Get Ready for Spring Cleanup

The Town's annual Spring Cleanup will be conducted this month and next according to the schedule shown below:

1987 SPRING CLEANUP SCHEDULE

STARTING DATE	QUADRANT
April 13	Northeast
April 20	Northwest
April 27	Southwest
May 11	Southeast

During the Cleanup, residents may place unwanted furniture, appliances, building materials, brush and other debris at the curbside for free pickup by the Public Works Department. To help keep Vienna looking as attractive as possible, please follow the Cleanup schedule and do not set out discards more than a week in advance of the starting date for your quadrant. Those who put out items too soon may be required to remove them or to pay for a special trash pickup.

Because Cleanup crews comprise the same personnel who perform street maintenance and other public works duties, there is time for only one Cleanup sweep through each quadrant of town. Once a quadrant has been covered, crews cannot double back.

CLEANUP REGULATIONS

• Each residence is limited to 300 pounds each of concrete and scrap metal. Whole automobile bodies will not be picked up.

- Leaves will not be picked up by the Cleanup crews. Leaves in plastic bags will be picked up on regular trash collection days.
- Only two major appliances may be discarded per residence. These include stoves, dishwashers, refrigerators, washers, driers, hot water heaters, air conditioners and furnaces.
- No debris may be brought in from outside of town for pickup.
- Brush may be no longer than 10 feet.
- Paint cans and used oil cannot be picked up.
- Residents are asked to separate large plate glass windows and sliding glass doors to assist the Cleanup crews in their safe removal.

Park St. Updatel

A number of residents have inquired recently about the status of the reconstruction of Park Street, S.E.

Last September, the Town Council directed the Town staff to study the project in detail, establish priorities and prepare cost estimates.


In November, the Town Manager and Director of Public Works met with the Urban Engineer of the Virginia Department of Highways and Transportation. New road construction funds are available for this project, and the State is to provide the Town with the updated plans. The State has been requested to approve a 24-foot wide street with additional space at certain intersections to allow for left turns.

When the revised plans are received from the State, they will be reviewed by the Town staff and presented to the Town Council if they are acceptable.

Trim Shrubbery

Property owners are reminded that tree branches, shrubs, vines and hedges are required to be trimmed so that they do not obstruct public rights-ofway.

Don't let branches overhang sidewalks or shrubbery impede the safe and easy passage of pedestrians and bicyclists.







Who Keeps Vienna's Traffic Lights Working?

When a fuse blows in your house, you replace it; then the lights come back on, and everything goes back to normal. But what happens when a traffic light fuse blows? Who replaces that?

In Vienna, blown traffic light fuses are among the responsibilities of Dick Blank, Senior Engineering Aide in the Department of Public Works (DPW). Day or night he may be called on by either DPW or the Police Department to repair a malfunctioning signal at any of Vienna's 11 signalized intersections.

Each intersection signal is operated by a control box. Governing their cycles is a master control box located at the intersection of Nutley Street and West Maple Avenue. It can select one of two rush hour cycles, a normal cycle, or a late night free operation and/ or flash mode.

For most of Vienna's traffic lights, late night operation means being set on flash from 1 to 5 a.m. However, late night drivers know that on West Maple at Nutley and also at Lawyers Road the traffic lights operate all night long. Blank says that these two intersections depend on the traffic detector loops embedded in each lane to tell the control box when a car is at the intersection waiting to go through.

CLOCK CONTROLS TRAFFIC

The movement of traffic through town is controlled by a weekly program drum activated by a time clock. During the day there are three time lengths used for moving traffic in Vienna: an 80-second period for normal traffic, a 100-second period during noon hours and on Saturdays, and a 120-second period for morning and evening rush hours.

The 120-second rush hour cycle is approximately 60% green for Maple Avenue. The control box at each intersection will shorten or lengthen left-turn signal timing to meet traffic turnning demands. A blown fuse at one of these control boxes will also affect the timing at an intersection.



Watching and waiting for a malfunction in each control box is the conflict monitor. This little device instantly switches all the lights in the intersection to flash when a problem develops.

Blank states that the most common problem he finds is a blown fuse. If replacing the fuse does not correct the problem, Blank must track down the source of the trouble. Sometimes he finds it in the operation of another traffic light, or in the operation of the master control box itself.

While Blank repairs or replaces the defective equipment, the intersection's signals are set on flash. When traffic is heavy, a police officer is assigned to direct traffic in the intersection, something that commuter and officer alike dread.

The staff and parents of Vienna Elementary School will host a special rededication of the school on Sunday afternoon, April 26. The ceremony will focus attention on the role of the school in the future of the Vienna community, and the school staff and children will express appreciation to the volunteers who help the school.

An open house to show the completed renewal of the school will be from 2 to 3 p.m. and the rededication ceremony from 3 to 3:30 p.m. followed by refreshments. All students, parents and alumni of Vienna Elementary are invited to attend.

SOME CHANGES AHEAD

Growing traffic levels in Vienna have forced some changes in its network of lights. Nutley Street at West Maple Avenue was recently modified to allow two turn lanes for northbound Nutley. In the coming months, East Maple at Park Street will receive left-turn lights. The Town Council has already okayed this change.

Town Manager John Schoeberlein states that the turn lane signals will be among the improvements to be made this spring to Vienna's traffic lights. In addition, the Town has applied for a grant from the State of Virginia to coordinate the timing of all the Maple Avenue lights.

The Town Council has approved the installation of a new signal at Church Street and Beulah Road. The Town Traffic Study concluded that this new light is one way to improve the safety of this intersection. Schoeberlein anticipates that the State will approve funding and install the light for Vienna upon reaching an agreement with the Town on this project.

Consumer Advice
