fter two years of pandemic woes and restrictions, the three-day ViVa Vienna festival that has brought excitement and entertainment to people of all ages for generations, returns in full force this Memorial Day weekend! For more than 35 years, The Rotary Club of Vienna has organized this beloved tradition in partnership with the Town of Vienna. This year is no exception, and it's going to be better than ever!

As in past years, the whole family can enjoy carnival rides, live entertainment and practically endless food options ranging from international fare to American classics, including nostalgic childhood treats like candy apples and funnel cakes. Plastic, plastic everywhere!

t's nearly impossible to avoid single-use plastics today. Even when you bring reusable bags and forgo bottled water and plastic straws, any trip to the grocery store highlights the scope of the problem. Almost everything is packaged in plastic: cereal, berries, meat, bread, bakery items, shampoo, deodorant, toothpaste, even tea bags. The barrage of plastic continues with every take-out order (plastic utensils and containers) and online purchase (bubble wrap and plastic packaging).

We are drowning in single-use plastics that are used once then thrown away. The United Nations Environment Program (UNEP) estimates that one million plastic bottles are purchased every minute and five million plastic bags are used every year. According to UNEP, the world produces 300 million tons of plastic waste each year and the pandemic has created an additional 8 million tons of plastic waste. Global production of primary plastic is forecast to reach a staggering 34 billion tons by 2050. At this rate, a report by the Ellen MacArther Foundation estimates plastic will outweigh fish in our oceans by 2050.

Single-use plastics wreak havoc on our health and the environment throughout their entire life cycle, from production to transport to disposal. Most plastics are produced from virgin fossil fuels and contain chemical additives and coatings, resulting in emissions of toxins and the greenhouse gases that cause climate change. Because plastic takes years to decompose, depending on its composition and exposure to sunlight, it accumulates in the environment and kills birds and marine life that eat or get tangled in it. Plastics slowly break down into tiny bits called microplastics, which are found in produce, water, fish, animals, birds, and now even human blood.

Efforts are underway at the state, federal, and even international level to reduce the production and use of single-use plastic products and packaging. Until these larger efforts succeed, what can we do to reduce the sea of plastic that floods our homes each week?

- For starters, **take an inventory of how much single-use plastic you consume in an average week**. Grab a box and collect every piece of plastic you buy, use, or receive.
- Once you get over the shock of how much you are consuming, figure out how you are disposing of it. Are you reusing the

packaging? How much can you properly recycle? How much ends up in the trash?

• Finally, make a list of changes you can make to reduce your household's contribution to plastic waste and <u>commit to one</u> <u>or two</u>. Maybe switch from buying plastic packages of muffins to making your own. Or switch from buying liquid hand soap in plastic containers to bars. Or buy a pack of reusable mesh cotton vegetable bags and use them when you buy produce. Often these switches are healthier and less expensive, and over time, it may become easier to add in more changes.

Addressing Stormwater Risks of Vienna's Changing Landscape

hat happens when precipitation falls onto the ground? Possibilities include landing on pervious surfaces such as trees or shrubs and evaporating; landing on open spaces and soaking into the soil; or landing on impervious surfaces such as roofs, driveways, and roads flowing into storm drains or streams. The latter involving impervious surfaces is

commonly known as stormwater runoff.

According to the U.S Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) and other environmental groups, stormwater runoff is the fastest growing source of pollution to the Chesapeake Bay. It flows down driveways and lawns into streets and storm drains carrying debris, chemicals, bacteria, eroded soil, and other pollutants with it into streams, rivers, lakes, wetlands, and bays.

Left unmanaged, fast-moving stormwater runoff can erode stream banks, damage abutting properties and reduce water quality. It can also lead to flooding on public streets and private property. As Vienna continues to grow at the average rate of 100 new homes per year, the associated land disturbances will dramatically alter terrain and permeability by removing trees and vegetation needed to absorb stormwater into the soil, filter it, and ultimately replenish aquifers. This is why more than \$6 million is spent on stormwater management-related projects each fiscal year. Our goal is to mitigate stormwater infrastructure risks associated with Vienna's changing landscape.

This is not only an environmental issue; it is also a financial issue. If preventive stormwater management practices are not effectively monitored and controlled, there will be a need for more expensive, corrective actions. Someone will have to pay for those corrections and it's a safe bet it will be taxpayers.

Fortunately, there are both proven and evolving alternatives to conventional drainage techniques and site designs that can substantially reduce stormwater runoff. These alternative development techniques, commonly called Best Management Practices or BMPs, are aimed at soaking up every drop of rainwater close to where it falls.

Common techniques include infiltration trenches, rain gardens, downspouts, rain barrels and cisterns, natural landscaping, filter strips, rain gardens, and more. Many of these practices can reduce both construction costs and long-term maintenance costs.

I urge you to explore these time-tested options to determine possible ways to effectively increase pervious surfaces on your property and address Vienna's stormwater management challenges. With a community approach, we can effectively mitigate potential stormwater runoff hazards and ensure a safe community for generations to come.

Vienna Responds Generously to Ukraine Relief Drive

oved by the horrors of the war in Ukraine, Vienna residents, schools and businesses responded in force to a multi-jurisdictional relief drive to support Ukrainian refugees. From March 23-April 15, so many donations of new blankets, socks, gloves and new or gently used coats were dropped off daily at the Vienna Community Center, they had to be moved to a storage area in the temporary police headquarters on Center Street. By the end of the drive, the donations, placed in protective bags by Community Center Staff, were piled so high, they filled a 150-foot storage room almost to the ceiling!

"The response has been overwhelming, and I am grateful to serve in a community that so generously provided these basic comforts to Ukrainian refugees who desperately need them," said Vienna Mayor Linda Colbert. "Our community's enormous compassion is truly inspiring."

Mayor Colbert joined other Northern Virginia elected leaders at the Fairfax County Government Center on March 23 to launch the multi-jurisdictional relief effort to support Ukrainian refugees. A trucking company from North Carolina picked up the donations across Fairfax County and shipped them to Poland for distribution. The regional relief drive was organized by the Northern Virginia Regional Commission.





Who's Watching the Kids?

or most students, the final bell of the school year signals the sweet sound of carefree summer days, hanging out with friends and having fun. But, when the fun and games cross the line, trouble ensues, and the entire community often pays the price.

"Over the past year, we've seen increases in vandalism, fights and other unlawful activity in parks and other locations where minors gather across town," said Vienna Police Chief Jim Morris. "We have found in some of these cases that parents have the impression that if the kids go to a park or other public facility where organized activities take place, they will be supervised. That's only true if the kids are enrolled in an organized activity at those facilities."

In the last year alone, unsupervised juveniles caused more than \$11,000 in damage to Town parks, including thousands of dollars-worth of damage to Waters Field in one single incident. That "prank" resulted in significant damage that will require the field to be temporarily closed while repairs are made. There is video surveillance in many areas, which has captured unlawful activity on camera and enabled police to identify suspects.

"The entire community puts a lot of time, money and sweat equity into maintaining parks and fields, and it's heartbreaking to see how one careless act by a few individuals can spoil the enjoyment for everyone," said Vienna Parks and Recreation Director Leslie Herman. "Everyone loses in those cases."

Herman says Community Center staff are always on hand to supervise teens participating in activities at the Club Phoenix Teen Center and during Open Gym at the Community Center. Unless minors enrolled in a class or camp or organized community athletic league, there is no staff supervision at Waters Field, the W&OD Trail, the Community Center grounds or any other public place in town.

"Parents can help their children avoid making bad choices by being mindful of where their children are, who they are hanging



out with and whether there will or will not be adult supervision," Morris said. "If the kids are old enough to move around without adult supervision, parents should set clear behavioral expectations and communicate them to their children before summer begins."

By setting clear boundaries and working together as one community, the goal is to ensure everyone has a safe and happy summer. \checkmark
