Vienna Police to Support Cancer Charity

or the second year in a row, Vienna Police are participating in the #NoShaveNovember campaign to raise awareness of prostate cancer and to raise funds for research to help find a cure. Beginning Tuesday, Nov. 1, 2022, the Vienna Police Department's no-facial-hair dress-code policy will be relaxed a bit to enable male officers to participate in the Zero Cancer 30-day Growand-Give fundraising campaign.

"One of our officers, Juan Vazquez, lost his father to prostate cancer a few years ago, and it is especially meaningful to him that we participate." Vienna Police Chief Jim Morris said. "Last year, our small department raised the second-highest amount of any public safety organization in the

country for the cancer charity – more than \$8,000 – and that's thanks to the generosity of our community."

Nearly 250,000 men will be diagnosed with prostate cancer in the United States this year alone, and the illness is very treatable if diagnosed early. Participating officers hope that as they start to look a little scruffy in their efforts to support life-saving research, others will be inspired to learn more about the illness and donate to the campaign to help find a cure.

Leave the Leaves: Your Yard Will Thank You

aking, blowing or vacuuming leaves has been a ritual of fall, but there's a better way. Mowing over the leaves, or mulch-mowing, will chop them into small pieces. The leaf mulch will fall down into the grass and decompose quickly without suffocating your lawn. Mulch-mowing will save you or your lawn service time and money, improve your lawn and help the environment.

To start, set your mower at its highest setting and take off the grass catcher. Mow over the leaves to reduce them to dime-size pieces. You'll know you're done when you can see about half an inch of grass through the mulched leaf layer. You generally can mow over leaves up to 6 inches in depth. The job is easiest when

leaves are dry. If they're moist, you may need to mow a second time at a right angle to your first pass to get small-enough pieces.

The nutrients that trees moved into the leaves during the summer will return to the soil in winter. Your grass will green up faster in the spring, and you'll need less fertilizer, which will reduce polluting nutrients in stormwater runoff. After a few years, your lawn will sprout fewer dandelions and less crabgrass, because the leaf bits will cover any bare or thin spots in the lawn where weed seeds would otherwise germinate. Mulch-mowing builds better soil, which will keep more moisture and promote better root development. It won't increase thatch or disease in your lawn, and it has no effect on soil pH.

Many creatures including insects, spiders, slugs, turtles, toads, and small mammals use undisturbed leaf litter for protective habitat and as a place to forage. Some of those creatures become food for other animals, such as birds. It's a good idea to leave the leaves under trees and shrubs and in garden beds or, where space allows, pile them up and let them compost. It's free mulch!

If you must remove leaves, the Town of Vienna will pay to take your leaves to a composting facility, but your yard will lose all the benefits. To learn more about mulch-mowing, visit: https://bit.ly/MulchMowing. U

Put the Freeze on Winter Stormwater Pollution


f you're tempted to treat icy driveways and sidewalks with salt this winter, you may want to reconsider. Not only can deicing salts damage your driveway over time, but they can also be harmful to plants, aquatic life, and our drinking water supplies through contaminated stormwater runoff.

When the ground freezes, it loses its ability to act as a natural filter. It instead acts as another impervious surface, conducting melted snow and ice as well as sediment, dirt, road salt, fertilizer and other pollutants into stormwater systems and through local watersheds. This runoff eventually contributes significant amounts of pollutants to the Chesapeake Bay.

Deicing salt alternatives such as potassium acetate (KA) or calcium magnesium acetate (CMA) are less damaging to homes and landscaping. If you do apply salt, do it after shoveling snow, and apply as little as possible to slick surfaces that can't be shoveled. One 12-ounce coffee mug holds enough sodium chloride deicer to treat a 20-foot driveway or 10 sidewalk squares. If it is too cold for your salt to work, use traction materials instead, like sand, wood ash, or even birdseed. After the storm, sweep up the extra salt or traction materials to use again next time.

There's one more thing you can do to reduce winter stormwater pollution. Rather than washing road salt spray off your car at home, take your vehicle to a commercial car wash where the runoff flows through drains leading to wastewater treatment facilities.





Nutley Tree Replacement Phase 2 Begins

eginning this month, the remaining 13 fragile, non-native and invasive Callery pear trees will be removed from the Nutley Street median and replaced with heartier native species, including black gum, willow oak, serviceberry and Rotundiloba sweet gum trees. The Vienna Parks and Recreation maintenance staff began the Nutley Street project in April, removing 14 Callery pear trees, which have become overabundant in the region and contributed to the reduction in the area tree diversity, threatening the ecological balance among plants and wildlife in Virginia's urban forest. The second phase of the project is scheduled to begin in early November and expected to last approximately four weeks. The project is being funded primarily by an anonymous donor.

The tree work will take place weekdays between 9 a.m. and 3 p.m. and will require a temporary lane closure along the Nutley Street medians between Princeton Terrace and Courthouse Road. SW and from Courthouse Road SW to Roland Street SW. Maintaining a Good Town-County Working Relationship

ne important lesson I have learned in my 14 years on Vienna Town Council is the need for good working relationships with county elected officials. Vienna is surrounded by Fairfax County, a much larger political jurisdiction that has its own priorities, and that dynamic sometimes presents challenges for Vienna. Most have been quietly resolved in large part because of the good working relationship between Town and County through the Hunter Mill District Supervisor's Office.

Over the past 20 years, the Council has worked hard to maintain close working ties to County supervisor Walter Alcorn

and his predecessor, Catherine Hudgins. With many issues, the Council presented clear stances and obtained support of the Hunter Mill District Supervisor which resulted in prompt resolutions. I think it would be useful for residents to know some of these recent ones.

Currently Vienna and the County are partnering in a new library and parking facility. The library portion will be 35% larger than the current Patrick Henry Library. The first rough set of plans presented to Council in June were not well received. Supervisor Alcorn backed the Council concerns and the updated draft plans submitted to the Council in September were significantly better. The project is back on track.

Earlier this year the County proposed to run a 36-inch-high pressure sewer line down the center of Maple Avenue to hook up to a County line in Oakton. This was an effort to get a cheaper sewer rate for Tysons Corner development at a County treatment plant instead of using the regional Blue Plains treatment plant. This project would have resulted in

major disruptions to Maple Avenue and its business community, as well as town residents. The Council said "no way" and were backed up by the Hunter Mill Supervisor. The County then opted to go around the Town.

Our working relationship with Supervisor Alcorn's office has led to some other notable accomplishments for the Town including:

- A waiver of more than \$250,000 in County permitting charges for the new police station.
- Access to millions of dollars in County stormwater fees to fund number of stream restoration and improvements projects in Vienna.
- Completion of several joint Town-County sidewalk projects.

The Town Council has a long history of working closely with our Hunter Mill District Supervisor's Office, and that spirit of cooperation is alive and well today. The collaboration has resulted in very positive outcomes for our community, which enhances the quality of life for all Vienna residents.
