Church Street Funding Added To November Bond Referendum

The Fairfax County Board of Supervisors has approved the addition of \$1.23 million to its bond issue for downtown revitalization projects, to be used for Church Street in Vienna. If approved by voters in November, the bond funds will be available for improvements on Church Street between Lawyers Road and Park Street.

Centreville District Supervisor Martha Pennino offered the amendment to add the extra funds for Vienna following a public hearing on August 1, at which both Mayor Charles Robinson and Greater Vienna Chamber of Commerce President T.R. Cook spoke of

the need to revitalize the town's commercial areas.

The Church Street project would include placing utility lines underground, brick sidewalks, reconstruction of driveway entrances, street furniture and landscaping, and installation of gas street lights. These improvements would also help preserve the atmosphere of old Church Street, which was Vienna's original business district.

The Church Street project is planned as the first phase of a revitalization of other commercial areas in town, including Maple Avenue between Nutley and East Streets, Lawyers Road, Center Street, Mill Street and Park Street.



Connector Trail Proposed

At its September 14 meeting, the Planning Commission will consider a proposal by the Northern Virginia Regional Park Authority to establish Tapawingo Road as part of a planned connector trail linking the W&OD Trail with Nottoway Park, the Vienna Metro Station, and the Fairfax City trail network. The meeting will begin at 8 p.m. in the Council Chamber at Town Hall, and all interested citizens and bike trail users are encouraged to attend.

The Planning Commission held a public hearing on this matter last April and asked the Regional Park Authority to study possible alternate routes. In addition to the direct route along Tapawingo Road, four alternatives were studied:

— Courthouse Road, Center Street, Vienna Community Center;

— Tapawingo Road, Meadow Lane, Plum Street, Battle Street, Community Center;

— Virginia Center Boulevard, Nutley Street, Marshall Road, Hillcrest Drive, Kingsley Road, Park Street, Adahi Road; and

— Virginia Center Boulevard, Kingsley Road, Park Street, Adahi Road.

Study factors included the length of each route, number of driveways crossed, number and characteristics of

intersections, traffic patterns, and other conditions affecting the safety of bicyclists. The study was made by taking public surveys, bicycle counts, and by riding the various routes on a bicycle carrying a video camera. Based on the study, the Regional Park Authority continues to recommend Tapawingo Road as the preferred route.

The route chosen would use existing roadways marked with signs to designate it as a bikeway. No construction would take place in or adjacent to any street, and no new parking restrictions would be imposed.

Lightning Threat

On hazy, hot and humid days there is always a chance of an afternoon thunderstorm, and thunderstorms bring lightning. Several people have been struck and three people killed by lightning in this area in the last few years.

The Fairfax County Fire and Rescue Department reminds citizens that certain locations are extremely dangerous and should be avoided during thunderstorms. These include open fields, athletic fields, golf courses, swimming pools and other bodies of water, areas around wires, railroad tracks and isolated trees.

If you notice a thunderstorm approaching, take refuge in a location that offers protection from lightning. The best places to be include inside a home, large metal frame buildings, automobiles with metal tops (not convertibles) and city streets shielded by nearby buildings.

W&OD Trail To Be Wider

The Northern Virginia Regional Park Authority has begun to repave, expand and improve the Washington & Old Dominion Regional Trail from Falls Church to Vienna. The \$274,250 project is scheduled to be completed by November of this year.

The paved trail will be widened from 8 to 10 feet to help bicyclists and pedestrians pass each other safely. Other improvements include better drainage and a three-foot wide gravel jogging/walking path adjacent to the asphalt trail.

The trail is paved from Shirlington Road in Arlington to Leesburg and features parallel paved and bridle trails beginning just past Vienna. The dual trail from Leesburg to Purcellville is scheduled to be completed this fall, and a bridge that will span the Route 7 bypass west of Leesburg should be completed by the end of the year.

The W&OD Trail, recently designated a National Recreation Trail by the U.S. Department of the Interior, runs along the right-of-way of the former Washington & Old Dominion Railroad. More than a million hikers, bicyclists, horseback riders and joggers use the trail each year.

Stroll the Trail

Join a Northern Virginia Regional Park Authority naturalist for a leisurely stroll along the W&OD Trail at Ashburn Road on Saturday, September 24, at 2 p.m. Learn to identify fall wildflowers, birds and other natural aspects of the trail. The walk is free, but reservations are required. Call 528-5406.

To reach Ashburn Road, take the trail from Vienna, or take Route 7 west approximately five miles past Sterling to Route 641 (Ashburn Road); turn left and continue approximately two miles to the W&OD Trail crossing. Parking is available at the Partlow Brothers Grocery Store on the left.

Fall Cleanup Next Month

Vienna's Fall Cleanup will be conducted next month according to the following schedule:

During the Cleanup, residents may place unwanted furniture, appliances, building materials, brush and other debris at the curbside for free pickup by the Public Works Department. To help keep Vienna looking as attractive as possible, please follow the schedule above and do not set out discards more than a week in advance of the starting

date for your quadrant. Those who put out items too soon may be required to remove them or to pay for a special trash pickup.

Because Cleanup crews comprise the same personnel who perform street maintenance and other public works duties, there is time for only one Cleanup sweep through each quadrant of town. Crews cannot double back along the Cleanup route.

PLEASE NOTE: This will be the last of the Town's annual Spring and Fall Cleanups. Beginning January 1, a new program will allow citizens to schedule two free special trash pickups at any time they wish during the year.

Cleanup Rules

— Building materials — wood, broken concrete, building brick and block, stones, fences, drywall and paneling — will be picked up. Concrete is limited to 300 pounds per residence. Building materials generated by contractors and/or persons employed by homeowners to renovate, repair and/or perform maintenance on their homes will not be picked up.

— Sod, stumps and brush in lengths of no more than 10 feet will be picked up. Please separate brush and branches from other discards.

— Leaves are not picked up by Cleanup crews. Leaves may be raked to the curb/edge of pavement to be picked up in the fall leaf collection (beginning November 7), or leaves may be bagged and put out with the regular trash.

— Discarded furniture, swing sets and playground equipment will be picked up.

— Up to 300 pounds of scrap metal and small automobile parts such as engine blocks, transmissions and tires will be picked up. Whole automobile bodies will not be picked up.

— Two major appliances per residence will be picked up. These include stoves, refrigerators, dishwashers, washers, driers, hot water heaters, air conditioners and furnaces. Old heating oil tanks will not be picked up.

— Paint cans, used motor oil and hazardous wastes will not be picked up.

— For the safety of Cleanup crews, please separate large pieces of glass from other discards.

— Residents of corner lots are requested to place discards in front of the property, not on the side.

— Please keep Cleanup items away from regular trash, fire hydrants, water meters, gas valves, fences and utility poles.

Town Receives Finance Award -

Boards and Commissions

Membership on Vienna's boards and commissions provides citizens the opportunity to become actively involved in Town affairs. Applications for appointment are available in the Town Clerk's Office at Town Hall, phone 255-6303.

The Town Council usually interviews each applicant and evaluates his or her interests, education, philosophy and work experience according to the functions of the board or commission on which a vacancy exists. Many members of Council believe it is desirable to have all areas of town represented and to encompass diverse philosophies and points of view, although applicants should be in general agreement with Town policies and objectives.

The Planning Commission approves preliminary plats of subdivisions, prepares the Comprehensive Plan for the future development of the town, hears and makes recommendations to Council on rezoning requests and other planning and zoning matters.

The Board of Zoning Appeals is a quasi-judicial body, the members of

which are recommended by Council to the Circuit Court for appointment. The board is authorized to hear and decide appeals of any decision made by the Department of Planning and Zoning, grant variances from the zoning code, approve conditional use permits and interpret the zoning map.

The Board of Architectural Review examines and approves plans for commercial buildings, signs and landscaping to ensure that new construction is not bizarre or garish and is harmonious and compatible with existing buildings. The board is concerned primarily with the appearance and aesthetic factors in commercial construction, but also considers any construction in residential zones other than single-family housing.

The Transportation Safety Commission studies intersections, traffic signs, speed limits and other matters relating to street safety and makes recommendations to Council.

The Town/Business Liaison Committee makes studies and offers recommendations to Council on matters affecting the town's businesses and their relationship with other segments of the community. Both commercial and residential interests are represented on the committee.

The Windover Heights Board of Review approves new construction and major exterior alterations of buildings within the Windover Heights Historic District in northwest Vienna to ensure that they are in keeping with the old and historic architectural aspects of the surroundings. Citizen members of the board must reside within the historic district.

Senior Wellness Works

As the Fairfax area's aging population grows, so does the need for services to promote and maintain the health, quality of life, and independence of older adults in the community. In 1980, less than five percent of the county's population was 65 and older. By 1990, this number of older adults is expected to almost double, and to nearly triple by the year 2000.

To meet the need for such services, the Fairfax County Health Department will open its first geriatric health assessment unit on Friday, September 9, at the Falls Church District Office, 7115 Leesburg Pike. The Health Department plans eventually to offer this program at all of its district offices.

Known as Senior Wellness Works, the unit will provide services for those aged 65 and over who meet the eligibility requirements for health department services. Patients must be able to walk or wheel on their own with minimal assistance and to provide their own transportation. Non-English speaking patients are requested to bring a translator. from 8 a.m. to noon and an appointment must be made for services. Fees will be based on a sliding fee scale.

The services available include health history and physical examination; select laboratory testing; health risk appraisal; health counseling and education; tetanus and influenza immunizations; management of stable long-term diseases such as high blood pressure, diabetes or arthritis; and an assessment to ensure that a person is able to perform the activities of daily living such as bathing and dressing.

Following the evaluation, a plan of care will be developed with the patient and the family. Referring physicians will receive reports of findings and updates on the patient's condition. Services are intended to complement the role of the physician, focusing on wellness care.

Staff for the program includes a nurse practitioner, public health nurses, a family assistance worker, a nutritionist, and an occupational therapist.
