

Opportunities to Serve Vienna

Membership on Vienna's boards and commissions provides citizens the opportunity to become actively involved in Town affairs. Applications for appointment are available in the Town Clerk's Office at Town Hall, phone 255-6303.

The Town Council usually interviews each applicant and evaluates his or her interests, education, philosophy and work experience according to the functions of the board or commission on which a vacancy occurs. Council tries to have all areas of town represented and to encompass diverse philosophies and points of view, although applicants should be in general agreement with Town policies and objectives.

The Planning Commission prepares the Town's Comprehensive Plan, approves preliminary plats of subdivisions, and makes recommendations to Council on rezoning requests and other planning and zoning matters.

The Board of Zoning Appeals is a quasi-judicial body, the members of which are recommended by Council to the Circuit Court for appointment. The Board is authorized to hear and decide appeals of any decision made by the Department of Planning and Zoning, grant variances from the zoning code, approve conditional use permits and interpret the zoning map.

The Board of Architectural Review examines and approves plans for commercial buildings, signs and landscaping. It also considers any construction in residential zones other than single-family homes.

Fire Department's Letter Goes Astray

A message to Vienna residents from Pat Rooney, President, Vienna Volunteer Fire Department:

By now you may have received a letter from the Fair Oaks Volunteer Fire Department requesting a donation. Unfortunately, some of their fund drive letters were mailed to the wrong zip code areas. If you have a Vienna mailing address, you should not have received this letter. Please do not confuse this letter with the one that the Vienna Volunteer Fire Department sent you earlier this year.

We have received an apology from the Fair Oaks Volunteer Fire Department, and they have assured us that this will not happen again. In addition, any money they receive from Vienna residents will be sent back to the Vienna Volunteer Fire Department. Each volunteer fire department in Fairfax County has a specific area from which they solicit donations.

We have received a number of calls from citizens concerning this matter, so we felt an explanation was needed. If you have not sent in your donation to the Vienna Volunteer Fire Department, it's not too late to do so.

"Miss Utility"

If you are building an addition to your house, converting a porch or patio into a finished room, installing a swimming pool or even planting shrubs, one of your first questions should be, "Where is my natural gas line?"

Rupturing underground gas lines can cause serious accidents, service interruptions or property damage. In addition, you violate federal and local safety codes when you build an enclosed structure over a gas line, or enclose an outdoor gas meter or the regulator vent from an inside meter.

To locate your gas lines quickly and conveniently, just phone "Miss Utility" at 1-800-257-7777, and ask for someone to come out and mark the location of your gas lines - and the locations of underground electric, cable TV and telephone lines as well. "Miss Utility" should be contacted at least 48 hours in advance for this service, which is provided to residents and businesses free of charge.

If you are employing a contractor, don't allow any construction to commence until underground utility lines have been marked by either spray paint, flags or stakes. Also, it is a law in Virginia that you must hand-dig within two feet on either side of the marked location of a natural gas line.

More Metro Parking

This summer, the Fairfax County Board of Supervisors approved the sale of \$15.2 million in Metrorail Parking Revenue Bonds to fund construction of the Vienna Metrorail parking structure. Construction of the facility, which will provide 1,864 parking spaces, is now underway and is expected to be completed in September 1990. Meanwhile, park-and-ride users may use alternative parking and shuttle service at Hunters Branch, 9300 Lee Highway. Before Metro, Vienna Had Rail Transportation

In 1859, the Alexandria, Loudoun & Hampshire (steam) Railroad came to Vienna with passenger and freight trains, which also carried the U.S. mail. Trains went both ways on the same single track, passing at double or side tracks. The railroad was devastated during the Civil War and had to be completely rebuilt.

The railroad company changed to the Washington & Ohio Railroad in 1870, then the Southern Railway System in 1894, when the line was extended from Round Hill to Snicker's Gap. It operated five passenger (and mail) trains each day through Vienna early in this century, with one or more freight trains daily.

In 1904, the electric trolley line was brought to Vienna with cars every hour. The "Toonerville Trolley" crossed over the steam railroad line, and the bridge abutment is still visible. The trolley line from Vienna to Oakton and Fairfax was parallel to Maple Avenue. In 1926, the line went bankrupt, and local people organized to carry on the hourly trolley service.

In 1912, the McLean family and Senator Elkins from West Virginia leased the Southern Railway and converted it to an electric railway. The new Washington & Old Dominion Railway bought 10 new electric passenger and mail cars, including an observation car with an open platform. The train ran 10 times a day through Vienna with a steam engine until 1919, when electric locomotives were bought. One car was a railway post office car (number 44) on which mail was postmarked and sorted en route.

Although the railway company declared bankruptcy in 1932, it continued to operate the line



through Vienna. In 1936, the Washington & Old Dominion Railroad took over from the McLean and Elkins estates. In 1941, passenger train service was suspended for the duration of World War II. On May 30, 1951, the last passenger train came to Vienna, while freight service lasted until 1968.

The Vienna Centennial Committee has designated September 1990 to spotlight the history of transportation in Vienna. Activities will include an antique car show and an open house at the Vienna railroad station. Anyone interested in assisting with plans for Transportation Month or sharing old photos and memorabilia for display is invited to call the Public Information Office at Town Hall, 255-6330.
