# How is Your Vision?

lear vision is important in our day-to-day tasks, and it is essential for good leadership. John Maxwell, author of 50 leadership books, said "Great leaders always seem to

embody two seemingly disparate qualities. They are both highly visionary and highly practical."

As we reflect on our country's founding 246 years ago this month, we see examples of highly visionary and practical leadership by our founding fathers. They incorporated a system of checks and balances in our Constitution to share power among the three branches of the federal government.

Patrick Henry argued against ratification of the Constitution unless a Bill of Rights was added to protect the rights of ordinary citizens. James Madison agreed, and the Bill of Rights was added.

George Washington declined to serve a third term as president because he believed one

person should not accumulate too much power and an orderly presidential succession was best for our newly formed nation.

We are blessed with amazing talent in the Town of Vienna as manifested both by the quality of leaders who serve and those who apply to serve on our boards and commissions. They put service before self and seek what's best for the Town of Vienna for decades to come.

To foster visionary leadership, I am suggesting the Town Council hold a public "vision" hearing this year to receive public input on what four major initiatives should be completed by the Town in 2023. Topics could include:

- 1 the use of the Beulah Road Property to benefit all of Vienna;
- 2 transforming the Center Street property into an inviting activity center;
- **3** ways to preserve our tree-lined, safe, and friendly neighborhoods;
- 4 building a robust business sector; and
- **5** completing our sidewalks and bike paths to encourage outdoor activity.

# It Pays to be Safe!

t's not easy operating heavy vehicles like trash trucks, snow plows and maintenance vehicles, but Town public works drivers are always up to the challenge. In fact, Town employees are so cautious that they have a combined total of 397 years of safe driving, including several employees who, individually, have a 20+ year safe-driving record.

Drivers who went without an avoidable accident during the prior calendar year were recognized recently with a Safe Wheeling Award and other incentives, including being entered into a drawing for a day off with pay. Public works employees who had an injury-free work record over the past six months were also recognized during the program.

# **Environment and Equality**

iberty Amendments Month has played a critical role in building awareness about the Constitution's efforts to enshrine equality for all. While our collective rights as citizens are protected, accessing the tools needed to realize equality when it comes to a clean, healthy environment has been a slow, uphill battle for people of color and those living in poor communities. The environmental justice movement aims to correct these inequities and maintain clean, healthy environments for all.

Environmental justice is defined as equal protection from environmental and health hazards, and equal access to environmental decision-making for all people–regardless of race, color, national origin, or income. Fundamental human necessities such as clean water, clean air, and safe places to work and play have been out of reach–and in some cases denied–to people of color and people living in lowincome communities. Higher levels of air and water pollution, increased health risks and exposure to toxins, excessive noise, lack of green space, and increased vulnerability to flooding and drought are but some of the environmental challenges many people of color contend with.



Everyday decisions that contribute to environmental degradation are felt acutely by people who are already vulnerable. If you are interested in learning more about environmental justice, several groups throughout Fairfax County are working to ensure environmental protections for all communities in our area. # **Need a Trim?**

he Town of Vienna's Department of Public Works is busy tidying up the town by trimming overgrown shrubs and trees that obstruct street and traffic signs. This annual work makes the signs more visible to drivers, bikers and pedestrians and in turn improves safety. Crews are also conducting visual inspections at night to check sign retroreflectivity and perform maintenance as needed. Approximately half of the street name signs have been converted from the 6-inch to 9-inch height standard. Street name sign replacement includes all signs at an intersection and new posts as needed.

The Public Works Department replaces approximately 600 signs per year. Over the past five years, crews have replaced most regulatory and warning signs in town. All of this is an effort to keep people safe and keep Vienna looking it's best! # **Town Council Votes to Amend Zoning Ordinance**

ienna homeowners now have greater flexibility with lot coverage thanks to a vote by the Vienna Town Council at a special meeting June 13. Beginning this month, homeowners will have the ability to cover up to 400 square feet of their back deck with a roof under the following conditions:

- Covered decks must be single-story and cannot be converted into conditioned, interior living space;
- · Covered decks cannot be located in the front yard; and
- Covered decks must provide for stormwater management practices in accordance with the Stormwater Manual for Outdoor Living Areas and meet all criteria included in the manual.

"I'm so glad we were able to reach consensus on updating the ordinance to give Vienna homeowners another option for upgrading outdoor living space," said Mayor Linda Colbert. "The Town Council carefully considered the research and options presented by staff, and we approved a change that

gives homeowners the option of enhancing their outdoor living spaces and addresses environmental concerns."

The June 13 zoning ordinance change is the second amendment to residential standards this year. At the March 21, 2022 meeting, the Vienna Town Council approved and adopted the portion of the code dealing with front porch projections. This change enabled homeowners with homes built at or near the front setback line to construct a covered front porch on their property, providing another option for outdoor family space. The new structures still must conform with strict size requirements, but the added space may enhance curb appeal and provide an enjoyable option for family living.

The votes are the culmination of a two-year process to review and update lot coverage provisions in the Town's zoning ordinance. The process involved numerous community meetings, surveys, listening sessions, Council work sessions and public hearings. For more information visit **www.codecreatevienna.com**.

# Former Town Manager Remembered for Love of Community

or 26 years, John Schoeberlein diligently served as Vienna Town Manager with a commitment to fiscal responsibility and preserving the community's small-town feel. Upon learning of Schoeberlein's death May 30, Town staff and leaders reflected on his remarkable 40year record of public service.

Schoeberlein already had considerable experience when his tenure in Vienna began on April 22, 1985. He had served as City Clerk for Highland Park, Illinois; Assistant City Manager for Pompano Beach, Florida; and a county administrator for Winnebago County, Illinois.

In his first year in Vienna, Schoeberlein set clear leadership goals for himself including conducting a community survey, evaluating infrastructure, and examining financial and operational practices to inform strategic planning.

In a June 1985 Vienna Voice newsletter article, Schoeberlein said, "I don't profess to have all of the answers to problems we as Vienna residents are facing, but I am committed to work with staff and the citizens to find solutions."



Over the course of the following two-and-ahalf decades, Schoeberlein balanced 26 budgets, attended more than 500 Town Council meetings and work sessions, raised the Town's bond rating to AAA and oversaw the building of the police station, the Northside Property Yard, the Community Center and the beloved Vienna Town Green. Even after retirement, Schoeberlein stayed connected with the Town government, offering the benefit of his institutional knowledge to his successor and the Vienna Town Council.

Upon his retirement in May 2011, Schoeberlein reflected on his years of service and credited

others for their role in his successes. "I have had the honor and opportunity to work with many dedicated Council members and Town staff that care deeply about the Town of Vienna."

Though the Town leadership has changed multiple times since Schoeberlein retired, his work established an operational foundation upon which the Town continues to build.  $\boldsymbol{v}$

# **Stop or Face the Consequences**

n a hurry? It could cost you. Due to an increase in stop sign violations, Vienna Police are stepping up efforts to ticket motorists who fail to come to a complete stop at a stop sign, a stop light, or a flashing red light. The goal with the enhanced traffic enforcement campaign is to help avoid preventable crashes and ensure both motorists and pedestrians arrive at their destination safely. So, consider this your warning: Drivers who receive a ticket for a stop-sign or red-light violation face a fine and three demerit points assessed to their driving records. Under certain circumstances, a police officer may cite a stop sign violation as reckless driving, which comes with a hefty fine and can lead to a steep increase in your auto insurance rate.

# Old Courthouse Road Sidewalk Project Underway

ay goodbye and good riddance to the unsightly and unsafe pedestrian path along Old Courthouse Road between Battery Park Street and Pine Valley Drive! The long-awaited sidewalk improvement project is underway and will provide neighborhood children a safe route to school. The project also includes neighborhood stormwater drainage, curb, and gutter improvements.

"The new sidewalk will be able to safely accommodate pedestrians and people with disabilities who use a wheelchair or other assistive devices," Town transportation engineer

Andrew Jinks said. "The overall project will enhance the neighborhood appearance." The project has been in the works since 2013, when the Town applied to the Virginia Department of Transportation (VDOT) for a Safe Routes to School sidewalk grant. Later, the Town and Fairfax County Government entered an agreement to expand the project with VDOT approval. The \$1.2 million project is being funded by the grant and local and state government resources.
