contaminate the water table and harm human health. These products also come in plastic packaging that is difficult to recycle.

The good news is that there are many affordable, accessible ways to clean up your house without causing damage to our planet Earth. Waste from cleaning products like single-use wipes and paper towels, aerosol sprays and more can be avoided quite easily, saving you money and reducing the amount of garbage that goes into the waste stream.

For starters, cut paper towels and single-use cleaning wipes where you can. Use rags or old towels that you can wash in cold water and reuse, rather than wasting money and storage space on expensive paper towels and wipes.

Secondly, most antibacterial cleaning products are not necessary and can actually be harmful because they kill good bacteria. Two cleaning powerhouses to keep on hand are vinegar and castile soap. Both are inexpensive, effective multi-purpose cleaners that can tackle big and small jobs. Dilute vinegar with water according to the manufacturer's instructions (often 2 or 3 parts vinegar to 1 part water), and clean windows, electric stovetops, mirrors and more, but do not use it on granite as it can harm the stonework. Castile soap diluted with water can keep stonework, floors and other surfaces sparkling clean. It can even be used as body wash or shampoo.

Finally, an important part of the post-holiday clear out is decluttering. There are so many ways to give away old toys, clothes and household goods. Be sure to only give away items in good condition. Thrift stores are overburdened as it is, so if something is broken, get it repaired, recycle it properly or throw it out. Here's to a happy and

Homeowner Stormwater Management Reports Due

ew homes often come with an increase in impervious areas, such as roofs and driveways, that reduces the land's ability to effectively disperse stormwater. Stormwater must go somewhere and, if it's not managed appropriately, it can negatively affect properties.

That's why stormwater management facilities, or best management practices (BMPs), are installed with new home construction to control the quality and quantity of stormwater runoff. Common examples of BMPs include infiltration trenches, bioretention rain gardens and planter boxes. For the most part, these systems are worry-free, and proper maintenance helps to extend their life. If not properly managed, BMPs can become overgrown or clogged, leading to failures that may not be noticed, but can impact the surrounding environment.

For this reason, property owners with BMPs are required to submit certified inspection reports by a qualified professional engineer, architect, or land surveyor licensed in Virginia every five years. These inspections, along with photo documentation, certify that a property's stormwater treatment facilities are in good working order and comply with the approved plan.

Beginning this year, homes that received new occupancy in 2017, where owners signed a stormwater maintenance agreement, will receive a notice from the Town of Vienna requesting this maintenance report.

Proper maintenance and inspections help achieve the Town's goal of protecting streams and rivers, and ultimately the Chesapeake Bay. \checkmark
