Budget Adoption Scheduled

The Town Council is scheduled to adopt the Town budget for fiscal year 1984-85 at its June 18 meeting. A budget summary and notice of real estate tax rate are given below, and complete copies of the budget are available for public inspection in the Town Clerk's office at Town Hall.

The proposed budget totals \$8,307,-441, an increase of about 7% over FY

'83. The Town's major cost increases have occurred in the areas of health insurance, telephone service, and vehicle and equipment parts.

The budget would retain the current real estate tax rate of 33¢ per \$100 of assessed value. Due to increased assessments by Fairfax County, however, tax bills for Vienna property owners will increase by an average of about \$20.

TOWN OF VIENNA, VA. NOTICE OF A PROPOSED TAX LEVY INCREASE

The Vienna, Virginia, Town Council proposes to increase property tax levies.

- 1. Assessment Increase: Total assessed value of real property (as calculated yearly by Fairfax County), excluding additional assessments due to new construction or improvements to property, exceeds last year's total assessed value of real property by an average of 3 percent. This action is the result of annual reassessment activities on the part of the County Tax Assessor and is not done by the Town of Vienna.
- 2. Lowered Rate Necessary to Offset Increased Assessment: The tax rate which would levy the same amount of real estate tax as last year, when multiplied by the new total assessed value of real estate with the exclusions mentioned above, would be \$.32 per \$100 of assessed value. This rate will be known as the "lowered tax rate."
- 3. Effective Rate Increase: The Vienna, Virginia, Town Council proposes to adopt a tax rate of \$.33 per \$100 of assessed value. (This tax rate is the same as last year's rate.) The difference between the lowered tax rate and the proposed rate would be \$.01 per \$100. or .01 percent. This difference will be known as the "effective tax rate increase."

Individual property taxes may, however, increase at a percentage greater than or less than the above percentage.

This notice, in compliance with State statute, defines a proposed tax rate. The tax rate finally adopted by the Vienna Town Council may be less than the rate herein advertised. but, as defined in the State statute, it cannot be more than the advertised rate.

Gypsy Moth Headed Our Way

901 Dale Ct.

The gypsy moth, a major pest of hardwood trees, is advancing southward in its natural spread from the northeastern states. Gypsy moth larvae defoliate shade and ornamental trees, crawl over everything — homes, outdoor furniture, lawns — and leave debris from their feeding.

WAHL, Houghton

Fairfax County is in the direct line of the gypsy moth's southward movement. In 1981, the gypsy moth was confirmed in five different locations in the county. Last summer, County staff identified 275 caterpillar-infested sites.

The County Extension Service has a number of publications to help citizens identify and control gypsy moth infestation. These are available at the Extension Service's Gypsy Moth Office in Fairfax and at County libraries. For more information, call 385-6053.

Trash Bag Price Going Up

Effective July 1, the cost of large trash bags purchased from the Town will increase from \$12 to \$14 per box, tax included.
