The panel, representing both residential and commercial interests and including the chairmen of the Planning Commission and the Architectural Review Board, was appointed by Council

Make Sure Meter Is Accessible

To facilitate reading of water meters during winter weather, Town of Vienna water customers are requested to keep meter enclosures clear of snow and ice. Meter readers are not equipped to clear the area while performing their job.

Where meter enclosures are covered, an estimated bill will be rendered. Estimated consumption will be adjusted to actual at the end of the next three-month billing cycle. If a customer desires an actual reading for billing purposes, a \$15 surcharge will be made for a second visit by the meter reader.

This policy also applies to meter wells covered with debris and other cases of inaccessibility.

in February 1983 to explore what actions might be taken to enhance the economic vitality of the town while maintaining its residential qualities.

The high-priority recommendations identified by the panel are:

- Draw up a detailed redevelopment master plan for commercial areas.
- Within the master plan guidelines,
 allow consideration of a four-story
 height limitation as an incentive for desired development.
- Strengthen the Town-Business Liaison Committee.
- Establish a permanent Town staff position to encourage and assist businesses locating in Vienna.
- Provide for more rotation and wider representation of membership on Town boards and commissions.

During the coming months, Council will be meeting with panel members to discuss these recommendations.
