At the hearing, citizens will have the opportunity to comment and ask questions about the budget and the appropriation of all Town funds for the fiscal year beginning July 1.

Copies of the proposed budget will be available for public review in the Management Services Office at Town Hall beginning May 11.

TOWN COUNCIL ACTION

MARCH 16, 1987

- Referred to the Planning Commission the revised development plan for Vienna Gateway East, to be known now as Vienna Village.
- Requested the Town Attorney to draft an ordinance soliciting proposals for a franchise to use Town right-of-way for a long-distance communications system. AT&T will be permitted to begin installation of a fiber optic cable along the W&OD Trail subject to receipt and approval of a letter of intent to accept a franchise. The agreement is to include language relative to trees and groundcover and to hold the Town harmless from negligent or accidental damage to the facilities.
- Approved the final plat of the resubdivision of Lot 120, Ayr Hill Subdivision.
- Approved the final plat of Ridgewood Subdivision with the following modifications:
- Conservation easement to be conveyed in fee to the adjoining property owners for landscaping, with right of entry reserved to the developer during construction.
- Variance granted to permit the fence to be constructed to a height of eight feet.
- A portion of the sidewalk on the south side of Ridgewood
 Court to be waived and construction funds placed in escrow.
- Chain of title to include covenant requiring disclosure of property's proximity to the Town pistol range and property yard.

Also approved the request of the Ridgewood Subdivision developers to construct a storm drainage structure across Town owned land, subject to meeting specifications established by the Director of Public Works. A 10-foot easement was granted particularly on Lots 158A and 159E.

- Authorized the Town Manager to commit the Town for 10% of the cost of installing a traffic light at Beulah Road and Church Street.
- Reappointed Jerry Barnett and Marshall Potter to two-year terms on the Planning Commission.
- Adopted an amendment to the Town Code relative to sewers and sewage disposal.
- · Adopted amendments to the flood plain ordinance.

Junk Cars Continuing Problem

Junked and abandoned vehicles are a continuing problem for suburban jurisdictions. The Vienna Town Council, however, gives the Zoning Office and the Police Department broad powers to remove these eyesores.

A major share of these powers belongs to Kevin Lawlor, Vienna's Code Enforcement Officer. A large percentage of his time is spent trying to resolve citizen complaints about junked and abandoned vehicles.

In addition to his caseload of junk vehicles, Lawlor must also enforce zoning laws regarding construction permits, and business and residential occupancy permits. Because of the lengthy procedures required, Lawlor usually carries a caseload of 20 complaints at one time.

How Complaints Are Handled

Lawlor explains that when he gets a complaint of an inoperable vehicle parked on private property, or one with expired registration and inspection, his first step is to find out who owns the vehicle. A letter is then mailed to the owner describing the violation and the applicable sections of the Town Code. This first letter often solves the problem; if not, a second and certified letter is sent.

If the certified letter is not answered within 10 days, Lawlor then laminates a copy of the letter and posts it on the property. When this still does not solve the problem, Lawlor must then obtain a magistrate's warrant summoning the vehicle owner to appear in General District Court. After July 1, however, Lawlor will have the authority to issue his own summons to the vehicle owner. The normal fine for a junk or inoperable vehicle is \$500.

Police Can Tow Vehicles

While the Code Enforcement Officer's last resort is to summon a junked vehicle owner to court, Vienna police officers can tow the car if it is parked on a public roadway for more than 48 hours in one spot. Officers can issue

a tow tag to such an abandoned vehicle, wait 48 hours, and then tow it to an impound lot.

Vienna Police Department general orders also allow officers to tow a vehicle from private property. However, the property owner must submit the request in writing, stating the vehicle has been abandoned for over 10 days, and pay a \$50 fee. Only then may an officer tow the abandoned vehicle.

Rabies Clinic

Low-cost rabies vaccination clinics for dogs and cats will be held on Sunday, May 17, from noon to 2 p.m. at the Fairfax County Animal Shelter, 4500 West Ox Rd. in Fairfax, and the McLean Fire Station, 1440 Chain Bridge Rd. All dogs and cats over six months old are required to be vaccinated.

Vaccine for animals over a year old costs \$6 and gives protection from rabies for three years. Vaccine for animals under a year old costs \$4 and protects for one year.

In bringing animals to the clinic, dogs should be on a leash and cats confined to a box or basket. Certificates will be given to pet owners at the clinic to verify each vaccination. Proof of vaccination is required to obtain a Town dog license.

The greatest source of unwanted cats and dogs is the neighborhood pet allowed the 'freedom' to wander. In a world already steeped in a surplus of pets, this so-called accidental breeding is inexcusable. But injury, loss, abuse, theft and unwanted litters are preventable. Fenced-in yards, leashes, owner supervision, and spaying/neutering of pets work wonders. The owner is responsible for pet protection. Unfortunately, it is the pet that suffers.

All dogs are required to be on a leash when off the owner's property. This includes parks, school grounds and bike paths. All animal bites must be reported to the Police Department, 938-4900.

The Town of Vienna has a limited number of seasonal laborer positions available. These temporary summer positions pay \$4.60 per hour for a 40-hour work week. Positions are open with both the Parks and Recreation Department's Grounds Maintenance crew and in the Public Works Department's General Maintenance Division.
