# Public Hearing January 22 On Proposal to Open Church St.

A public hearing on the proposed opening of Church Street between Lawyers Road and Pleasant Street will be held by the Town Planning Commission on Wednesday, January 22, at 8 p.m. in the Council Chamber at Town Hall. This hearing is pursuant to a Town Council request that both the Planning Commission and Transportation Safety Commission study the impacts on traffic flow and adjacent properties that opening the street might create.

Following the Planning Commission hearing, the matter will be referred to the Transportation Safety Commission to review any safety related problems. The matter will then be returned to the Town Council for consideration. All interested citizens are invited to attend the hearing to express their views about the proposed opening.

At the request of the Planning Commission, the Town's traffic consultant has prepared a technical memorandum that a) estimates traffic volume that will be generated by the Windover Building (the professional office building recently built on the Church Street extension east of Pleasant Street): b) analyzes the need for traffic signals at the Lawyers /Church and Maple Avenue/Pleasant intersections; and c) considers the impact of making Church (Lawyers to Pleasant) and Pleasant (Lovers Lane to Maple) one way or two

The traffic consultant's initial recommendation is that Church Street not be opened until "the street direction and signalization scheme can be integrated into a more comprehensive plan for traffic circulation on the major streets of the community." The report is available for review in the Planning Office at Town Hall.

The question of whether Church Street should be opened was a key

### **Town Recommends Changes** In Metro Feeder Bus Routes

Town residents who plan to ride the bus to the Vienna or Dunn Loring Metro station when they open in June are urged to attend a public hearing at Oakton High School on Thursday, January 16, at 7:30 p.m. The hearing is being held by the Washington Metropolitan Area Transit Authority (WMATA) to receive citizen comment on the proposed changes in bus service and fares to take place when the Metrorail Orange Line is extended from Ballston to Vienna.

### Town Asks for Modifications

At the hearing, Mayor Charles Robinson will present the Town's position in favor of a feeder bus system designed to provide morning and evening rush-hour service to residents in all sections of town. He will oppose WMATA's plan to reduce rush-hour service on the 2X route by decreasing the frequency of buses from 20 to 30 minutes. He will also seek solid assurance from WMATA that 31-foot buses will be assigned to the proposed

Vienna routes. These shorter buses would not impact residential neighborhoods as heavily as the longer buses now in the WMATA fleet.

The Town Council adopted this position at its December 16 meeting based on the recommendations of its traffic consultant, Steven R. Shapiro, who has been working with WMATA, the Fairfax County Office of Transportation. and Town staff in developing the system. Council members hope that as many town residents as possible will attend the hearing and lend their support to Council's decision and recommendation.

To qualify, an applicant's gross household income may not exceed \$15,000 annually, excluding the first \$4,000 of income of each relative other than the spouse residing in the household. In addition, the first \$5,000 of permanent disability compensation may be excluded. The combined financial net worth of applicant and spouse may be no more than \$65,000, excluding the value of the residence and up to one acre of land.

### I-66 Construction Provides Access to Metro

Construction is underway to provide access to the Vienna Metro station parking lots from the west via Route I-66.

This is the first of a two-phase project. A four-lane bridge under the first-phase construction will allow access between the Metro parking lots on either side of I-66. The bridge will also include a sidewalk and a bike path.

During this first phase, the Virginia Department of Highways and Transportation is widening Country Creek Road to connect with an access road provided by Metro. The access roads will link the north and south parking lots to Nutley Street. Eastbound I-66 motorists will have direct access to the parking lots from a ramp under construction tying into the Metro south access road. A ramp north of I-66 will allow motorists to exit from the Metro north parking lots to I-66 west-bound.


Phase two of construction will provide for traffic access to Nutley from I-66 in all directions. Nutley will be widened outside the town limits from four lanes to six and will be relocated westward to line up with existing Nutley Street on the south side of Lee Highway.

# Pets Need Special Winter Care

Your Town Animal Warden reminds residents that pets need special protection at this time of year.

If your dog spends most of the day outdoors, build him a draft-free, water-tight doghouse of the proper size. It should be no more than 12 inches longer and 3 inches higher than the standing dog, because he cannot produce enough body heat to warm a house that is too large. The house should be raised off the ground and insulated. Avoid blankets, rugs and towels that hold moisture and freeze in the cold.

Plans for a doghouse are available free from the Fairfax County Animal Shelter. Send a stamped, self-addressed envelope to the shelter, 4500 W. Ox Rd., Fairfax, VA 22030.

Shorter daylight hours cause an increase in the number of animals hit by cars. Many are hit during rush-hour traffic, which now begins and ends in darkness. Drivers whose visibility may be impaired by the rising or setting sun often never see an animal wander into the road until it is too late

to stop. For the sake of your pet and the driver, confine your pet at home or walk him on a leash.

Antifreeze is deadly to pets. Be sure to dispose of old or unused antifreeze properly and thoroughly wash down any area where it has spilled. Cats and dogs are attracted to the liquid's sweet taste, and even a few licks can kill an animal.

Does your pet have a current rabies vaccination? A low-cost vaccination clinic for dogs and cats will be held at the County Animal Shelter on February 23. Look for details in next month's Newsletter.

# **Used Motor Oil Is Recyclable**

Residents who change their own car oil can dispose of used oil properly at full-service gas stations in Vienna identified by the used oil logo. These stations will accept waste oil in metal containers or clean plastic jugs.

For a list of participating service stations, call the Fairfax County Office of Energy at 691-2315.

Fairfax County began the oil recycling program over six years ago in cooperation with the Northern Virginia Service Station Dealers Association and the Virginia Office of Energy Services. The program allows used oil to be re-refined or reprocessed into heating or quality motor oil, cr used as stock for other petroleum-based products.

streams, sewers, or placed in trash cans can eventually pollute water supplies. It is estimated that over 4.4 million gallons of waste oil are disposed of improperly each year in Virginia — 200,000 gallons in Fairfax County alone. As little as one quart of oil, when dispersed in water, can contaminate up to two million gallons of drinking water.

Dumping oil on vacant land or in storm sewers is illegal, and violators can be held liable for the cost of cleanup and be subject to civic penalties. Don't waste a dwindling resource — recycle.

element in negotiations during 1972 for placement of the Post Office near the Lawyers/Church intersection. In 1975, the Town Manager was authorized to proceed with acquisition of the necessary right-of-way for the extension of Church Street from Lawyers to Pleasant. In July 1976, the Planning Commission and Transportation Safety Commission jointly recommended to the Town Council that, under stipulated conditions and restrictions. Church Street be extended from the Post Office property line to Pleasant Street. Council subsequently decided not to complete the extension.

### Permit Parking Back on Agenda

The proposed residential permit parking ordinance will be back on the agenda at the January 6 Town Council meeting. The meeting will begin at 8 p.m. at Town Hall.

The ordinance has been redrafted to incorporate comments received from citizens at the October 21 public hearing. Copies of the ordinance are available in the Town Clerk's office.

If adopted, the ordinance would allow streets to be designated for permit parking in order to eliminate commuter parking and preserve the residential character of the neighborhood. All parking would be prohibited during set weekday hours, except for the residents, their guests, and others having business there, who would be issued parking permits by the Town.

To qualify for permit parking, 75% of the parking space on a street must be occupied by commuter vehicles on weekdays, and average over 25% during a month. A public hearing would be required before any street could be designated for permit parking.

# Stay Warm and Safe This Winter

In an attempt to stay warm, many people unintentionally cause fires in their homes. Be sure that any device you use for alternative heating is safe. If there is any question, have the device checked by a manufacturer's approved service company. Buy and use only those devices that are listed by testing laboratories such as Factory Mutual or Underwriters Laboratories. Use only as described in the manufacturer's instructions.

Space heaters and wood stoves need space. Keep anything that will burn at least 36 inches away from these devices. This includes furniture, curtains, clothing — and people.

If you plan to use a fireplace or

wood stove, have the chimney inspected at least once each heating season and have it cleaned if necessary. Many winter fires are caused by an accumulation of creosote in the chimney or from having too hot a fire for too long. The latter is a result of trying to heat the whole house, instead of one room, with a fireplace or wood stove.

ington, D.C. 20001, or call 962-1092. Each speaker will be limited to five minutes.

Under the bus routing proposed by WMATA in the public hearing docket, residents in the town and immediate vicinity would be provided service to Metro stations via a 2X/2P route to run between the Dunn Loring and Vienna stations. The Town is recommending modifications of this routing that would maintain service to areas in the WMATA proposal, but would add service to the Beulah Road and Westbriar areas. In both the WMATA and Town proposals, the 2C route would provide all-day service between Tysons Corner and the Ballston station. (The 2X/ 2P will provide rush-hour service only.) The Chain Bridge Road Line (Routes 5K, L,M) will provide service to the Rosslyn and Farragut Square stations.


### **Proposals Subject to Change**

As stated in the WMATA docket, the various route and fare proposals are not final "and are subject to change in response to testimony received during the WMATA public hearing process and local jurisdiction review." It is for this reason that the Town Council feels it is so important for Vienna residents to make their views known during the hearing process. (The hearing at Oakton High School is the closest to Vienna; others will be held in Falls Church and Reston.)

The complete docket for service changes and fare adjustments to complement extension of the Orange Line to Vienna may be examined in the Planning Office at Town Hall. Maps of the routes proposed by WMATA and the Town's proposed modifications of those routes are also available for review.

#### **Bus Service Critical**

Feeder bus service to the two Metro stations is a critical feature of the Town traffic study, which began last summer. Council assigned planning for this service as the traffic consultant's first and highest priority task.

with the conviction that an efficient feeder bus system for the town is indispensible to help ease traffic congestion when the Metro stations open. As part of that planning, the Town conducted a feeder bus survey through the November Newsletter. The results indicated widespread resident interest in bus service, principally to the Vienna station. Slightly more than 60% of respondents who plan to ride Metrorail to work said they would ride a feeder bus to either the Vienna or Dunn Loring station.

The award, presented annually by the American Automobile Association and the State Division of Motor Vehicles, recognizes jurisdictions throughout Virginia that have had no pedestrian deaths in which the driver was charged. Vienna's award was for four years without such a pedestrian fatality.
