Fellow Citizens of Vienna:

A few weeks ago, in Richmond, I was privileged to receive, as your Mayor, a Pedestrian Safety Achievement Award from Governor Godwin. The award, made annually to municipalities in the Commonwealth with no pedestrian fatalities during the year, was our 10th consecutive award.

I was proud to accept it in behalf of all the citizens of Vienna. Most importantly, however, I am deeply thankful that our town has been spared the anguish of such a tragedy.

Receiving this award indicates a spirit of cooperation, planning and team work on the part of the citizens, our police department, and municipal officials. However, we cannot "rest on our laurels".

Speeding and careless driving (including motor scooters and bicycles) is not unknown in Vienna, as a visit to our traffic court would make clear. We have been fortunate in that these violations have not resulted in serious bodily injury or fatality.

With our children again traveling to and from school, with darkness coming earlier each evening, and the hazards of the approaching "winter weather", we must all give more attention to our pedestrian and driving habits.

I urge all of you, whether driving a car, a motor scooter, or riding a bicycle, to be safety conscious every minute of every day. Traffic safety is a civic responsibility of us all.

FALL CLEAN-UP WEEK

The annual Fall Clean-Up Week has been scheduled for the week of November 13th through the 18th, and will coincide with regular trash pickups. Discarded household and yard items should be placed at the curb line on regular trash days. During Clean-Up Week, the Town trash crews will pick up household articles and yard debris which normally would require a "special pickup".

LEAF REMOVAL

If enough leaves have fallen to justify putting the leaf removal equipment into use by the end of October, leaf removal crews will begin on October 30th, in the northwest section of Town, and will follow the regular trash pickup schedule. Leaf removal will continue through Clean-Up Week. Leaves should be raked to the curb or ditch line. Care should be taken, however, not to rake leaves into the curbs or ditches since a heavy rain could wash them into the storm sewers and cause clogging. Leaf removal crews will work clock-wise around the Town, beginning again at the northwest corner once a complete sweep of the Town has been accomplished.

CHRISTMAS PROGRAM

The official opening of the Town's Christmas Season will be marked by a special program at the Community Center on Sunday afternoon, December 3rd, at 3:00 p.m.

The program, designed to enhance the community spirit of Christmas, and to emphasize the spirit and lasting values of the Christmas Season, will include Christmas music and a program in keeping with the Religious aspects of the season.

All residents of Vienna are cordially invited to attend. A special surprise for the younger citizens is anticipated.

Since the new Community Center addition will, in all probability, not be completed and furnished at the time of the Christmas Program, a special Open House is being planned for January. Vienna residents will receive notification when the date is determined, and will have an opportunity to visit the Community Center for an informal tour of the new facilities we have all been waiting for.

William Saroyan's "THE BEAUTIFUL PEOPLE", will be the Fall Production of the Vienna-Oakton Hamsters on the nights of November 2, 3, and 4. Directed by Florence Mishkin, and produced by Mary Jones, the play will be presented at the Community Center "in the round". Gurtain time is 8:00 p.m., and tickets are available at the Community Center, through any member of the Vienna-Oakton Hamsters, or may be purchased at the door on any of the three nights. Prices are \$1.50 for adults, and \$.75 for students. A children's play, to be announced later, will be presented in February.

FALL RECREATION PROGRAM

Roller Skating. Regularly, on Saturdays, at the Community Center. Ages 6-12, from 9:30 to 11:30 a.m., and from 11:30 to 1:00 p.m. Teen skating will be scheduled from 1:30 to 3:00 p.m.

Men's Activity Night. Wednesday evenings, from 8:00 to 9:30 p.m. Activities include volleyball, badminton, basketball and ping-pong.

Teen Dances. Regularly scheduled during the school term on non-school nights. Dates and hours posted at the Community Center and in the schools.

Rifle Shooting. The Vienna Police Department and the Department of Parks and Recreation will jointly sponsor a program of rifle shooting for boys and girls, ages 12-18, beginning in the Spring of 1968. The program will be divided into Junior and Senior divisions. The Junior division will consist of students who have had some previous instruction and experience with a rifle. The Senior Division is for those between ages 12-18 who are certified marksmen or competitive shooters. Both programs will exclude those who have little or no rifle experience. Fee for the program is \$10.00, which covers the cost of instruction, targets and ammunition. Those who desire to do so may purchase ammunition of their own choice at personal cost. No Magnum or center fire cartridges will be permitted. Those interested and qualifying may register at the Community Center.

I.D. Cards. All children changing school level will be required to obtain a new I.D. Card to the Community Center. Issuing of cards will begin November 4th. Any students new in Town may also register at this time.

"AWARENESS IS A WAY OF LIFE!"
