## It's Time for Spring Cleaning

During the annual Spring Cleanup, Vienna residents place unwanted furniture, appliances, building materials, brush and other discards at the curbside for free pickup by the Public Works Department.

The 1986 Spring Cleanup will be conducted this month and next according to the schedule shown below.

### 1986 SPRING CLEANUP SCHEDULE

Quadrant	Starting Date
Southwest	April 14
Northwest	April 30
Northeast	May 8
Southeast	May 16

(Adverse weather or equipment breakdown may result in minor schedule adjustments.)

Discards may be placed at the curbside for pickup up to one week prior to the starting date for each quadrant. To help keep the town looking as attractive as possible during the Cleanup, please follow the schedule above and do not set out discards too soon.

Because Cleanup crews comprise the same personnel who perform street maintenance and other public works jobs, there is time for only one Cleanup sweep through each quadrant of town. Once a section has been covered, crews cannot double back.

### CLEANUP REGULATIONS

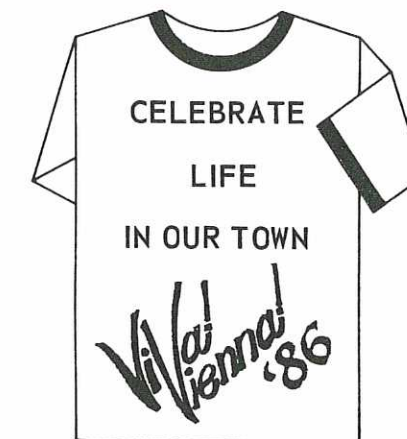
- Each residence is limited to 300

pounds of concrete per Cleanup.

- Scrap metal is also limited to 300 pounds per residence per Cleanup. Whole automobile bodies will not be removed.

- Only two major appliances may be discarded per residence per Cleanup. These include stoves, dishwashers, refrigerators, washers, driers, hot water heaters, air conditioners, and furnaces.

## County Schedules Public Hearings On Land Use Near Vienna Metro

The Fairfax County Planning Commission and Board of Supervisors have scheduled public hearings on proposals to rezone more than 180 acres of land around the Vienna Metro Station to high-density commercial and apartment use. Hearings will also be held on amendments to the County Comprehensive Plan, which would be required before such rezonings could be granted. The public hearing schedule is shown here.

Of greatest concern to the Vienna Town Council and town citizens is the proposal by the Hazel-Peterson Company to rezone 61 acres located be-

employment and entertainment development, providing 1.9 million square feet of commercial and retail space, a 200-room hotel, and 1,000 dwelling units, with building heights to 20 stories. The land use mix would be 60% commercial/retail and 40% residential.

The Town Council has steadfastly expressed opposition to development of this site at the height and density requested because of the adverse impact on the Vienna community that would be a consequence of such rezoning. Citizens are urged to attend the hearings on both the Comprehensive Plan amendments and the Hazel-

# May 6 Is Town of Vienna Election Day

The annual Town election will be held on Tuesday, May 6. This year, voters will elect the Mayor and three Town Council members for two-year terms beginning July 1.

## For Mayor

Charles A. Robinson, Jr., is unopposed for a sixth term as Mayor. First elected to the Town Council in 1962, he was previously a member of the Board of Zoning Appeals and the Planning Commission. He is a past president of the Virginia Municipal League. Mayor Robinson is an attorney in Vienna and Deputy General Manager of the National Rural Electric Cooperative Association. He has lived in Vienna for 35 years at 124 Courthouse Rd., S.W.

## For Town Council

Mary Jane Cronin was a Town Council candidate last year. She is a research analyst for the Administration on Aging and has worked in several other federal human services programs. An original board member of Voters for a Better Community, she also chaired its Issues Committee. She has been a volunteer in girls' softball, Little League, and other community activities. She lives at 109 James Dr., S.W., and has been a town resident since 1961.

Lucille C. Gasparine also ran for Town Council last year. She has been a Vienna resident since 1973 and lives at 301 Patrick St., S.W. She is a flight attendant with United Airlines and also a realtor in Vienna. She belongs to the Northern Virginia Board of Realtors, League of Women Voters, Fairfax Hospital Association, and other professional and service groups.

George E. Lovelace is completing his second term on the Council. He was previously chairman of the Town Planning Commission and a member of the Fairfax County Planning Commission. A former president of the Malcolm-Windover Heights Civic Association, he was a founding member of its Neighborhood Watch program. A retired Army officer, he is now an engineer with Computer Sciences Corp. He has lived in Vienna for 11 years at 425 West St., N.W.

Vincent J. Olson has served 10 years on the Town Council. Prior to his election in 1976, he was a member of the Planning Commission. While on Council, he has been liaison to the Fairfax County School Board for several years and a member of a variety of special committees. A distributor for the *Washington Post*, he lives at 603 Valley Dr., and has been a Vienna resident for 28 years.

Martha H. Pruett has announced that she is a write-in candidate for Town Council. She has served on the Planning Commission for many years, including two terms as chairman, and was a member of the committee that drafted

the Town's residential permit parking ordinance. She belongs to a number of Vienna service organizations and is president of the Southwest Citizens Association. A town resident for 33 years, she lives at 514 Kibler Circle, S.W.

The candidates have shown their concern for Vienna by seeking public office. Please show your interest by voting on May 6. All voting will take place at the Vienna Community Center from 6 a.m. to 7 p.m. Election results may be heard on the Vienna Newsline, 938-4499, one to two hours after the polls close.

## Town Council Action

### FEBRUARY 24, 1986

- Set April 21 as the date for a public hearing on a petition to designate portions of Tapawingo Road and Meadow Lane, S.W., as a residential permit parking zone.
- Requested the Transportation Safety Commission to study the Windover Avenue/Lewis Street intersection and make a recommendation on the need for a four-way stop there.
- Requested the Town/Business Liaison Committee to re-examine the Regional/Urban Development Assistance Team program and develop a clearer definition of issues to be studied and also seek a demonstration of interest to participate in the program from all facets of the community.
- Waived the required wall for the parking lot at Virginia Concrete Company, provided that no additional parking lot is paved and the use is not changed.
- Approved the request by Vienna Baptist Church for 45% lot coverage instead of the 25% allowed and to permit the parking lot along Ware Street to be 12 feet from the side property line in lieu of the required 25 feet.
- Requested the Town Manager and staff to set a public hearing at the earliest possible date on the subject of the Moorefield house and its future. Prior to the hearing, general estimates are to be obtained on the cost to weatherize the structure, including reroofing and replacing doors and windows.
- Directed that the name of W. Gordon Brady be removed from the list of officials having access to Town bank accounts and safe deposit boxes.
- Designated the Town Manager as interim Town Treasurer.

### MARCH 3, 1986

- Concluded a public hearing on a request to rezone the property at 125 Wade Hampton Dr. and 135 Roland St., S.W. The original request for 19 townhouses was revised to seven townhouses and three single-family homes.

## Permit Parking Public Hearing

The Town Council will conduct a public hearing on the first petition to establish a residential permit parking zone at its regular meeting on Monday, April 21. The meeting will begin at 8 p.m. in the Council Chamber at Town Hall.

The area proposed for designated permit parking is Tapawingo Road from Nutley Street to Ware Street, and Meadow Lane between Kingsley Road and Gibson Drive.

As required by Town ordinance, the Police Department surveyed the area (from January 28 to February 4) to determine the extent of commuter parking. The 700 block of Tapawingo was found to be the most heavily impacted, with 70% commuter vehicles on the north side of the street and 100% on the south side.

If approved as a permit parking zone, weekday parking in the area would be restricted during set hours to the residents, their guests, and others having business there, who would be issued special parking permits by the Town.

▪ Leaves will not be picked up by Cleanup crews. Leaves in plastic bags will be picked up on regular trash collection days.

▪ Brush and branches should be separated from other discards, and all Cleanup items must be kept away from regular trash, fire hydrants, water meters, gas valves, fences and utility poles.

▪ No debris of any kind may be brought in from outside of town for pickup by Cleanup crews.

## Neighborhood Watch Report

Look for the Neighborhood Watch Crime Report every month.

For the first 66 days of 1986, the Vienna Police Department investigated 17 burglaries. Five of these were reported in the southeast section of town, five in the southwest section, six in the northeast, and one in the northwest.

It should be noted that the oldest and one of the most active Neighborhood Watch programs in town is that of the Malcolm-Windover Heights Civic Association in northwest Vienna. The police believe the one burglary reported in that area indicates that Neighborhood Watch is an effective deterrent.

None of the 17 burglaries was reported for Sunday. Two were reported for Monday, four for Tuesday, four for Wednesday, one for Thursday, one for Friday, and five for Saturday. Twelve took place during the daytime, indicating that the burglars waited until the residents had left for the day.

In a number of cases, entry was gained through a window or glass door, and color TV's and VCR's were the only items taken.

Home and business security surveys and engraving of valuables can help protect against burglary. Both services are provided free of charge by the Vienna Police Department. For information, call Officer Johnny Price at 938-4900.

### Sign Vandalism Costs Hundreds

Vandalism and theft of street signs around town cost Vienna taxpayers hundreds of dollars each year. A single sign costs between \$30 and \$60 to replace, depending on the size.

The most tempting targets are the signs bearing people's names, such as James, Lewis, Patrick and Cynthia. The Cynthia Lane sign alone has cost over \$200 to replace several times in the last six months.

Citizens are urged to help prevent this waste of funds by instilling in youngsters a respect for public property and by reporting any suspicious activities in the neighborhood to their neighborhood watch officers or to the police.

Residents are reminded that they do not need to obtain Fairfax County vehicle stickers, but they are required to pay County personal property tax on motor vehicles. Personal property tax returns must be filed with the County Office of Assessments by May 1 each year (and within 30 days after purchasing a vehicle). For information about personal property tax, call 691-2661.

For the convenience of Vienna residents, personal property tax forms are available at Town Hall.

### Storage Tags

Residents having Town storage tags on their vehicles are reminded that those tags expire April 15. To purchase a new tag, you must call the Zoning Office, 938-8000 ext. 266, and make an appointment for the Code Enforcement Officer to inspect your vehicle to make sure it is operable.

"Operable" means that the vehicle will start, go into gear, and move. If a vehicle is not operable, it will be considered a derelict junk vehicle, which is prohibited in the Town of Vienna.

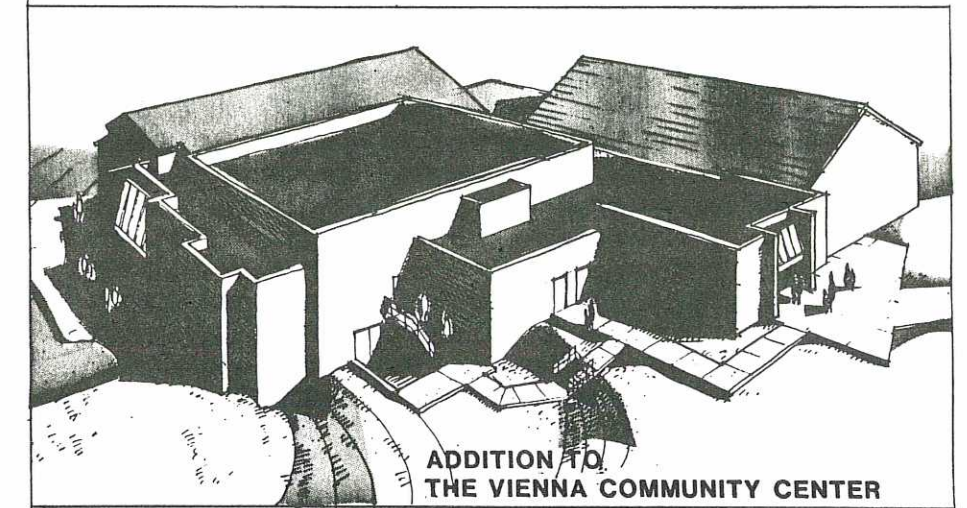

## Final Hearing on Community Center Addition

A final public hearing on the planned addition to the Vienna Community Center will be held on Monday, April 28, beginning at 8 p.m. in the Council Chamber at Town Hall.

Shown here is a sketch of the addition as viewed from Caffi Field. The two doors on the side of the addition will provide outside access to restrooms from the ballfields.

The final proposed design includes a total of 11,469 square feet on two levels. The main floor features a multipurpose room with a stage and seating capacity of over 200 people. A full basement, which will be left unfinished in the initial construction, will provide space for mechanical equipment, storage, and future expansion of meeting and activity rooms.



ring unforeseen delays, is 14 to 16 months.

The estimated total project cost, in-

cluding architectural fees and a 50-car parking lot and other necessary site improvements, is \$883,000. A 10% contingency and price escalation factors are also included in the estimate. Currently available funds total \$639,000 (\$439,000 in bond funds plus a \$200,000 donation from Fairfax County). The extra \$244,000 would come from interest earned on the County contribution, other bond and general revenue funds, and community donations.
