The Blizzard of '83



Thanks to equipment like this front-end loader and over 2,000 man-hours of labor, Vienna dug out of February's snowstorm with no major problems.

The snowstorm of February 10-11 will go down in history as the "Blizzard of '83." It was one of the biggest and costliest storms ever.

Vienna's Public Works Department began snow removal operations at 9 p.m. Thursday, February 10, and continued non-stop until 5:30 p.m. Saturday, with crews alternating on 10- to 12-hour shifts.

The crews returned on Sunday for 10 hours, with an additional 26 hours spent on snow removal during the following week. Equipment repair crews were also on duty throughout the operation to handle the inevitable breakdowns caused by such hard service. In all, 2,074.5 man-hours were spent on snow removal.

Every available piece of Town equipment was used during the storm, including eight snowplows, five of them equipped with salt/sand spreaders, two front-end loaders and a back-

hoe. An additional two plows, two loaders and a grader were rented from a local contractor. Approximately 300 tons of salt and 300 tons of sand were spread on town streets.

The total cost of digging out of the Blizzard of '83 is estimated at \$31,-321.88.

The 36 Public Works employees who helped get Vienna moving again are grateful for the many letters and phone calls of appreciation from town residents.

Spring Cleanup Begins April 4

Vienna's annual Spring Cleanup will begin on Monday, April 4. Cleanup crews will start work in the northeast section of town and move clockwise through southeast, southwest and northwest.

During the cleanup, residents may put items such as building materials, furniture, appliances, brush and tree limbs at the curbside for free pickup.

Rabies Clinic

A special rabies vaccination clinic for dogs and cats will be held at the Vienna Community Center on Sunday, March 13, from 1:30 to 3:30 p.m.

All dogs and cats six months old and over must be vaccinated against rabies. Vaccinations for dogs a year old and over cost \$6 and give protection from rabies for three years. For dogs under a year old and for all cats, the cost is \$4 for a rabies vaccination good for one year.

Town dog licenses will also be sold at the clinic for \$5 each.

Car Tags Go on Sale March 15

1983 Town vehicle licenses will go on sale March 15. Fees are \$20 for vehicles weighing 4,000 pounds and over, \$15 for vehicles less than 4,000 pounds and \$8 for motorcycles.

Tags may be purchased by mail or in person at Town Hall weekdays from

8:15 a.m. to 4:45 p.m. Vehicle owners may choose a metal plate, bumper sticker or windshield decal. All tags must be displayed on the *tront* of the vehicle.

1983 tags must be displayed by midnight April 15.

TOWN COUNCIL ACTION

January 3, 1983

Council adopted as permanent parts of the Town Code two ordinances that were passed as emergency measures late last year. One of the ordinances requires that all cats over six months old be vaccinated against rabies. The other ordinance concerns front yard setback and landscaping requirements for commercial buildings.

January 24, 1983

"Walk/Don't Walk" lights were approved for the intersection of Maple Avenue and Center Street. "No Right Turn on Red" signs will also be installed at this intersection for pedestrian safety.

Other Council Action:

- * Directed the Transportation Safety Commission to review a request for four-way stop signs at the intersection of Ware Street and Tapawingo Road and the safety of the Park Street/Talahi Road intersection.
- * Adopted an ordinance allowing businesses an extra 1½ square feet of wall sign space for street number display after approval by the Architectural Review Board.
- * Approved a requested waiver to permit a painted concrete block wall instead of a brick wall on the Greenhoot Fischer property, provided the paint color blends with the existing brick and does not flake or peel.
- * Reappointed John Brenkus, John Everhard, Arthur Kimberly, Lawrence King and Martha Pruett to the Planning Commission for three-year terms. Reappointed Frank Willingham and appointed Donald Chumley to the Transportation Safety Commission for two-year terms. Appointed

Public Hearing On Video Games

At its regular meeting on March 21, the Town Council will hold a public hearing on a proposed ordinance to regulate video games and other mechanical and electronic game machines. The meeting will begin at 8 p.m. in Town Hall.

The ordinance would allow game machines in a business provided that the building contains at least 1,000 square feet of floor space open to the public and that the machines occupy no more than 5% of that area.

The ordinance would also require an additional parking space for every two game machines and a bike rack for every three machines.
