



Fall Cleanup Begins Oct. 11

The annual Fall Cleanup will begin on Tuesday, October 11, in southeast Vienna. Cleanup crews will then proceed through the southwest, northwest and northeast sections of town.

During the cleanup, residents may place building materials, furniture, appliances, brush and other items at the curbside for free pickup. Brush and branches should be separated from other discards, and all cleanup items should be kept away from regular trash, fire hydrants, water meters, gas valves and fences.

The amount of time spent by cleanup crews in each section of town will depend on the volume of debris. All residents are asked to have their discards at the curbside on October 11 to ensure pickup. I-66/Nutley St. Interchange Subject of Public Meeting

The Town Council will hold a public meeting on the proposed design of the I-66/Nutley Street interchange on Monday, October 24, at 8 p.m. in Town Hall. Representatives from the Virginia Department of Highways and Transportation (VDH&T) will be present to receive comments and answer questions from interested citizens.

VDH&T held a public hearing last month on the proposal to construct a full cloverleaf interchange at I-66 and Nutley and to widen Nutley from four to six lanes between the town boundary and Lee Highway. This construction is proposed in conjunction with the Vienna Metro Station.

At the VDH&T hearing, Mayor

Charles Robinson and other town residents expressed several concerns about the project, including increased traffic congestion on Nutley Street, the possible cutoff of Dellwood Drive from Nutley and higher noise levels in the areas of Ware Street, Pekay Street and Yeonas Drive. The Mayor also emphasized the need for direct access ramps between I-66 and the Metro station.

All concerned citizens, those who were at the VDH&T hearing as well as those who could not be present then, are encouraged to attend the meeting on October 24. Plans for the proposed project may be reviewed prior to the meeting in the Public Works Department at Town Hall.

State Police Report Vienna Crime Rate Low

The Virginia State Police Uniform Crime Reporting Section has compiled its 1982 Crime in Virginia report. The report reflects the outstanding work of the men and women of the Vienna Police Department.

Among the Northern Virginia jurisdictions of Arlington, Alexandria, Fairfax County, Fairfax City, Falls Church, Herndon and Vienna, last year Vienna had the lowest total number of major crimes and also the lowest crime rate. At the same time, the Town achieved a 30.48% clearance rate (cases closed), the best in the area. The second highest clearance rate was 24.13% in Falls Church.

Town Receives Certificate In Financial Reporting

The Town of Vienna has been awarded a Certificate of Conformance in Financial Reporting by the Municipal Finance Officers Association of the United States and Canada for its Comprehensive Annual Financial Report for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1982.

The Certificate of Conformance is the highest form of recognition in the area of governmental accounting and financial reporting. Its attainment represents a significant accomplishment by a municipality and is important as a means of achieving and maintaining a favorable bond rating. This is the fourth consecutive year that Vienna has received the award.

Reports are evaluated by a special review committee composed of finance officers, certified public accountants, educators and other experts in governmental accounting and financial reporting.

Help Construct New Playground

All Vienna residents are invited to help build the area's first creative playground at Wolftrap Elementary School on Beulah Road. Construction begins on Thursday morning, November 3, and ends on Sunday evening, November 6. Hundreds of helping hands are needed.

Volunteers will help erect a rocket ship, castle, suspension bridge, obstacle course, tunnels, mirror maze, double slide, circular slide, swings, amphitheater and other facilities.

Much like an old-fashioned barn-raising, whole families and individuals are welcome. Unskilled helpers will work under the supervision of skilled ones according to procedures outlined by architect Robert Leathers, who over the past 13 years has helped communities design and construct some 90 creative playgrounds, including about a dozen elsewhere in Fairfax County. Assistance is also needed for child care, food provision and miscellaneous "go-for" errands.

October is Recycling Month in Virginia. Vienna's Aluminum Recycling Center, located on the BP Car Wash property on West Maple Avenue, recently received a much-needed repainting thanks to Boy Scout John Missert of Troop 976.

Aluminum cans and other household aluminum, such as frozen food containers and pie pans, may be dropped off at the recycling center 24 hours a day, seven days a week. Since the center opened in 1980, over 13,000 pounds of aluminum have been recycled, for which the Town has received more than \$3,000. These funds are used for beautification projects in Vienna.
