- Approved a request to rezone the property at 135 Wade Hampton Dr. and 125 Roland St., S.W., from RS-16 single-family residential to RS-12.5 single-family residential and RTH townhouses, with 15 proffers. Waived the brick wall between proposed lots 3 and 4 and the sidewalk along the north side of the proposed street. Curb, gutter and sidewalk on Wade Hampton are not to be built, but the money is to be put in escrow.
- Approved the final plat of Park Woods Subdivision, 1000 block of Park Street, S.E.
- Adopted a resolution expressing support for a revised plan to rezone 8.6 acres just outside of town bounded by Creek Crossing Road, Wolftrap Creek and Nelson Drive. The revised plan eliminates the connection between Nelson and Creek Crossing, increases the average lot size, and reduces by one the total number of lots.
- Referred to the Planning Commission a request that the fence to be erected between 109 Patrick St., S.E., and the Vienna Park Condominiums not extend past the front of the house.
- Approved the final plat of Cunningham Park Court Subdivision, 900 block of Park Street, S.E., conditioned on the developer securing all necessary easements.

Arthur E. Kimberly

Arthur E. Kimberly, a member of the Town Planning Commission, died on April 5. He moved to Vienna 15 years ago following his retirement from the c.S. Air Force.

Col. Kimberly was first appointed to the Planning Commission in 1977 and served as its chairman in 1983 and 1984. He was also an active member of the Vienna Wireless Society.

In addition to his 30-year military career, Col. Kimberly was former chief of the National Archives' repair and preservation division. He is credited with designing the case in the National Archives building that holds the original U.S. Constitution and Declaration of Independence.

Metro Feeder Bus Service Begins June 22

A feeder bus system through town to the Vienna and Dunn Loring Metro stations will begin operating June 22.

The system has been approved by the Washington Metropolitan Area Transit Authority (WMATA) and the Fairfax County Board of Supervisors. The Vienna Town Council and Town staff, with assistance from the Town's traffic consultant, participated in planning of routes through town.

As shown on the map, the new Route 2X/2P will operate between the Dunn Loring and Vienna Metro stations. Feeder buses will run only during rush hours (6-9 a.m. and 3-6:30 p.m.) with about six trips during each period. Buses will operate on a 30-minute frequency. Fares will be 80¢ for a oneway trip, or \$1.25 for a round trip with a Metrorail transfer.

Route 2C will continue to provide all-day service between Tysons Corner and the Ballston station, with a stop at the Dunn Loring station.

In the morning, the 2X will start at the Dunn Loring station and be routed along Electric Avenue/Follin Lane to serve employment centers in the Vienna Technology Park. It will proceed west on Maple Avenue to East Street, Ayr Hill Avenue, Beulah Road, Broadleaf Drive, and Glyndon Street back to Maple. Then it will run out Lawyers Road to Malcolm Road and back down Nutley Street to the Vienna station. As Route 2P, the bus will return to the Dunn Loring station via Nutley. Tapawingo Road, Cottage Street, Moore Avenue, and Park Street. These routings will be reversed during evening rush hours.

WMATA will provide 31-foot buses for the feeder bus system. The Town Council has approved the following physical improvements in the town's street system to accommodate these buses: 1) move back the stop bar on southbound East Street at Maple Avenue; 2) prohibit left turns from Maple onto Glyndon Street weekdays from 6 to 9 a.m. to permit the buses to maneuver that intersection; 3) make minor improvements at the Ayr Hill-/Beulah intersection; 4) reconfigure the island at the intersection of Malcolm and Nut-

ley to permit the buses to make that turn.

Residents living within four blocks of the feeder bus route will soon receive information in the mail from Metro on the system, including route descriptions and maps, how to use the automatic fare card system, flash passes, commuter tickets, and the family/tourist pass.

One of Vienna's feeder buses will

be at the opening of the Vienna Metro station on Saturday, June 7. Free demonstration rides on the bus will be offered, as well as free rides on the Metro train. An information booth staffed by Metro sales agents will be open that day to provide timetables and encourage the public to learn more about Metro service.

New Regulations For W&OD Trail

Some new rules for use of the Washington & Old Dominion Trail have been adopted by the Northern Virginia Regional Park Authority.

- Pedestrians have the right-of-way unless otherwise posted.
- Travel only at speeds which are safe and appropriate to trail conditions and usage.
- -No racing or competitive speed training.

- Place trash in receptacles.
- Keep pets on leas and under control at all times.
