What's Next for the Annex?

fter an extensive feasibility study and a robust public outreach campaign to gather community input, the Vienna Town Council directed staff to raze the former Faith Baptist Church building and begin planning for future use. With a price tag of more than a million dollars, it was determined to be too costly to bring the existing building, now known as the Annex, up to code for parks and recreation use, and the Council opted instead to start from scratch in accordance with community feedback. Council voted to award a demolition contract at its October 2, 2023, meeting to Berg Corporation.

Before the building can be torn down, the Town's contractor must carefully remove asbestos from the structure's interior. Prior to the 1980s, the material was widely used in building construction. In 1989, The Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) imposed a partial ban on some asbestos-containing products. The EPA also banned new uses of asbestos, effectively preventing new asbestos products from entering the marketplace after Aug. 25, 1989. Environmental experts say when left alone, asbestos has little risk to human health. When asbestos is disturbed or damaged, it can release particles and fibers in the air that have the potential to cause lung cancer and other lung diseases if inhaled.

"The interior walls, attic and floor tiles in the Annex contain some level of asbestos," said Vienna public works engineer David Donahue. "The Town's contractor, Berg Corporation, will remove the building's asbestos-containing material, and the work will be monitored by JSK Environmental, to ensure compliance with EPA and Virginia policy and health safety protocols."

The Annex asbestos removal is expected to take place in November. Once it has been safely removed, the contractor can then proceed with the process to obtain permits to demolish the building. If all goes as planned, Donahue says the building will be torn down by early February, and the ground will be seeded to grow grass by spring. The property's short- and long-term use will be determined later by the Vienna Town Council.

Community Survey Now Open Online

ere's your chance to rate the services you receive from the Town of Vienna government! Thousands of Town households selected in a random sample received an invitation in the mail to respond to this year's National Community Survey in October. Residents who did not receive the anonymous questionnaire in the mail are now invited to participate online at https://polco.us/vienna23. The link will remain open from Monday, Oct. 30 through Sunday, Nov. 13.



The purpose of the community survey is to gauge satisfaction levels on a variety of topics ranging from specific Town services to the overall quality of life. The comprehensive questionnaire is effectively a snapshot of how residents feel about The Town of Vienna and the quality of specific services including public safety, transportation, utilities, education, culture, arts, parks and recreation, and community engagement.

The statistically valid survey was last conducted in Vienna in 2018 and is usually conducted every two years. However, the Town of Vienna's 2020 survey was canceled for pandemic-related reasons. The results of this year's survey will be shared publicly in January and will help the Town Council identify future priorities for the community.



Vienna Streets and Roads Show Improvement

his time last year, a study of Vienna's streets and roads showed that the that only 42 percent met the standard for a satisfactory or good rating using the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers Pavement Condition Index (PCI). Thanks to an infusion of federal and capital improvement funding, the Town was able to step up milling and paving efforts over the past six months. By the end of this year, 55 percent will be rated satisfactory or good, and plans are in the works to prioritize projects involving the remainder of roads, 16 percent of which are in fair condition, and 29 percent of which are in poor or very poor condition.

"Thanks to American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) funds, the Town's budget for paving was increased by approximately \$500,000 this year," said Vienna public works engineer Dave Donahue. "The funding and the availability of qualified contractors has enabled the Town to improve its roads more quickly."

The Town prioritizes repaving projects based on the PCI scale and the timing of other maintenance projects that have an impact on roads, like water main, sewer and other utility replacements. Donahue says it is easier and less costly to bring roads in fair condition up to high standards than roads that have deteriorated to poor condition.

"If we can get to the roads before the PCI rating drops to poor, the new surface will last approximately 20 years," Donahue said. "Roads that are in poor or very poor condition can still be paved or patched, but because the foundations are in rough shape, they are less likely to stand the test of time."

In lean fiscal years, Donahue says paving budgets are often at risk because the impact of deferred maintenance is not seen right away. Over time, as roads deteriorate, it sometimes becomes necessary to dig up the entire road and start from scratch, as the Town recently did on Lynn Street, SW. Nearly two dozen roads including Ayr Hill Avenue, NE; Yeonas Drive, SW; and Follin Lane were milled and paved in the summer and fall, bringing them up to high standards. As this year's projects wrap up, the Vienna Public Works Department will reevaluate Vienna's roads to determine which streets should get priority next year and beyond.

New Safety Signs Prompt Pedestrians to Look



ook around Vienna, and you might see some new "Look" signs reminding pedestrians to make eye contact with drivers before stepping into a crosswalk. The bright yellow signs were put up by volunteers recently as part of an "eye-to-eye" safety campaign sponsored by Vienna's Pedestrian Advisory Committee and Transportation Safety Commission.

The campaign comes on the heels of a new Virginia law requiring drivers to fully stop, not just yield, when pedestrians are crossing. In Virginia, pedestrians were involved in 1,476 traffic crashes last year, including 166 pedestrian deaths. In Fairfax County, 23 pedestrians were killed in vehicle crashes last year, the highest number since statistics started to be regularly collected in 2010.

None of the pedestrian deaths occurred in the Town of Vienna. The campaign aims to keep walkers from becoming a statistic by making eye-to-eye contact with drivers when crossing the street to be sure drivers see them and stop.

For Safety – Establish a 9 p.m. Routine



ost burglaries happen because an opportunity presents itself. For example, you're working in the yard all day, you take a break for dinner, and you decide to turn in for the night – forgetting you left the garage door open. An open door is an open opportunity for thieves to steal your car and anything in your garage.

To reduce your risk of becoming a target, experts recommend implementing a 9 p.m. safety routine every night. The routine entails removing valuable items from

your vehicle and locking the doors, and making sure residential doors, windows, garages, gates and sheds are closed and locked. Also, be sure to secure any valuable items like tools, bikes, and keys to prevent theft, and activate all alarms and security systems and cameras, if you have them. Finally, remember to turn on exterior porch lights to further help deter potential burglars from targeting your property.

A 9 p.m. routine is time well spent. It will not only keep your property and belongings safe; it will also give you peace of mind.

Leave the Leaves: Your Yard Will Thank You

t won't be long before the trees begin to drop their leaves. You can rake them curbside for pickup by Town Public Works crews. But why waste your fallen leaves by sending them away? Instead, you can mow over the leaves or compost them to create a rich, natural compost that will nourish your lawn and enrich your soil. You'll reduce the need for leaf-blowers and avoid having to haul leaves to the curb.

Mowing over the leaves, or mulch-mowing, chops them into small pieces that fall into the grass and decompose quickly without suffocating your lawn. The process is easy, and you or your lawn service can do it.

To start, set your mower at its highest setting and take off the grass catcher. Mow over the leaves to reduce them to dime-size pieces. You'll know

you're done when you can see about half an inch of grass through the mulched leaf layer. You generally can mow over leaves up to 6 inches in depth. The job is easiest when leaves are dry. If they're moist, you may need to mow a second time at a right angle to your first pass to get small-enough pieces.

The nutrients that trees moved into the leaves during the summer will return to the soil in winter. Your grass will green up faster in the spring, and you'll need less fertilizer, which will reduce polluting nutrients in stormwater runoff. After a few years, your lawn will sprout fewer dandelions and less crabgrass, because the leaf bits will cover any bare or thin spots in the lawn where weed seeds would otherwise germinate. Mulch-mowing builds better soil, which will keep more moisture and promote better root development. It won't increase thatch or disease in your lawn, and it has no effect on soil pH.

You can also leave whole leaves under trees, around shrubs and in garden beds, or where space allows, pile them up and let them compost. Many creatures use undisturbed leaf litter for protective habitat and as a place to forage. If leaves haven't broken down in garden beds by spring, move them so that any tender perennials can emerge without difficulty.
