Planning for Commercial Redevelopment

Changes are occurring all around us. In the past five years, we have seen heavy commercial development on both ends of town. Coincident with this movement, we have experienced a decline in commercial revenues and many commercial structures within the town are reaching the end of their economic life.

My Council colleagues and I are adamant about ensuring that Vienna continues to have a viable and attractive commercial area, one that compliments the high quality of life and residential character we enjoy. For us to realize this goal, we recognized the potential for businesses to leave town for other locations in the county and that commercial redevelopment could occur, possibly uncontrolled, presenting us with undesired results.

Citizen Advisory Panel Established

In the face of these pressures, the Council has acted in a manner which will allow us to direct development or redevelopment of the commercial area. On November 1, 1982, by resolution, we established a Citizen Advisory Panel to develop recommendations on redevelopment of commercial zones. The Panel in developing its recommendations will:

- 1. Assess trends in Vienna's commercial and light-industrial zones in view of current and projected developments adjacent to the town.
- 2. Determine what short- and long-range policy goals should be pursued to ensure a continued viable commercial sector in Vienna.
- 3. Determine what changes, if any, are required in the Town's ordinances, code and policies to achieve the goals of maintaining a viable commercial area while enhancing the appearance and residential nature of Vienna.
- 4. Recommend any proposed changes to the Town's or-

dinances, codes and policies as identified through the above efforts.

The Panel is composed of citizens from the business and residential communities who are concerned and dedicated and who are volunteering their time and skills for this critical task.

More Meaningful Comprehensive Plan

Their efforts should result in actions that will pave the way toward making our Comprehensive Plan a more meaningful document, offering the guidance of Vienna citizens and Council in areas of development and redevelopment, as well as a more forceful basis for protecting the valuable environmental, historic and residential resources,

Admittedly, the work of the Panel will be only the first step in a process designed to prepare the town for redevelopment that will inevitably occur. The Panel will submit a preliminary report of its findings and recommendations in late September or early October. Consideration of the report will endure the process of several public hearings designed to gain maximum input from both the residential and business communities.

Keep Dogs Under Control

Dog owners are reminded that all dogs must be controlled on a leash whenever they are off the owner's property. Dogs found running at large, with or without a current dog tag, will be picked up by the Town Animal Warden and may be impounded. Fines for dogs at large increase with each offense up to a maximum of \$100.

When walking your dog, please be considerate of your neighbors. Don't allow dogs to walk on other people's property.

Trash Collection Regulations New Track Club

The Vienna Department of Public Works reminds residents of the following regulations concerning trash collection:

- Trash should be placed at the curbline away from the sidewalk and street. Trash cans should be removed from the curbline as soon as possible after trash pickup.
- Trash containers should be watertight metal or non-breakable plastic cans equipped with handles and tightfitting lids. Cans with a maximum capacity of 31 gallons are recommended. Plastic bags expressly designed for refuse disposal and paper bags used in trash compactors may be substituted for cans. The bags should be removed from the can or other holder, tied at the top and placed at the curbline.
- In the interest of health and safety, defective trash cans will be redtagged by trash crews, indicating that they are no longer suitable for use. These will be removed the first pickup the following week if left upside-down at the curbside.
- For large objects or an excessive amount of refuse, a special pickup will be made for \$20, payable in advance, for each dump truck load, provided objects or refuse are placed at the curb.
- Residents are required to separate newspapers from other trash. Newspapers are picked up twice a month for recycling. (See Town Calendar for pickup days.)
- Building materials generated by contractors employed by homeowners will not be picked up either by the regular trash crews or the special pickup crews.
- In addition to household trash. the bi-weekly trash crews will pick
- * Grass clippings and leaves placed in plastic bags or cardboard containers (limited to 10 bags of leaves per pick-
- * Tree trimmings (11/2" maximum diameter), bushes and brush, provided they

are tied securely in bundles no longer than four feet.

- * Cold ashes, if placed next to trash cans in separate containers.
- Trash crews will not pick up the following items except through a prearranged special pickup or during the spring and fall town cleanups:
- * Building materials wood paneling, building block, stones, fences, broken concrete, etc.
- * Discarded furniture, swing sets, playground equipment, etc.
- * Scrap metal, automobile parts, bicycles, tires, etc.
- * Sod and piles of debris such as mixtures of leaves, wood, brush, stumps,
- * Trees and limbs larger than 11/2" in diameter.
- * Bushes, brush and trimmings not securely tied for ease of handling.
- * Stoves, refrigerators, washers and dryers.

Vienna residents may purchase plastic trash bags at Town Hall weekdays from 8:15 a,m, to 4:45 p.m. Lightweight bags cost \$4.50 for a box of 50, and heavyweight bags come in boxes of 100 for \$12.

Right-on-Red: Exercise Care

Before turning right on red, please observe these important precautions:

At some intersections, because of heavy traffic or sight distance problems, right-on-red is prohibited or restricted to certain hours. Check intersections for warning signs before turning right on red.

Come to a full stop at the red light. Check to see that no cars are coming from the left. Then check to see that no cars are turning on an advance green light across the intersection from you.

Finally, and extremely important, make sure there are no pedestrians crossing the intersection. Drivers must always yield to pedestrians.

Lawn \$avers Tips Available

Sponsored by the Northern Virginia Planning District Commission, local governments in Northern Virginia and the Virginia Cooperative Extension Service, the Lawn \$aver Program is aimed at reducing the volume of solid waste and conserving soil and water resources.

The Lawn \$aver Program is a plan of moderate watering, fertilization in the fall, regular mowing and the continuous return of nutrient-rich grass clippings to the lawn.

Actual dollar savings to homeowners vary with lawn size and weather conditions, but typical savings are in the range of \$35 to \$80 a year.
