

Town Council Approves Second Roundabout for Vienna

afety improvements are underway at Church and East streets. Stop signs were installed in mid-May to serve as a temporary safety measure until a new roundabout can be designed and installed to facilitate a safer and more-efficient traffic flow.

"The existing T-intersection at Church and East Streets receives a high volume of traffic that results in congestion and traffic backups, especially leading back to Maple Avenue," said Public Works Director Brad Baer at the May 6, 2024, Town Council meeting. "Some of the benefits here are a counterclockwise flow around a central island that provides a traffic calming effect, lower speeds, and fewer conflict points."

The Council-approved roundabout at Church and East streets will be the second in Vienna. The first was installed at the intersection of Park and Locust streets in 2016 and ultimately alleviated extreme traffic backups at rush hour. At the same time, crosswalks were carefully considered to help assure pedestrian and bicyclist safety. Police Chief Jim Morris reported that the roundabout at Park and Locust streets seems to be operating as intended and has had no pedestrian-involved accidents in the last three years.

The design phase of the new roundabout is expected to take two years and will include a study that considers traffic volume, lighting, signage, crosswalk placement and other safety considerations. Once the design is approved, construction is expected to last three to six months.

The new traffic circle will be funded in part by the Virginia Department of Transportation's revenue sharing grant and Northern Virginia Transportation Authority funds for local projects.

New Chapter Begins for Annex Property

fter a month of demolition and debris removal, the former Faith Baptist Church and Town Annex property is now a clean slate. Soon, the Vienna Town Council will begin discussing next steps for the property, which was purchased by the Town in September 2020 for future parks and recreation use.

"Through a robust public engagement process, we have already received a significant wish list from the community about what residents would like to see there," said Parks and Recreation Director Leslie Herman. "The contracted consulting firm identified common themes and examined feasibility of the most frequently mentioned options for future use."

The Vienna Town Council will review the Conditional Use Permit Application for the Annex at its regular meeting at 7:30 p.m. on June 3, 2024, at Town Hall. This permit would cover potential short-term uses for the property including recreation and government uses.

Potential long-term uses are expected to be discussed at the Town' work session on June 10 at 7 p.m. at the Police Department community room. That discussion will involve a review of business planning and marketing analysis for the three options discussed - aquatics, fitness, and outdoor gathering space. Consultants will also present an analysis of related construction costs, operational expenses, revenue potential, site-planning impacts, and massing diagrams for each of the three long-term options.

The Annex Long-Term Use Study Final report will be discussed at the Town Council work session on July 8 at 7 p.m. at the Police Department community room. All meetings are open to the public.

No final decisions are made at Council work sessions. While the short-term use for the property could be determined soon, the long-term vision for the property will be years in the making and involve more community input. Composting Now Available at the Vienna Farmers Market

ere's a great way to turn table scraps into an earth-friendly additive – composting at the Vienna Farmers Market! The Town's Conservation and Sustainability Commission (CSC) has arranged for Veteran Compost to provide a bin at the Vienna Farmers Market every Saturday from 8 a.m. to 12 p.m. through Aug. 17. All you have to do is bring your food waste in a certified-compostable bag or your own container to the farmers market, and the company will take it from there.

Composting is a natural process that converts organic materials into a nutrient-rich, biologically-stable soil additive through natural decomposition. In short, it's nature's way of repurposing waste.

"Composting is one of the most important things we can do to cut waste, reduce trash, address climate change and build healthy soil," said CSC member Mala Persaud. "By composting food scraps, we can reduce the volume of materials that would otherwise take up landfill space and prevent greenhouse gases from being emitted into the atmosphere."

Many people do their own composting at home, but some people may not have the time nor the space for home composting. The composting bin at the farmers market gives everyone the opportunity to turn table waste into nutrient-rich compost. The CSC is using its budget to pilot the program for 14 weeks this year, and it will extend the program through the end of the farmers market season in October if an alternate funding source becomes available. If the concept catches on with the community, the CSC expects to make composting at the farmers market a permanent fixture in future years.

Vienna Town Council Adopts FY25 Budget

t its regular meeting on Monday, May 20, 2024, the Vienna Town Council adopted the Town budget, real estate tax rate, and water and sewer rates for fiscal year 2025. The adopted \$53.8-million balanced budget reflects current economic conditions related to inflation and supply chain issues and:

- Maintains property tax rate at 19.5 cents per \$100 of assessed value
- Addresses inflationary increases in operating costs, mainly through tax revenue increases related to assessed value of new construction
- Funds compensation increases for eligible employees
- Provides a night shift pay differential to police officers who work overnight
- Adds one personnel position identified as a priority An after-hours information technology position to support police, the community center and other after-hours IT needs

The adopted budget also includes a 10 percent increase in water and sewer bills due to increases in operational costs from the Town's service providers – Fairfax Water and the District of Columbia Water and Sewer Authority. The result is an average annual water service increase of \$100.

The Council vote is the culmination of a months-long budget process involving several Council work sessions and public hearings. This is the 12th consecutive year there was either no change or a reduction in Vienna's property tax rate.

The FY25 Town Budget takes effect July 1, 2024. The adopted budget will be posted online at www.viennava.gov/budget.

Fairfax Edges Out Competition in the Mayors' Fitness Challenge



eam Vienna worked hard, played hard, but fell short in its quest for a three-peat victory in the 2024 Mayors Fitness Challenge. For the first time in the event's history, the City of Fairfax pulled off an upset victory, blazing its way into first place, defeating the Town of Vienna and the City of Falls Church in this friendly fitness competition between the three localities.

In the final tally of average number of fitness minutes, the City of Fairfax pulled into first place and

won with a total of 3,960.69 average exercise minutes per participant. Vienna came in second with an average minute total of 2,243.27 and Falls Church came in third with an average minute total of 1,863.83.

The Mayors Fitness Challenge trophy heads to Fairfax, but if participation trophies were given, Vienna would definitely qualify. Despite coming in second, Team Vienna delivered record participation, expanding upon last year's numbers with 254 participants totaling a collective 569,790 exercise minutes (9,496.5 hours) from March 16-May 11, 2024.

The Mayors' Fitness Challenge started in 2021 with a collaboration between the three communities to encourage people to get outside after being cooped up at home for more than a year for COVID-19 pandemic-related reasons. To motivate people, the mayors of each community rallied residents to choose activities they enjoy and to get moving in the name of community spirit and hometown pride.

The City of Fairfax now takes on the title of "Most Fit Community" for 2024. Vienna won the competition in 2022 and 2023, and the City of Falls Church took the inaugural competition title in 2021.



Who Will Speak for the Trees - You? Why Not?

ello, Vienna! This is my first Vienna Voice column since I joined the Town Council in January. I've decided to use this opportunity to update you about two of my favorite Vienna topics – our trees and our civic volunteers.

First, the trees – I'm proud to have cast one of my first votes in April to help enact Vienna's new Tree Preservation Ordinance. Once this ordinance takes effect in late July, Vienna will have the strongest protections allowed under state law for tree preservation during the land development or redevelopment process. For me the heart of the new ordinance is that, for the first time, when an existing house is torn down to build a new home and there are existing trees on that lot that "meet standards of health, condition, and suitability," "all efforts shall first be made" to preserve them. I'm confident this means that clear cutting of trees will happen very infrequently, if at all, in the future.

Now for the volunteers – many are needed to speak for the trees! At the same Council meeting in April, I joined in a unanimous vote to establish the Tree Advocacy Committee. Its purpose will be to advise and assist the Town on matters relating to the conservation and management of the Town's trees and tree canopy and the development and maintenance of specifications and guidelines related to the same. The committee will be a big deal – it will report directly to the Town Council and be involved in making policy concerning our urban forest. It will consist of nine members, six of whom will be residents appointed by the Town Council, including one current or rising high school junior and one high school senior. If you would like to be considered for a seat on the Tree Advocacy Committee, please apply online at the Town's website, viennava.gov/boards. Even if you aren't chosen, the committee will need many volunteers to help with its work, so at last, like the Lorax in the Dr. Seuss story, you will be able to speak for the trees!

Volunteers Improve Scenery Along the Trail

Volunteering: A Universal Language



hen Grace Wolfe, a professor at Ivy College in Vienna, wanted to get her students involved in a hands-on volunteer project doing something good for the environment, the Town's parks crews had just the right idea: plant trees! With a little planning and coordination, the international students from across the globe headed for the Town-owned Beulah Road property to help Vienna park crews remove trash and invasive plant species on day one. When they returned to the property, they helped plant 92 native trees and created protective fencing for each one. Despite planting in a cold rain, this hard-working group was all smiles.

"This is my first time doing anything like this," Malik, a student from Tunisia, said cheerfully. "I'm enjoying the work, it's really rewarding."

The student volunteers are living in the United States and attending Ivy College, to study the English language. Volunteering is a requirement of their studies, and many agreed they enjoyed working together as a group for a meaningful cause.

"It's a great way to volunteer because we're being helpful to society and it's nice to do things together as a group," said Gaye, a student from Turkey.

The new trees on the Beulah Road property will have a positive, lasting impact on the local environment as it helps to increase the Town's tree canopy. Perhaps more important, the experience has taught the international students that environmental stewardship is a universal language that transcends all the world's boundaries.

Town Recognized for Mental Health Advocacy

he Town of Vienna was recently recognized by the Eric Monday Foundation for its role in raising awareness about mental health challenges through the #takedownthestigma campaign. The foundation's 2024 Community Wellness Award was presented to the Town in May, National Mental Health Awareness Month.



The foundation is named in memory of Eric Monday, a Vienna resident and accomplished Madison High School wrestler who battled depression. The Eric Monday Foundation is focused on bringing awareness and education to coaches, parents, and athletes on the topic of mental health – specifically, on how to identify those in need and empower them to initiate a conversation that can lead to treatment and support without feeling stigmatized or labeled.




Topic on deck: Liberty Amendments Month

Keep the Peace During Home Construction



lanning a home improvement or remodeling project this summer? As you hire contractors to complete the work, make sure they are familiar with Town of Vienna ordinances pertaining to construction to ensure the project

goes smoothly for you and your neighbors.

The Town Code allows general construction noise from 7 a.m. to 8 p.m. Monday through Friday and from 9 a.m. to 8 p.m. Saturday and on federal holidays. Contractor noise on Sunday is prohibited.

The code also addresses parking and other construction details. Vehicles cannot be parked blocking neighbors' driveways, and contractors are responsible for ensuring roadways stay open and

traffic can safely pass. Job sites should be cleaned up at the end of each day to avoid debris blowing through the neighborhood. Contractors should also know the job-site property lines and ensure all activity stays on the property.

Finally, you can help ensure a smooth process by communicating with your neighbors about your home improvement project. Invite them to contact you with any concerns or questions. Keeping the lines of communication open and addressing any concerns right away will help keep the peace and avoid the need to call police during construction.
