Photographs Compare Austrian, U.S. Viennas

For example, he learned that Vienna, Maryland, derives its name from Vinnacokasimmon, a Nanticoke Indian emperor. (Vienna, Virginia, was named after a town in New York.)

So instead of looking for Austrian references, Freund concentrated on comparable or contrasting images between the American and European Viennas. The result is a collection of photographic twins, some almost identical twins.

The Community Center display features the portion of Freund's work covering Viennas in Virginia, West Virginia, Maryland, New York and Georgia.

Council to Conduct Hearings On Cleanups, Rec Center Use

At its September 10 meeting, the Town Council will hold a public hearing on proposed revisions to Spring and Fall Cleanup procedures. The meeting will begin at 8 p.m. at Town Hall.

The revisions would limit the amount and type of debris collected as follows:

- No more than 300 pounds of concrete per residence per year.
- Leaves will not be picked up during cleanups.
- No more than 300 pounds of scrap metal per residence per cleanup. Whole automobile bodies will not be

picked up.

No more than two major appliances per residence per cleanup.
