Town Councilman E. Ross Buckley has announced that he will not run for reelection in May. He is retiring from the Council after 10 years service.



# TOWN COUNCIL ACTION

#### December 16, 1986

 Waived the masonry wall required between Vienna Park Condominiums and the adjacent single-family residential area. In place of the wall, the condo owner is to install and maintain an eight-foot high wooden fence.

Approved a request for screening in lieu of a wall between the condos and Cedar Park Shopping Center provided that the tree line is extended to Patrick Street.

- · Accepted the Town traffic consultant's report on bus service to the Vienna and Dunn Loring Metrorail stations, including the following recommendations:
- The Town should ask the Washington Metropolitan Area Transit Authority (WMATA) to implement a "full service alternative" route to serve all sections of town with 20minute headways, and the Town should make the necessary street improvements to complement this plan.
- If, after six months, ridership from the Westwood area is substantially lower than anticipated, service should be shifted to an "intermediate service proposal" (eliminating the loop around the country club), still with a 20-minute frequency between buses.
- The Town should reexamine the need for four-way stop signs on Nutley Street west of Maple Avenue. Elimination of several of the signs could save time on the bus trip to and from the station.
- If possible, a private group should be found to totally subsidize the cost of bus service for the first two to four weeks of operation in order to estimate potential ridership and get people into the habit of riding the bus.
- The Town should encourage WMATA and Fairfax County to review the fare structure to decrease the cost of the combined Metrobus/Metrorail trip, and should also encourage the development of supplementary transit services provided by private companies.

(Subsequent to this Council action, residents of the Westbriar area expressed substantial opposition to pus service through their neighborhood. Accordingly, at a WMATA public hearing on January 16, the Town recommended that the intermediate service proposal be implemented. Instead of traveling around the golf course, buses would be routed from Follin Lane to Beulah Road via East Street and Creek Crossing Road.)

## Residents May Petition Now To Have Permit Parking

Vienna's residential permit parking ordinance is now in effect. This ordinance, designed to discourage commuter parking on town streets, especially in the vicinity of the Vienna Metro Station, was adopted by the Town Council at its January 6 meeting.

Residents experiencing commuter parking problems may petition Council to designate their streets for permit parking. Public hearings will be held on all petitions.

Streets designated for permit parking will be restricted during certain hours on weekdays, except for the residents. their guests, and others having business there, who will be issued parking permits by the Vienna Police Department.

Interested citizens may obtain copies of the permit parking ordinance in the Town Clerk's office at Town Hall.

## Paper Pickup **Earns Revenue**

For the first half of this fiscal year. July - December 1985, Vienna's newspaper pickup program generated 422 tons of paper, for which the Town received \$10,545. In addition, by hauling newspaper to the recycling center at Tysons Corner instead of the Fairfax County landfill, the Town saved over \$7,000 in disposal costs.

Vienna's newspaper pickup program was the first in Northern Virginia. Town ordinance prohibits mixing newspapers with other trash in order to encourage conservation of this natural resource.

Residents are asked to save their newspapers and place them at the curbside biweekly for pickup by the Department of Public Works. Newspaper pickup days are listed in the Newsletter and Town Calendar.

Newspapers should be tied in bundles or put in paper (not plastic) bags for pickup. Magazines, telephone directories and similar items are not recyclable and should not be mixed in with newspapers.

## Tax Help for Senior Citizens

Senior citizens in Vienna may obtain free assistance with their federal and state income tax returns beginning February 1 through April 15. This service is sponsored by the Vienna chapter of the American Association of Retired Persons (AARP) and the Internal Revenue Service.

A team of volunteer AARP consultants will be available Tuesdays and Saturdays (except for Saturday, March 1) from 9 a.m. to noon in the Senior Lounge at the Vienna Community Center. No appointment is necessary. In addition, tax assistance will be available on Wednesdays from 9 a.m. to noon in the Tysons Towers Library, 8500 Tyspring Dr.

Senior citizens will be able to get answers to questions, obtain proper forms, have filled-in returns checked, or have returns completely prepared by one of the AARP tax consultants. Participants should bring all pertinent tax data with them, and preferably a copy of last year's return. It is also important to provide Social Security information, as a part of this income may be taxable for a small number of recipients.

marked \$450,000 in bond funds for the project.

The current proposed building design shown in this Newsletter is a composite of earlier proposals and input from public hearings, a citizens advisory committee, and Town Council work sessions. The main floor of the addition would be 7,161 square feet and include a multipurpose room with a stage and seating capacity of over 200. There would be backstage dressing rooms and a loading platform, a lobby area with restroom facilities, office space, and a ramp connecting the new addition to the lower level of the existing building.

Also planned is a large (over 1,000 square feet) storage and machine room underneath the stage. If funding and conditions permit, this lower level may be expanded to a full basement of some 3,500 square feet, providing more meeting and activity space.

The Town Council will soon announce the date of a public hearing to present the final proposed building design. The architectural firm of Peake and Howell could then be authorized to proceed with detailed designs, construction drawings, and bid documents. If the remaining phases of the design and bidding are completed on a timely basis, construction could begin before fall.

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## Fire Deaths Prompt Battery for Life Program

In response to the tragic loss of life in a fire on Commons Drive, N.W., last month, which might have been prevented if the smoke detectors in the home had been equipped with batteries, the Fairfax County Fire and Rescue Department has initiated a "Battery for Life" program in Vienna.

Any town resident who makes an appointment for a home safety check will receive, free of charge, a spare battery for each smoke detector in the home. The batteries will be de-

livered by the firefighter who makes the home safety check. For an appointment, call 691-3366 or 691-4385.

"The Department has worked hard to convince people of the importance of smoke detectors, which do save lives," said County Fire Chief Warren Isman. "We will now make every attempt to convince them to keep the smoke detectors working, even if it means providing the batteries ourselves to save lives."

The Vienna Town Council has endorsed the Battery for Life program and urges all households in Vienna to support the County Fire and Res-

cue Department and the Vienna Volunteer Fire Department in making certain that all residential smoke detectors are operable.

In addition to replacing batteries when necessary, smoke detector maintenance should include monthly testing using the test method in the manufacturer's instructions. Clean your detectors monthly by gently vacuuming to remove dust and cobwebs and allow air flow through the vents.

Your risk of dying from a fire in the home is cut in half when you install and properly maintain smoke detectors.

## Smoke Detectors

All residential buildings sold, leased or rented in Fairfax County after March 1, 1985, are required to have working smoke detectors near bedrooms and in basements.

Owners of single-family homes, townhouses, apartments and condominiums, or the owner's agent, are required to maintain smoke detectors in good working order. Tenants are responsible for reasonable care of all detectors, including change of battery when necessary and interim testing, and must provide written notice to the owner or agent for repair of malfunctioning detectors.

Questions and complaints concerning this requirement for smoke detectors should be directed to the County Building Inspections Branch at 691-2748.

A MESSAGE TO THE RESIDENTS OF VIENNA:

As many of you are aware, we have seen a very tragic year of town history. We have witnessed the loss of life of five of our fellow citizens and very serious burn injuries to another. We have witnessed the devastation and the emotional impact of this loss of life and property by fire. This past year has, by far, been the darkest and most destructive that I have known in the years that I have been associated with the Vienna Volunteer Fire Department.

I feel that the Town's cleanup program has very effectively eliminated many fire hazards within our homes. I feel that our efforts and those of the Fairfax County Fire and Rescue Department in fire prevention and public fire safety education have vastly improved in recent years.

I look back, though, and I wonder if our efforts in the Fire Department have really had the impact we hoped for, and have they been accepted by all of our citizens.

We in the Vienna Volunteer Fire Department will no longer take a somewhat passive approach and attitude, hoping that citizens will listen and heed our messages. I, as Chief of the Vienna Volunteer Fire Department, recommit and rededicate our members, our efforts, and our resources to a very active fire safety education program. You will hear our knock on your door, you will hear your telephone ring, and you will see and hear us while you are out shopping in our further efforts to assist you in placing fire safety as the top priority of life.

This silent enemy, fire, must no longer be allowed to sneak in and destroy us, our loved ones, or our property. I implore you, don't bet your life on malfunctioning smoke detectors, or careless use of flammable liquids, or defective electrical equipment, or matches left where children can get them, and, most of all, lack of common sense of fire safety.

On behalf of the Vienna Volunteer Fire Department, I hereby challenge our citizens to look, listen, learn, and to heed the messages of fire safety and to make this our top priority of life.
