\$10.7 Million Budget Adopted for FY 1987-88

The Town Council has adopted a \$10.7 million budget for fiscal year 1987-88. The new budget, which takes effect on July 1, is based on a real estate tax rate of 31¢ per \$100 of assessed valuation, one cent below last year's rate. Funding is included for continuation of all current Town services as well as improvements in a number of areas, including a new Department of Planning and Zoning with increased personnel, architectural services for the design of a new police headquarters building, a microfiche program to reduce the quantity of records stored at Town Hall, more equipment for snow removal operations, and trash collection on Monday holidays

The water and sewer fund is based on new water rates of \$1.02 per 1,000 gallons for town residents and \$1.35 for out-of-town customers, and a sewer rate for all customers of \$2.10 per 1,000 of water used. This 5% increase is required to keep this fund self-sustaining and cover rising costs for the wholesale purchase of water from Falls Church and other expenses such as a fire flow study, equipment purchases, and debt service costs on the 1987 bond issue. The rates charged Vienna residents are comparable to those in

Town Can Tow

The Town Council has adopted an ordinance empowering the Town to remove inoperative motor vehicles from residential or commercial property if the property owner fails to comply with notice to do so.

The ordinance defines an inoperative vehicle as one "which is not in operating condition, or which for a period of sixty days or longer has been partially or totally disassembled by the removal of tires and wheels, the engine, or other essential parts required for operation of the vehicle or on which there are displayed neither valid license plates nor a valid inspection decal."

Inoperative vehicles may be legally stored only within a fully enclosed garage or other structure.

The cost to remove illegal vehicles by Town forces may be charged to the vehicle owner, or to the owner of the property from which the vehicle is removed and will constitute a lien against the property until paid.

Parking Prohibited

The Town Code prohibits parking of vehicles on any portion of a sidewalk. This includes vehicles parked in driveways that extend out over the sidewalk.

The warm summer weather and long hours of daylight always attract more residents to take a walk. You can add to their enjoyment and safety by taking care not to obstruct the sidewalk. Vienna Woman to Visit USSR

Keven Colbert, a resident of Hillside Circle, S.W., will be a delegate to the Soviet Union in October, together with other women from across the country and wives of members of Congress. Colbert will represent the Northern Virginia chapter of Peace Links, an organization of over 30,000 American women aimed at promoting international understanding as an important aspect of finding alternatives to nuclear war.

Metro Makes Route Changes


On June 22, more bus trips were added to Metrobus Routes 2P, 2X and 2W to connect with Metrorail. Metrobuses are now running every 20 minutes on Routes 2P and 2X and every 15 minutes on Route 2W during the morning and evening rush hours to provide more convenient service for residents who travel to and from the Vienna and Dunn Loring Metrorail stations.


Bargain fares of 25¢ a ride, which were introduced in March, are still being offered to encourage more commuters to take the bus to rail. Fairfax County reduced fares on selected Metrobus routes as a one-year demonstration and will examine the reduced-fare program after six months.

Metrobus Routes 2P and 2X have 17 bus trips scheduled at 20-minute intervals in the morning to the Vienna and Dunn Loring Metrorail stations, with return trips in the evening also operating on a 20-minute schedule. Metrobus Route 2W operates every 15 minutes during the morning and evening rush hours.

When Metrobus service was improved last month, the 2X route was extended to include Malcolm Road and Flint Hill Road, with more frequent service to Mosby's Landing, Berkeley Square and Vienna Oaks. Metrobus Route 2X also serves the Vienna Technology Park, Follin Lane, Maple Avenue and Nutley Street. Bus service on Ayr Hill Avenue has been eliminated due to low ridership. Metrobus Route 2P continues to serve Tapawingo Road, Moore Avenue, Park Street and Dunn Loring Woods.

Improved service on Metrobus Route 2W includes a route extension onto Bushman Drive and more frequent service to the Vistas of Vienna, Concord Village, The Oakton and Summit Square. Buses run every 15 minutes during both rush hour periods and one later trip has been added in the evening. Metrobus Route 2W now serves Oakton, Chain Bridge Road, the AT&T building, White Granite Drive, Bushman Drive and Blake Lane, and connects





with the Vienna Metrorail Station.


Dogs Suffer In Hot Cars

This summer, please don't take your dog with you on that quick shopping trip and leave him in the car. Your 15-minute stop may kill your pet.

Town Animal Warden Tom Burtt, Jr., says most people do not think of the danger to their pets on these short trips. Even a vehicle parked in the shade, with the windows rolled partly down, can become a deathtrap within a matter of minutes. On an 85-degree day, the air inside a car can heat up to 110 degrees within 15 or 20 minutes. Most dogs will receive severe brain damage or die within a very short time at that temperatire. The best thing to do for your pet, even on a mildly warm day is to leave him at home.

Dr. John Holland, an experienced emergency veterinarian, is frequently called upon in the summer to treat pets suffering with heat stroke. He states that only about half of the victims survive, despite sophisticated medical treatment.

When Warden Burtt is called to the scene of a dog locked inside a car on a hot day and believes the animal's life is in severe jeopardy, he can legally remove the suffering animal from the car and take steps to save its life. He can also charge the pet owner with cruelty to animals under State law, the penalties for which are up to a \$1,000 fine and up to one year in jail.

Any fireworks that explode, emit a flame or spark higher than 12 feet or perform as a projectile are prohibited by the Fairfax County Fire Prevention Code.

Although you may purchase many types of fireworks such as fire crackers, cherry bombs and bottle rockets in other areas, they are illegal in Fairfax County.
