Three Town Council Members to Step Down

y this time next year, the Vienna Town Council will be composed of at least three new members. That's because Councilmembers Nisha Patel, Steve Potter and Ed Somers have announced that they will not seek reelection.

Citing ongoing health concerns, Councilmember Steve Potter was the first to announce his decision at the Council meeting on May 1, 2023. He said he remained committed to serving to the fullest for the rest of his term and pledged to weigh in on issues in the future as a town resident.

"When my term ends on Jan. 1 and I start my next chapter of my life, it's a safe bet you'll see me again at that lectern taking three minutes as a concerned citizen to address the latest hot issues facing the Council," he said with a grin.

Councilmember Nisha Patel announced her decision to step down at the June 5 Town Council meeting. Citing competing priorities with family, her medical practice, and other civic endeavors, she said it was time to "pass the baton to some other, new Councilmembers who will take a fresh look at our government and continue to listen to the people and work well with the other Councilmembers."

Councilmember and Mayor Pro Tem Ed Somers formally announced his decision on Facebook on June 11, followed by a formal announcement at the June 12 Town Council meeting.

"Serving as a local elected official while holding down a busy full-time job has been an interesting balancing act," he wrote. "But now, I must increase my focus on some ongoing health matters – both personal and in my family, and I am not one to undertake a venture with anything less than 100 percent effort."

All other members of the Town Council, Mayor Linda Colbert, Chuck Anderson, Ray Brill, and Howard Springsteen have announced that they will seek another term. As of press time, the filing deadline is still open. The full slate of candidates will be announced in the next issue of Vienna Voice.

Council Votes to Tear Down the Annex

iting mounting maintenance costs and significant challenges associated with renovating and maintaining an aging building, the Vienna Town Council voted on June 5 to accept an outside expert's assessment and recommendation to tear down the former Faith Baptist Church building, now known as the Annex, and continue the study for a long-term site use that meets the needs and wishes of the community. The other option considered was to tear down part of the structure on Center Street and retain the gym and supporting spaces.

"This building is at the end of its useful life," said Councilmember Steve Potter during the meeting. "Cost makes it very easy for me to make this decision." "This building is at the end of its useful life"

The cost estimate for tearing down the deteriorating building is approximately \$250,000 while the cost of retaining part of the building and bringing it up to code ranges from \$2.9 million to \$3.3 million. Rather than spend a significant amount of money on an interim use, the Council determined it would be more fiscally responsible to use available resources for long-term options.

The Council's decision comes on the heels of a long-term use study which included significant community input through a public survey and face-to-face meetings. The common themes that emerged from those sessions were wishes for a community fitness center, pool and other recreational gathering space.

No timeline has been set for tearing down the Annex. The next steps are for the Town's contractors to use the community feedback to develop three concepts for the property while the Town Council provides guidance on how to use the property in the interim once the building is removed. The Council will consider those options at a future Town Council meeting. \checkmark

Parking Survey Reveals Resident and Visitor Trends

early 750 people responded to the Town of Vienna's parking survey between January 31 and March 1, 2023. The results reveal some interesting behaviors and preferences from Vienna residents and people who work, shop and visit the town.

- More than 90 percent of those who responded say they drive to their destination versus walking, riding a bike or taking public transportation and their primary destinations are Maple Avenue and Church Street.
- More than 70 percent of the respondents stated they were able to park either on-site or on the same block as their destination the last time they visited Vienna.
- While many believe there is ample free parking in Vienna's commercial corridors, others say they consistently have trouble finding a parking spot near their destination.

Most respondents suggested they would like to park in one location and walk between destinations, but a lack of shared



business parking and concerns about being towed discourage this option. Common themes for parking improvements emerged from the survey, including a parking garage, shared parking, and enhancing the existing active (biking/walking) and public transportation infrastructure. The next steps for the study include engaging with Vienna businesses in the study area and preparing recommendations for Town Council consideration. The Council is expected to get the recommendations by the end of this summer.

Summer of Sweat for Public Works

f you've travelled anywhere in Vienna recently, there's a good chance you've encountered a road project. That's because the Public Works Department is stepping up efforts to repair or repave streets and roads that were rated in poor or very poor condition by an independent survey expert using the Pavement Condition Index (PCI).

"The Town prioritizes repaying projects based on the PCI scale and the timing of other maintenance projects that have an impact on roads, like water main or sewer replacements," said pavement management coordinator, Dione Shillingford. "It's more efficient to take care of all the projects on one street at the same time, and in doing so, we reduce the disruption to our residents' daily lives."

The Public Works Department's "summer of sweat" began in May when crews and the Town's construction contractor addressed roads that were in the worst shape, like Ayr Hill Avenue, NE, and Yeonas Drive, SW, among others. Follin Lane was also on the list for a makeover for quality and safety reasons, including road repaying, pavement markings, new sidewalks, and curbs and gutters on the northwest side of the street. By the time summer ends, more than 15 Vienna streets will be repaved or repaired, bringing them all up to high standards.

"The condition of our roads is a safety and a quality-of-life issue," Shillingford said. "Our resources are limited, but we're doing our best to ensure Vienna's roads lead to a safe, welcoming environment for everyone in our community."

Once the summer road projects are complete, the Public Works Department will reevaluate the town's road infrastructure to see which streets should get priority next year.

The Antidote to Climate Worry - Climate Action

Recent reports indicate that young people are feeling the weight of climate change more than the adults in their lives may realize. Fifty-nine percent of young people surveyed for a recent study reported that they felt "anxious or extremely anxious" about climate change.

Their concerns are grounded in fact, and their feelings have a name: climate anxiety. Described by Harvard University as "distress and anxiety rooted in an uncertain future" climate anxiety can impact mental health in many ways, including chronic stress, irritability, and restlessness.

With rapid-fire news about intense weather events happening more frequently and changing our daily lives, these feelings and symptoms are understandable.

While anxiety about anything isn't usually a good thing, experts have said that in this case, it might be, because it motivates action. Experts say that those who are genuinely worried about the challenges facing the Earth are likely to be the ones taking steps to do something about them.

There are many high-profile role models for climate action, including David Attenborough, Greta Thunberg, Leonardo DiCaprio, and local heroes as well. Students from Madison High and other schools in Vienna are taking steps to reduce energy use, conserve water, recycle and compost and reduce their impact on the Earth. The actions they take in their daily lives, and the work they do to advocate for the planet, provide a helpful starting point for anyone ready to take action for the Earth.

Younger students can learn how to step up their activities through organizations such as the Boy Scouts or Girl Scouts of America, which offer opportunities to learn, earn badges and participate in town cleanups. Older students can join student chapters of national clubs that organize events, trips and other educational opportunities.

Similarly, adults can lean on local chapters of organizations such as www.350.org, the Sierra Club, churches, and the Town of Vienna, which offer opportunities to learn and meet like-minded people. Phone Scam Alert -Artificial Intelligence

Cammers are getting more and more creative these days, and they're now using artificial intelligence (AI) to clone voices! Can you believe it? According to recent reports, the U.S. alone lost around \$2.6 billion dollars to scams in 2022, with everyone from individuals to businesses falling victim to them.

Imagine getting a call from a loved one who sounds just like him or herself but is actually a call generated by a fraudster using AI. All these tech-savvy scammers need is a few voice clips, which can be easily obtained from social media, voicemails, and even YouTube. Once they have these, they use computer programs to duplicate the voice and use it

to target you on an emotional level with AI-generated voice messages that sound like appeals from your own friends or family members. It's a scary thought, and people all over the world are falling for this trick.

So, how can you protect yourself from an AI phone scam? Here are some tips:

- Always be skeptical when a caller asks for money, wire transfers or gift cards even if it sounds like someone you know. If you're in doubt about the legitimacy of a call, hang up and call the person or business back yourself.
- Never surrender credit card or financial information to someone who calls you. Scammers are often physically located overseas, making prosecuting them especially difficult and recovering your money almost impossible.
- Never rely on caller ID, as it can be faked.

Finally, always trust your instincts. If something seems questionable to you, it probably is. Stay safe out there, and don't let these scammers get the best of you!
