## Halloween Parade October 28th

The 41st annual Vienna Halloween Parade will step off at 7 p.m. Wednesday, October 28. The parade theme is "The Blessings of Freedom," in honor of the bicentennial of the U.S. Constitution.

The parade will feature colorful floats, marching bands, military units, antique cars, horses, cartoon characters, and many youth and adult specialty groups.

The parade will begin at Maple Avenue and Branch Road, follow Maple to Courthouse Road, turn left on Courthouse and left again on Locust Street to disband on Waters Field. David Haines, WAVA radio's morning newsmen, will emcee the parade from the VIP reviewing stand on the Southern States parking lot.

Children of all ages are invited to walk in the parade in their Halloween costumes. For safety reasons, CHILDREN MUST BE REGISTERED IN ADVANCE TO PARTICIPATE. Registration will be held in the children's section at Patrick Henry Library on Saturday, October 24, from 11 a.m. to 1 p.m.; Monday, October 26, from 1 to 4 p.m.; and Tuesday, October 27, from 3 to 7 p.m. Children must be accompanied by an adult at registration.

The children's parade route will end at Maple Avenue and Center Street to meet parents. All parents are encouraged to catch the Halloween spirit by dressing in costume and walking with their kids. CHILDREN UNDER AGE SIX MUST BE ACCOMPANIED BY A RESPONSIBLE ADULT.

## Town Council Action

AUGUST 17, 1987

- Approved a donation to the Vienna Stars and Vienna Shamrocks girls softball teams of up to \$500 if needed to meet travel expenses.
- Took no action on a proposal that "white goods" be excluded from the Spring and Fall Cleanups and picked up by appointment for a fee.
- Approved the final plat of Harrell's addition to Section 2, Vienna Woods.
- Approved the landscape plan for Vienna Gateway Center, on condition that the 7" diameter Japanese maple and 16" diameter red maple located on the East Street property line be saved and integrated into the landscape plan and that the developer be required to maintain the landscaping.
- Approved change order #1 to the contract with Pagano Construction Company for the addition to the Vienna Community Center in the amount of \$2,446, to be paid from bond funds.
- Directed that the delinquent real estate tax list be published and recorded with the Fairfax County Treasurer's Office. Liens will be recorded against those properties for which taxes have been delinquent for three years.
- Authorized the following persons for signature authority on all Town bank accounts: John H. Schoeberlein, Town Manager; Carol A. Orndorff, Town Clerk; Philip R. Grant, Director

## Smokeless Kids

For their "first" first day of school, Marshall Road School kindergarteners donned symbolic mortarboard graduation caps and T-shirts to kick off "Smoke-Free 2000," a multifaceted program focusing on the class of 2000 sponsored by the American Heart Association, Northern Virginia Council; American Lung Association of Northern Virginia; and American Cancer Society, Virginia Division.

The event included an address in which the children were challenged to remain nonsmokers until the year 2000. Following their pledge to be smoke free, the pre-schoolers posed for a special graduation picture.

The Smoke-Free 2000 program is a local adaptation of the "Tobacco-Free Young America" project - a cooperative effort of the three voluntary health organizations - to meet U.S. Surgeon General Koop's challenge of creating a smoke-free society by the year 2000. A variety of activities is planned for the coming year, including a survey on youth attitudes toward smoking, a "Why I'll Never Smoke" letter-writing/poster contest, and a Smoke-Free Celebration Day. A poster of the class of 2000 is also being developed for distribution to area elementary schools.

Fire Prevention Week, October 4-10, will focus on home fire escape planning and preparedness. Families will be encouraged to develop and practice a home fire escape plan.

Fairfax County has adopted the theme "Don't Hide About - Plan Two Ways Out" to remind citizens that you do not escape from a fire by accident. You have to plan to escape.

This year marks the 65th anniversary of Fire Prevention Week, which was proclaimed originally by President Warren G. Harding to commemorate the "Great Chicago Fire" of 1871. In that fire, 250 people were killed, 17,400 buildings destroyed, and 100,000 people left homeless.

VVFD Chief Bill Ellis says that in the event of a fire, preparedness is essential to survival, and there are some vital components to include in every home fire escape plan:

- Know two ways out of every room.
- Know how to crawl low in smoke.
- Decide on a place to meet and be accounted for outside the home.
- Know to call the fire department from a neighbor's home.
- Know the number to dial for help - 911.

Playing it safe is important to your family's survival. By planning now, you can help assure that your family will live happily ever after.

In observance of Fire Prevention week, the Vienna Volunteer Fire Department will hold its annual open house on Sunday, October 4, from 11 a.m. to 5 p.m. There will be pamphlets, videos, and displays with information that could save your family's lives. # Follow These Rules for Faster Fall Cleanup

The Fall Cleanup begins October 5 in northeast Vienna. Cleanup crews will then move on to the southwest quadrant on October 9, southeast on October 21, and northwest on October 28.

Residents are reminded not to place Cleanup items at the curbside more than a week prior to the starting date for each quadrant.

During the Cleanup, household discards and debris placed at the curbside will be picked up free of charge by the Public Works Department. Limitations on the amount and type of discards are as follows:

- Each residence is limited to two major appliances per Cleanup and these must be separated from other discards. (Fairfax County now requires stoves, dishwashers, refrigerators, washers, driers, hot water heaters and other major appliances to be separated from other trash before disposal at the County sanitary landfill.)
- Each residence is limited to 300 pounds each of concrete and scrap metal.
- Whole automobile bodies will not be picked up.
- Leaves will not be picked up by Cleanup crews. Leaves in plastic bags will be picked up on regular trash collection days.
- No debris of any kind may be brought in from outside of town for pickup by Cleanup crews.

Please separate brush and branches from other discards, and keep all Cleanup items away from regular trash,

## TRASH, NEWSPAPER PICKUP

Residents are reminded that trash and newspapers should be at the curbside by 7 a.m. on the day of collection. Newspapers should be tied in bundles or placed in paper bags. Please do not use plastic bags or put newspapers in trash cans. Magazines, telephone directories and similar items are not recyclable and should not be mixed in with newspapers.

fire hydrants, water meters, gas valves, fences and utility poles. Residents of corner lots are requested to place discards in front of the property only, not on the side.

Because Cleanup crews comprise the same personnel who perform street maintenance and other public works duties, there is time for only one Cleanup sweep in each quadrant of town. Crews cannot double back along the Cleanup route.

# Get Involved on Town Boards

Membership on Vienna's boards and commissions provides citizens the opportunity to become actively involved in Town affairs. Applications for appointment are available in the Town Clerk's Office at Town Hall, phone 255-6303.

The Town Council usually interviews each applicant and evaluates his or her interests, education, philosophy and work experience according to the functions of the board or commission on which a vacancy exists. Many members of Council believe it is desirable to have all areas of town represented and to encompass diverse philosophies and points of view, although applicants should be in general agreement with Town policies and objectives.

The *Planning Commission* approves preliminary plats of subdivisions, prepares the Comprehensive Plan for the future development of the town, hears and makes recommendations to Council on rezoning requests and other planning and zoning matters.

The *Board of Zoning Appeals* is a quasi-judicial body, the members of which are recommended by Council to the Circuit Court for appointment. The Board is authorized to hear and decide appeals of any decision made by the Department of Planning and Zoning, grant variances from the zoning code, approve conditional use permits and interpret the zoning map.

The *Board of Architectural Review* examines and approves plans for com-

mercial buildings, signs and landscaping to ensure that new construction is not bizarre or garish and is harmonious and compatible with existing buildings. The Board is concerned primarily with the appearance and aesthetic factors in commercial construction, but also considers any construction in residential zones other than single-family housing.

The *Transportation Safety Commission* studies intersections, traffic signs, speed limits and other matters relating to street safety and makes recommendations to Council.

The *Windover Heights Board of Review* approves new construction and major exterior alterations of buildings within the Windover Heights Historic District in northwest Vienna to ensure that they are in keeping with the old and historic architectural aspects of the surroundings. Citizen members of the Board must reside in the historic district.

The *Town/Business Liaison Committee* makes studies and offers recommendations to Council on matters affecting the town's businesses and their relationship with other segments of the community. Both commercial and residential interests are represented on the Committee.

## Schedule Set Up For Leaf Collection

Leaf collection will be conducted on a set schedule this year, alternating between the north and south sides of town during November and December:

North side, November 9-18  
South side, November 19-December 3  
North side, December 4-16  
South side, December 17-31

During this time, Department of Public Works crews will vacuum up piles of leaves that residents rake to the curb-side.

In addition, leaves packed in plastic trash bags will be picked up on regular trash collection days (limit 10 bags per collection).

## Halloween Hints

Gremlins, ghosts, goblins and ghouls will soon be out all over town. Halloween is a festive occasion if celebrated safely.

Traditional Jack-o-Lanterns with candles are a tremendous fire hazard. A better way to light up your Jack-o-Lantern would be to use a small string of Christmas lights with yellow and red flashing bulbs.

If your children are preparing to go trick-or-treating, take these safety precautions:

- Make sure all costumes are flame retardant. Most commercial costumes are made of flame-retardant material, and you should ask your fabric shop for flame-retardant material if you make your own costume.

- Make sure your children can see and be seen. Expand the eye holes in commercial masks to improve peripheral vision. Add reflective tape to costumes to make them more visible to motorists.

- Ensure that each trick-or-treater has a working flashlight.

- Tell the children to remove their masks and look both ways before they cross a street.

joining the City government in 1979, he worked as a planner and cartographer for two consulting firms, where he participated in downtown revitalization studies, citizen input workshops, preparation of comprehensive plans and other projects.

He received a master's degree in urban planning and cartography from the University of Kansas and is a member of the American Planning Association, the Urban Land Institute and the Association of American Geographers.

Hembree was chosen from among some 70 applicants nationwide. His first day on the job in Vienna will be October 8.

The new Department of Planning and Zoning was created to provide improved analysis of new developments and proposals for redevelopment and to strengthen enforcement of existing zoning regulations. This department also serves as advisor and staff support to a number of Town boards and commissions.

As Director, Hembree will coordinate the operations of the department and lend expertise to both the planning and zoning functions. His staff will consist of a planner and planning assistant, who will analyze submissions for development and make recommendations on ways to strengthen development policies established by the Town Council. Two zoning inspectors will provide increased enforcement of zoning regulations, and two clerical positions will allow for more timely and accurate staff reports and speed assistance to citizens requesting information.
