A Walkable Community: Vision Becomes Reality

ave you spotted something different about your street or neighborhood recently? Thanks to the Robinson Trust Sidewalk Initiative, newly constructed sidewalks are making it easier to get around town on foot. To date, new sidewalks have been completed on Holmes Drive NW, Pleasant Street SW, Plum Street SW, and Cabin Road SE. Several missing sidewalk links in other neighborhoods have also been completed, and beginning this spring, sidewalks are scheduled to be installed on Cherry Street SW and Adahi Road SE.

Resident Cheryl Umbel, who lives on Cabin Road, appreciates the positive attributes of the new sidewalk on her street, but she was opposed at first due to concerns about tree removal and the environment. Those concerns were alleviated once the project was completed.

"The Town was kind enough to replace a tree in my yard," she said with appreciation. "I think they did a good job, and they did listen to me. It's nice to see the people walking up and down the sidewalk and saying hello to each other."

Holmes Drive resident Todd Fehd and others were eager to have the sidewalks installed in their neighborhood for safety reasons. "I've got three kids," he said. "Until this [the sidewalk] was here, when they walked south down Holmes, it was in the street. Now they have sidewalks on all connections between here and Town, and they never have to get off the sidewalk."



Fehd praised the Town's open communication regarding the new sidewalk projects.

"The Town did a very good job of keeping everyone notified," he said with appreciation. "The project manager, Alsinia, was able, generally within a business day or two, to get right back to me with whatever questions I had."

Residents Clear the Air in Community Forum

t was standing room only in the Council Chamber at Town Hall on March 15 as interested residents gathered to express their concerns about two active MAC-approved construction projects at 380 and 444 Maple Avenue. Both projects will progressively impact neighbors, neighborhoods, and anyone driving or walking in the vicinity of Maple Avenue and Nutley Street.

Residents near the current Sunrise Assisted Living construction project located at 380 Maple Ave. raised concerns about traffic safety in and out of their neighborhood, lane widths, missing sidewalks, lane closures, and lack of local parking being taken by construction workers. The community forum, organized by Councilmember Steve Potter, gave the residents an opportunity to share their concerns directly with Town leaders and representatives of Sunrise.

"I was pleased the meeting was so heavily attended," said Potter. "It's extremely important that our residents have an effective community engagement process in place that includes communications and allows dialogue in advance. This meeting moved us closer to that reality."

Residents who attended were pleased their concerns were being addressed by both Sunrise representatives and Town



leaders. Sunrise provided an opportunity for residents near its project to opt into a weekly email informing them of construction status reports and plans for the coming week.

To address confusion about which Town departments to call to report concerns, Town leaders decided to streamline the current approach by identifying a single point of contact to serve as a liaison between residents and appropriate staff regarding construction-related concerns or questions, and to serve as Town



liaison with construction management. Moving forward communications should be directed to Emily Goodman who can be reached via email at **Emily.Goodman@viennava.gov** or by phone at 703-255-6384.

Sunrise representatives emphasized the company's commitment to being "a good neighbor." They also committed to exploring ways to alleviate resident street parking concerns, such as a shuttle option for construction workers.

The developer for the 444 Maple Ave. project indicated that Hekemian is currently in the "demolition" phase at the site. This will be followed by a "Keep Clean and Safe" phase. Its representative declined to attend the meeting because site plans and timelines are not yet complete. The company expressed interest in participating in a similar forum once plans are finalized and before construction begins.

Vienna Police Deptartment Holds Drug Take-Back Day

G et rid of old, expired medications in your home safely by dropping them off at the Vienna Police Department on National Drug Take-Back Day on April 30. Residents can stop by any time between 10 a.m. and 2 p.m. and drop the medications in the collection box inside the Vienna Police Department temporary facility located at 301 Center St. S., formerly Faith Baptist Church. It's okay to keep the medications in their original containers, but be sure to remove any identifying information from the prescription label. Epipens can also be dropped off, but no other intravenous solutions, injectables or syringes will be accepted due to associated hazards. Vienna's Drug Take-Back Day is being held in conjunction with the U.S. Drug Enforcement Administration and state and local law enforcement agencies. ♥





Moving Forward

n September 2020, the Town began the process of updating the local subdivision and zoning code. Since then, the Town Council has received multiple updates on the process based on lots of community feedback from Code Create surveys, listening sessions and other outreach efforts as we continue the process of clarifying, simplifying and reorganizing the code to meet the modernday needs of our residents. While completely updating the full, 60-year-old code will take time, I am pleased that elements of the ordinance are moving forward to the benefit of town residents.

At the March 21, 2022 Town Council meeting, the Vienna Town Council approved and adopted the portion of the code dealing with front porch projections. This updated portion of the code allows homeowners with homes built at or near the front setback line to construct a covered front porch on their property, which would provide another option for outdoor family space to accommodate modern-day needs. The new structures still must conform with strict size requirements, but the added space will enhance curb appeal and provide an enjoyable option for family living.

Over the next year or so, the Town Council will consider other zoning code updates, such as lot coverage, and determine whether changes should be made. Town of Vienna zoning staff members continue to work



diligently to review the code and look forward to more events in 2022 to meet with the community to obtain feedback on proposed zoning code options. By working together, we can ensure that any code updates are thoughtful and purposeful to the benefit of our beautiful town.

Recycling Right

R ecycling or trash? Sometimes it's hard to tell! According to the Vienna Public Works Department, town residents put out 1,500 tons of recyclables in 2021, which the Town's contractor, American Disposal Services, picked up curbside and hauled to its material recycling facility where it's sorted and baled for sale. The problem is about a third of the items tossed into curbside bins are not recyclable and gets sent to a landfill for a cost.

To clear up confusion about what can and can't be recycled, check out American Disposal's online Waste Wizard: https:// bit.ly/ADwastewizard. With this tool, you can search by item or material, learn whether the item is recyclable or not and see any special instructions. The company also publishes a guide to curbside recycling: https://bit.ly/ADrecycleguide.

Here are some common items that **can** be recycled:

- Clear or colored plastic bottles, tubs and lids numbered #1 and #2 and all wide-mouth plastics labeled #5
- "Gabled" milk and juice cartons (peaked like a house roof)
- Clamshell containers (like those that contain berries or salad greens)
- Aluminum foil

These items **cannot** be recycled and should be thrown in the trash:

- Items smaller than a yogurt cup, such as loose bottle caps
- · Anything made of black plastic or Styrofoam
- Flat-top cartons that contain soup, broth, milk or juice and juice pouches
- Plastic straws
- Paper take-out food containers and cardboard drink cup trays
- · Plastic wrap and waxed paper

There are some items, like pizza boxes, that may or may not be eligible for recycling. Pizza boxes are recyclable if they are mostly clean. If they are especially greasy, they should be thrown in the trash.

Plastic, wire and wood hangers are not recyclable in the curbside bin. You can, however, give them new life by donating them or returning them to dry cleaning businesses.

Perhaps the most important rule for curbside recycling is to put items unbagged and loose in the bin to keep operations running smoothly. Plastic bags are a big no-no, as are plastic cords and wires, because they clog the recycling facility's equipment and lead to equipment shutdowns.

Become a Sustainability Challenge Champion

ere's a great way for businesses and organizations to test their green practices and enjoy a little friendly competition at the same time – the Conservation and

Sustainability Commission's annual Sustainability Challenge! To be certified, participants evaluate current practices and document sustainability activities in one or more of five areas: energy, water, waste, transportation, and purchasing. Participation is free, voluntary, and self-certified. Winners will be recognized during Vienna's "Business Month" in May. Sustainability Challenge Champions are organizations that




