# Business License Deadline March 3

Town businesses are reminded that March 3 is the deadline for payment of the annual business, professional and occupational license (BPOL) tax. All businesses in the Town of Vienna, including home occupations, must renew their business licenses by March 3.

The amount of the tax is based on gross receipts, and the rate varies according to the type of business. The gross receipts threshold is \$50,000, below which the tax does not apply. Those businesses with total annual gross receipts of \$50,000 or less pay only the minimum license fee of \$30 per year.

License tax forms are available in the Finance Department at Town Hall and online at www.ci.venna.va.us. For more information or assistance in figuring license taxes, call 703-255-6321.

# Car Tags Go on Sale March 17

2003 Town of Vienna motor vehicle decals go on sale Monday, March 17, and must be displayed by midnight April 15. Decals may be purchased by mail or in person in the Finance Department at Town Hall. (Military personnel must apply in person.)

Decals cost \$20 for passenger cars and trucks under 4,000 pounds, \$25 for cars and trucks 4,000 pounds and over, and \$10.50 for motorcycles.

Information for pre-printed application forms for 2003 decals was taken from 2002 records; therefore, if your vehicle was not registered in Vienna last year, you will not automatically receive an application form in the mail. Town of Vienna residents do not need to purchase Fairfax County vehicle decals, but they must pay County personal property tax on motor vehicles. For information about personal property tax, call the County Office of Assessments at 703-222-8234 or visit the County web site, *www.fairfaxcounty.gov*.

## **Tax Relief Forms Due April 1**

Both the Town of Vienna and Fairfax County offer real estate tax relief for low-income homeowners who are 65 years old and over, or permanently and totally disabled. To qualify, the following requirements must be met:

- Total household income of \$52,000 or less. This amount excludes \$6,500 of income of relatives, other than the spouse, who reside in the household. Also excluded is \$7,500 of any income received by a disabled homeowner. 100% tax relief is given for total combined income of \$40,000 or less, 50% tax relief between \$40,001 and \$46,000, and 25% tax relief between \$46,001 and \$52,000.
- Total combined assets of no more than \$160,000. This amount excludes the value of the residence, up to one acre of land, and household furnishings.
- Disabled persons applying for the first time must show evidence of disability. In addition to real estate tax relief, Fairfax County provides rental grants and relief from personal property tax for one automobile per household. The Town of Vienna provides all relief recipients one free auto decal.

Both Town and County applications must be filed. Applications for 2003 for all programs are due April 1. This date may be extended to December 31 of the year following the year the application was due for first-time filers or if hardship conditions exist which, through no fault of the applicant, prohibit applying by April 1.

# Are You Registered to Vote In the May 6 Town Election?

Monday, April 7, is the last day to register to vote in the May 6 Town election. You are eligible to register if you are a Vienna resident, at least 18 years old by election day, and a U.S. citizen.

You may register in person in the Fairfax County General Registrar's Office at the County Government Center or by mail. Application forms are available in the Town Clerk's Office at Town Hall, all public libraries and other locations around the county, and applications can also be downloaded from the County web site, <a href="https://www.fairfax.county.gov/goveb/vregis.htm">www.fairfax</a> county.gov/goveb/vregis.htm.

If you are already a registered voter, no additional registration is required for the Town election; however, you should check your voter registration card to be sure it lists your current name and address. Changes may be submitted either by mail (12000 Government Center Pkwy., Suite 323, Fairfax, VA 22035-0081) or by fax (703-324-2205). The notice must include your signature to be valid.

This year, Vienna voters will elect three Town Council members for two-year terms beginning July 1.

## Street Sign Honors Hector Allen

A new street sign has been erected at the intersection of Mill and Cherry Streets, S.E., near the Vienna Community Center in memory of Hector L. Allen, Vienna's Director of Public Works from 1962 to 1982. He also served as Interim Town Manager in 1984 and oversaw the construction of the addition to the Community Center in 1988.

Rev. Craig Burns of the Vienna Assembly of God, where Mr. Allen was a Trustee, requested the Town Council to name the short stretch of Mill Street "Hector Allen Way." Residents will continue to use their official Mill Street addresses. Mr. Allen lived in the townhouses there and served as president of the townhouse association for many years.

#### **JANUARY 6, 2003**

- Approved two-hour restricted parking on the south side of Church St., N.W., Monday through Friday from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m.
- Approved a bid from International Salt Co. for 400 tons of road de-icing salt for the 2002-2003 snow removal season at a price of \$39.23/ton for a total of \$15,692.



# Police Rely on Alert Citizens To Report Suspicious Activities

In late January, more than two dozen homes in southwest Vienna were vandalized by someone who cut their telephone and cable TV lines. A suspect was arrested thanks to a resident who reported the suspicious activity to the police.

Crimes large and small are solved or prevented every day in Vienna thanks to alert citizens who are willing to call the police with their concerns. Please never hesitate to report anything that seems suspicious as soon as it occurs. An officer can be on the scene to investigate often within a matter of seconds.

Neighborhood Watch groups have been organized throughout town and have been successful in reducing crime. Signs posted on neighborhood streets and citizen patrols provide highly visible warnings to lawbreakers. In addition, individual citizens in these areas become more aware of and more willing to report suspicious activities. The active involvement of citizens in safeguarding their homes "hardens" an area against crime and causes burglars and other criminals to seek easier targets elsewhere.

# Motorists Urged to Watch for And Yield to Pedestrians

Your Transportation Safety Commission reminds you that the driver of any vehicle must yield the right-of-way to any pedestrian crossing the street at any marked crosswalk, whether at mid-block or at the end of the block, or at any intersection.

The Code of Virginia states, "The drivers of vehicles entering, crossing, or turning at intersections shall change their course, slow down, or stop if necessary to permit pedestrians to cross such intersections safely and expeditiously. Pedestrians crossing at intersections shall at all times have the right-of-way over vehicles making turns into the highways being crossed by the pedestrians."

Motorists are urged always to be alert to the possible presence of pedestrians, especially when turning right on red, and to yield the right-of-way with courtesy.

Pedestrians must also act responsibly and not disregard approaching traffic. The American Automobile Association offers these safe walking tips:

- Cross only at designated crosswalks and at intersections.
- At signalized crosswalks, cross only on the proper signal.
- Look all ways (not just both ways) before crossing.
- Walk facing traffic where there are no sidewalks.
- Wear reflective material after dark.
- Always watch for cars even when you have the legal right-of-way.

# Water Mains Flushed in Spring

Each spring the Town of Vienna flushes the water mains in its distribution system in order to maintain a high standard of water quality and to ensure proper and efficient operation of the fire hydrants. The preventive maintenance program begins in early April, and flushing usually occurs between 11 p.m. and 5 a.m.

Water mains are flushed by opening the fire hydrants and allowing the water to flow freely for a short period of time. The flushing cleans out sediment that normally accumulates during the summer and winter, and enables the Town to test and perform routine maintenance on the 800+ fire hydrants within its service area.

Flushing may result in some discoloration and the presence of sediment in the water reaching your home or business. These conditions are not harmful and should be of short duration. # Preparedness, Not Panic, Is Key to Coping with Emergencies

Since the events of September 11, 2001, the Vienna Police Department has been working closely with other law enforcement agencies throughout the Washington, D.C., area to share information and recources to combat terrorism. This effort is in concert with numerous federal agencies that are addressing the issue at the national level. Town police have continuous access and contact with the FBI Joint Terrorism Task Force as well as the Anti-terrorism Task Force of the U.S. Attorney's Office for the eastern Division of Virginia. Information continues to be shared at ongoing briefings and through the news media.

Col. Bob Carlisle, Vienna's Chief of Police, advises residents that the best defense to terrorism at the local level is to be alert and observant for suspicious activity and to report it promptly to the Police Department for investigation. He also recommends that citizens familiarize themselves with "Your Guide to Emergency Preparedness," a comprehensive booklet offering detailed information on preparing for emergencies of all kinds, including terrorist threats.

Created through the cooperation of local Northern Virginia governments working together with the Northern Virginia Regional Commission, Your Guide to Emergency Preparedness was distributed last month to *Washington Post* subscribers as an insert in the February 16 issue and mailed to non-subscribers. The guide is also available at all Fairfax County Board of Supervisors offices and at all public libraries. # Pleasant Street Water Main Replacement Underway

A major water main replacement project, now underway on Pleasant Street, will entail several changes to traffic patterns in and around the project area.

The first of these changes will affect access to Pleasant Street, N.W., which will be limited to local traffic only. Church Street will be closed at the Pleasant Street end, and all commercial entrances on Pleasant Street will be closed. Patrons of the businesses in the 100 block of Pleasant Street, the 301 Maple Avenue, W., complex, and the Marco Polo Restaurant building will be required to enter from Maple Avenue or from the Lawyers Road end of Church Street. Church Street between Lawyers Road and Pleasant Street will be opened temporarily to two-way traffic.

Once the project moves to Pleasant Street, S.W., on the other side of Maple Avenue, access there will also be limited to local traffic.

It will be necessary to perform at least two limited shutdowns of the water system in the Pleasant Street area during the project. Notification will be distributed by the contractor, Martin and Gass, 48 hours preceding each shutdown. These will be done during nighttime operations or in a way to cause minimal inconvenience.

# NVRPA Seeks Old Films of W&OD Railroad Days

The staff of the Northern Virginia Regional Park Authority's (NVRPA)
Washington and Old Dominion Railroad
Regional Park is seeking home movies,

Railroad, which once traveled through
Vienna from Alexandria to Bluemont in the
Blue Ridge Mountains.

More than 50 interpretive signs about the railroad's history will be installed along the 45-mile trail this spring. # This Month in History

from the Vienna Newsletter archives

MARCH 1993 – A public meeting will be held March 20 at Patrick Henry Library to discuss construction and renovation plans for the facility. Plans incorporate features recommended by citizens, including maintaining a temporary facility on site during construction, which is expected to last approximately 75 weeks.

MARCH 1983 – At its March 21 meeting, the Town Council will hold a public hearing on a proposed ordinance to regulate video games and other mechanical and electronic game machines. The ordinance would allow game machines in a business provided the building contains at least 1,000 square feet of floor space open to the public and the machines occupy no more than 5% of that area.

MARCH 1973 – The Virginia Department of Highways will hold a public hearing on the proposed widening of Park Street from Maple Avenue to Cedar Lane on March 14. The widening of Park Street is not a new proposal since it was agreed to by a majority of the Town Council in 1966. However, conditions have changed since that time and widening the street to four lanes may now be unnecessary.

Too often, used oil is improperly poured down storm drains or into sewers. Just one quart of oil can pollute 250,000 gallons of water, releasing toxic metals such as lead, cadmium and arsenic into the environment. Recycled oil is a valuable resource that can be re-manufactured into new fuels.

Antifreeze, like oil, can contaminate water and should never be disposed of in drains or sewers. In addition, antifreeze stored around the house presents a great danger to children and pets; it tastes sweet but is deadly poison.

Improper disposal of automobile batteries is a leading cause of lead contamination in landfills and energy recovery facili-
