Spring Cleanup Gets Underway on April 11

The Town's annual Spring Cleanup will be conducted this month and next according to the following schedule:

SPRING CLEANUP SCHEDULE

QUADRANT	STARTING DATE
Southeast	April 11
Northwest	April 18
Northeast	April 25
Southwest	May 2

During the Cleanup, residents may place unwanted furniture, appliances, building materials, brush and other debris at the curbside for free pickup by the Public Works Department. To help keep Vienna looking as attractive as possible during the Cleanup, please follow the schedule above and do not set out discards more than a week in advance of the starting date for your quadrant. Those who put out items too soon may be required to remove them or to pay for a special trash pickup.

Because Cleanup crews comprise the same personnel who perform street maintenance and other public works duties, there is time for only one Cleanup sweep through each quadrant of town. Crews cannot double back along the Cleanup route.

CLEANUP REGULATIONS

- Building materials, including wood, broken concrete, building brick and

block, stones, fences, drywall and paneling, will be picked up. Concrete is limited to 300 pounds per residence. Building materials generated by contractors and/or persons employed by homeowners to renovate, repair and/or perform maintenance on their homes will not be picked up.

- Sod, stumps and brush cut in lengths of no more than 10 feet will be picked up. Please separate brush and branches from other discards. Leaves are not picked up by Cleanup crews.

- Discarded furniture, swing sets and playground equipment will be picked up.

- Up to 300 pounds of scrap metal per residence will be picked up, as well as small automobile parts such as engine blocks, transmissions and tires. Whole automobile bodies will not be picked up.

- Only two major appliances per residence may be discarded. These include stoves, dishwashers, refrigerators, washers, driers, hot water heaters, air conditioners and furnaces. Please separate appliances from other discards so that the Town may take them for recycling.

- Paint cans, used motor oil and hazardous wastes will not be picked up.

- For the safety of Cleanup crews, please separate large pieces of glass from other discards.

- Residents of corner lots are requested to place discards in front of the property, not on the side.

- Please keep all Cleanup items away from regular trash, fire hydrants, water meters, gas valves, fences and utility poles.

CHO NEEDS DONATIONS

Instead of discarding usable furniture, appliances, carpeting and other household items, why not donate them to CHO (Committee for Helping Others)? The items will be distributed to needy families in Vienna and the surrounding area. To arrange for pickup of donations, call Selma or Walker Smith at 560-1980.

CHO is an all-volunteer charitable group approved by the IRS as a tax-deductible organization and gives receipts for all donations.

Car Tag Deadline

The Finance Department at Town Hall will be open during the following hours for last-minute sales of 1988 Town vehicle stickers:

Weekdays through April 12, 8:30 a.m.-4:30 p.m.;

Saturday, April 9, 8 a.m.-noon; and

April 13, 14 and 15, 8:30 a.m.-6 p.m.

The windshield sticker must be displayed by midnight April 15. For more information, call 255-6323 or 255-6324.

Residents are reminded that they do not need to obtain Fairfax County vehicle stickers, but are required to pay County personal property tax on motor vehicles. Personal property tax returns must be filed with the County Office of Assessments by May 1 each year (and within 30 days after purchasing a vehicle). For information about personal property tax, call 591-8521.

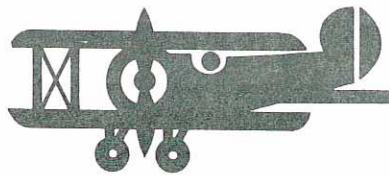

TOWN COUNCIL ACTION

February 22, 1988

• Following a public hearing, adopted an ordinance regulating political campaign signs. Directed that a banner be placed across Maple Avenue at Center Street two weeks before election day to announce Town elections and removed the day after the election.

• Following a public hearing, denied an application to rezone the property at 360 Church St., N.E., from RS-16 to RS-12.5.

• Approved a request by the Vienna Volunteer Fire Department to hold a "Fireman's Parade" on Saturday morning, May 28, in celebration of its 85th anniversary.

• Extended the contract for construction of the addition to the Vienna Community Center by 50 days to April 1 for substantial completion of the building, and by 110 days to June 1 for completion of all site work and related change orders.

• Reduced the performance bond for Townes of Vienna, Section II from \$164,278 to \$66,400.

• Approved the final plat of Springwood Subdivision, 500 block of Glyndon St., N.E.

• Directed that a replacement scoreboard for Waters Field be purchased from Time Technologies, Inc., and installed at a cost not to exceed \$6,000. If an offer is made for the cost and meets Town Code requirements for language on the sign, Council will consider it.

• Adopted a resolution requesting the Virginia Department of Transportation to establish an urban highway project for the improvement of Park Street from Maple Avenue to Fardale Street. The project is to be developed in accordance with the preliminary plan presented to Council during the November 30 public hearing.

• Awarded the contract to administer

the deferred compensation program for Town employees to the International City Management Association Retirement Corporation.

March 7, 1988

• Following a public hearing, denied an application to rezone the property at 627 Hine St., S.E., from RS-16 to RS-12.5.

• Adopted an amendment to the architectural design control ordinance waiving the requirement for architectural renderings for certain minor design changes.

• Scheduled public hearings for April 4 on an application to rezone the property at 314 East St., S.E., from RS-16 to RS-12.5, and for April 18 on an application to rezone the properties at 312-318 Locust St., S.E., from RS-10 to transitional.

• Adopted an amendment to the fire protection ordinance to bring it into conformance with the State Code.

• Approved change order no. 9, in the amount of \$1,842, for construction of the addition to the Vienna Community Center.

• Adopted a resolution requesting the Virginia Department of Transportation to consider inclusion of certain town streets for municipal assistance payments, and requested the State Highway Department to pay the Town for as many back years on these streets as possible.

• Reappointed Stuart Liss to the Board of Architectural Review for a one-year term.

• Authorized the Town Manager to file an application with the Virginia Commission for the Arts for a \$5,000 grant.

• Recommended the following persons to the Fairfax County Electoral Board to serve as officials for the Town election on May 10: Regina Jordan, Corinne Hanna, Lewis Robeson, Nancy

Robeson, Mary Harris, Mary Thompson, William Bell, Joanne Cook, Elfrieda Morrison, Blanche McGarth, Otis James, Jacqueline Clark, Virginia Dalton and Joanne Scott. The chief election officer will receive \$100, assistant chief \$85, and assisting officers \$75 each. Coffee, donuts and lunch will be provided in the amount of \$80.

• Set April 4 as the date for a public hearing on a proposed amendment to the zoning code concerning inoperative motor vehicles.

• Rescheduled the May 9 Council meeting to May 2.

Citizen Comment

Spring Cleanup Comments in Full Bloom

Space does not allow inclusion of all citizen comments received for this month. Those additional comments will appear in the May Newsletter.

From John Marshall Drive, N.W.:

I would like to go on record agreeing with the people who are protesting the Spring and Fall Cleanups. I mean, they couldn't be happening at worse times of the year, one during football season, the other during the start of the baseball season.

I would much rather be watching something worthwhile rather than tearing down the rusted old swing set, or throwing out those old tires. The swing set didn't look too bad, and I might have done something with those tires and the old lumber if it was still sitting around.

Also, who likes to prune trees and bushes anyway? I mean, if we just let them grow year after year we wouldn't need a Spring Cleanup at all. Why should we continue trying to keep up with the Jones? This trying to achieve that well manicured, landscaped look is just not worth the trouble.

Abolish the Spring Cleanup and you won't have to worry about it marring the overgrown "natural" look that Vienna will once again have.

From Timber Lane:

As a citizen of Vienna for nearly 33 years, I think the Spring and Fall Cleanup program and the fall leaf program are two of the best programs on the Town's agenda. If the Town could improve upon the time that lapses between the placement of articles at the curb and the actual pickup time, I believe this would alleviate the conditions that now exist. This should certainly satisfy most of the complaints the citizens now have with this matter.

I feel that these programs are vital and necessary not only to the citizens of Vienna but also to the welfare of

the town.

From Talabi Road:

I live on Talahi Road and have for 20 years, and the street is only three blocks long. Maybe one house will put out their trash early, but regardless of what section that has trash out before time, should the citizens that obey the rules suffer because of a few that don't?

Leaving trash a whole year encourages rats and who knows what else, and since most people sit and barbecue in their back yards during the summer, would they rather look at trash and junk piled high (as no one piles

trash and junk in the front yard), rats and whatever else all summer long?

I do agree with the resident on Audreys Court to fine each house and require them to remove trash until the allotted time to put it out. A few cases would put an end to early birds.

Another suggestion for southeast Vienna would be to use Park Street as a dividing line, giving the right side of Park one week and the left side another week. I suggested to the Town Council to divide the town into quadrants for the Cleanup and the following year it was started. I have very little trash to put out, but I feel the good should not be punished for a few offenders.

GLADYS S. (WAGGONER) BARNEY

Gladys S. (Waggoner) Barney, a resident of Vienna since 1920 and well known to many citizens, died earlier this year at the age of 91. Shirley Waggoner Martin has written the following tribute to her mother, which she has entitled "The End of an Era."

During World War I, she was secretary to Major General Amos A. Fries, Chief of Chemical Warfare Service (later to become the War Department). In 1920, she married Russell Waggoner, who with his brother, Floyd, operated Waggoner Brothers Garage at the corner of Maple Avenue and Center Street.

In 1934, Mrs. Waggoner bought the E.W. Parker Ice and Fuel Co. and called it the Gladys S. Waggoner Ice and Fuel Co., with yards, ice storage house and office located on Ayr Hill Avenue and what was then Railroad Avenue, now Dominion Road. In 1935, Mrs. Waggoner was made a Philgas appliance dealer. Later, Maytag washers and Westinghouse dealerships were added to the business. She took great pride in having one of the best washing machine service departments in

the suburban area.

The Waggoner's were divorced in 1937. In 1939, Mrs. Waggoner married Ray Barney. In 1949, after discontinuing her ice, fuel and appliance business, she went into the real estate business with Mr. Barney. Before Mr. Barney's death in 1954, Mrs. Barney qualified as a real estate broker in order to continue the business.

Mrs. Barney was the first treasurer of the original Ladies' Auxiliary of the Vienna Volunteer Fire Department. She was a charter member of the Fairfax Hospital Association, a charter member of the Vienna Businessmen's Association (now the Greater Vienna Chamber of Commerce) and was a director of that organization for a number of years. She was a member of Harmony Chapter #60, Order of the Eastern Star and a member of Vienna Presbyterian Church. She was named Businesswoman of the Year by the Chamber of Commerce in 1970.

She had two daughters by Mr. Waggoner, Marjorie Wilkerson of Delaplane, Virginia, and Shirley Martin of Vienna. She had 9 grandchildren and 15 great-grandchildren.
