# Special Pickup Replaces Cleanup

Residents are reminded that instead of a Fall Cleanup this year, the Town has instituted a Special Pickup program to dispose of unwanted furniture, appliances, building materials, brush and other debris not included in the regular trash collection.

To order a special pickup, place discards at the curbside first, then call the Special Pickup Line recording at 255-5727. Orders are handled on a first-come, firstserved basis. Each residence is allowed two free Special Pickups per calendar year.

### SPECIAL PICKUP GUIDELINES

- Building materials wood, broken concrete, building brick and block, stones, fences, drywall and paneling - will be picked up. Concrete is limited to 300 pounds per residence. Building materials generated by contractors and/or persons employed by homeowners to renovate, repair and/or perform maintenance on their homes will not be picked up.

- Sod, small stumps, brush, trees and limbs of no more than 8 feet in length will be picked up. Please separate brush and branches from other discards. Leaves are not picked up by Special Pickup crews.

- Discarded furniture, swing sets and playground equipment will be picked up.

- Up to 300 pounds of scrap metal and small automobile parts such as engine blocks, transmissions and tires will be picked up. Whole automobile bodies will not be picked up.

- Two major appliances per residence will be picked up. These include stoves, refrigerators, dishwashers, washers, dryers, hot water heaters, air conditioners and furnaces. Old heating oil tanks will not be picked up.

- Paint cans, used motor oil and hazardous wastes will not be picked up.

- For the safety of Special Pickup crews, please separate large pieces of glass from other discards.

- Residents of corner lots are requested to place discards in front of the property, not on the side.

- Please keep Special Pickup items away from regular trash, fire hydrants, water meters, gas valves, fences and utility poles.

Reminder: Please make sure brush does not protrude from trash cans, which may cause injuries to trash collection personnel.

### NO SPECIAL PICKUPS IN NOVEMBER OR DECEMBER

Fall leaf collection begins November 6. No Special Pickups will be made during November and December because the Public Works crews who normally make Special Pickups will be spending 12 hours a day to collect leaves.

The Town regrets any inconvenience this may cause and appreciates the understanding and cooperation of residents.

TOWN HALL WILL BE CLOSED ON MONDAY, OCTOBER 9, FOR COLUMBUS DAY. TRASH WILL BE COLLECTED AS USUAL FOR RESIDENTS ON THE MON-DAY/THURSDAY ROUTE.

## Citizen Comment

# Do Vienna Residents Need Jitney Service?

The following letter comes from a resident of Gibson Drive, S.W.:

As a resident of Vienna for 32 years, I feel as if my opinion should be aired with respect to the "study" for the proposed jitney service for town residents.

If my memory serves correct, the jitney service has been tried on two previous occasions. Both were failures. The Virginia Department of Transportation and Town of Vienna from what I read are now going to spend \$30,000 on a so-called "study." I classify this as throwing money down the drain. It is a big, and I am emphasizing big, waste of money.

I would suggest you take the time to check the previous failures.

And, for your information, the seniors have the Assist bus service. This service picks them up and drops them off right at their door steps. The young and working people have cars. And, unless I am blind, there appears to be an overused and poorly planned Metro Station at Nutley and Route 66.

So, what is the need of this expensive study when it is clearly not needed by town residents? More important, the jitney service will not be used even if the study recommends the need.

Why not send a mailing to residents asking them to voice their opinions instead of wasting \$30,-000? Or, at least put a ballot in the next Newsletter to see if the town residents feel it would be feasible?

Most of my neighbors are in agreement with my feelings. They feel, along with yours truly, more serious items could be addressed than a totally unnecessary jitney service "study."

Mayor Charles Robinson replies:

Although some members of Council feel that a more convenient public transportation system is highly desirable in Vienna, particularly to discourage the use of single-passenger automobiles for

Metrorail access, it was, I think, never our intention to spend Town funds for this study. The Town was offered a 50% (\$15,000) grant from the Virginia Department of Transportation (VDOT), with the remainder originally to come from the Metropolitan Council of Governments (COG). COG money proved not to be available in the final analysis, although we did apply for the VDOT grant. Our hope is that matching funds might be available from some other source. We have now agreed to accept a no-cost offer from private sector organizations operating local transit systems in and around Fairfax County to assist us in evaluating our overall needs, and to advise us as to whether a local transit system is workable.

I do not contemplate that

any substantial Town funds will be committed to a study of this kind, but I do believe that if the Metrorail system is to effectively serve its purpose, we really ought to try to develop public transportation facilities sufficiently convenient to lure people in and around the Town of Vienna out of their automobiles. I also point out that many people in the community might find it convenient to utilize this kind of system for accessing the Maple Avenue corridor and our technology park. Existing programs offered by Fairfax County do help, but they are available only to a limited number of people and under a limited number of circumstances.

## **Town Council Action**

- Authorized the Town Manager to negotiate a contract for water tank inspection services at a cost not to exceed \$11,000.
- Awarded a bid for a oneton dump truck cab and chassis to JKJ Chevrolet at a price of \$17,066.
- Awarded a bid for a dump body and hoist to Shade Equipment Co. of Winchester at a price of \$3,175.
- Awarded a bid for a single-axle cab and chassis to Truck Center of Tidewater, Virginia Beach, at a price of \$24,268.
- Awarded a bid for a 14foot flat bed dump to Wilbar Truck Equipment of Springfield at a price of \$4,675.
- Authorized the Town Manager to refer items directly to the Transportation Safety Commission.

# Volunteers Spark Vienna Fire Department

The Vienna Volunteer Fire Department stems from modest beginnings. The company was mustered in 1903 as the first organized fire protection in Fairfax County. The small band of volunteers was led by Leon Freeman, a prominent Vienna citizen who served the town as postmaster, keeper of the general store and first fire chief. The only piece of equipment was a handdrawn chemical cart to create pressure for firefighting with the small tank of water on board. For years this cart was kept under the porch of the Freeman home on Church Street. In those days, volunteers received the alarm of fire when the bell in the nearby Vienna Presbyterian Church was sounded.

In 1919, the company became the first in the county to become motorized when it obtained a Model T Ford and modified it with three chemical tanks. By then the company had also found a new home in a garage attached to the old Town Hall on Center Street. In 1929, a firehouse was built on Church Street where the Full Cry Shop and Worthington's are now located. This building (shown at right in 1942 photo) featured two large equipment bays and a large underground cistern to ensure adequate water supplies. Real firefighting machinery was acquired, and a siren was erected on a makeshift tower behind the station to alert the volunteers.

In 1950, a rescue squad was formed by VVFD. The first ambulance was a used Cadillac. In 1958, the current firehouse was built on Center Street. The "house siren" followed and was placed on a tall pole behind the building.

All along, though, the key to VVFD's success has been people. During World War II, when manpower was scarce, local teens became firefighters. Whole families of men and women from all walks of life have served as volunteers: Savia, Hancock, Darcy, Pickell, Rohr, Swift, Ellis, Culp, Haney, Gesling, Wenning, Miller and more.

## **Centennial Souvenirs Arrive**

The Vienna Centennial Committee has published a history of Vienna in a 1990 calendar format. Each date of the year has an anecdote from Vienna's past.

Did you know? On April 11, 1909, a railroad trolley smashed into a shed in Vienna. On May 3, 1930, there were only 903 people living in town. On August 1, 1866, the Presbyterian Church started Sunday services in the railroad freight house.

Do you remember? On February 19, 1940, the Town passed an ordinance stating that one could not drive a horse, mule or bike more than 10 mph. On March 9, 1955, the Vienna Lions Club organized Little League baseball in Vienna. October 31, 1946, was Vienna's first Halloween Parade.

The historic facts for the calendar were compiled by Paul S. Worboys with the assistance of the Vienna Centennial Committee. Worboys has published two previous historic calendars for Fairfax County.

# Vienna a Leader in Recycling


The Town Council is currently studying the feasibility of establishing a drop-off center to collect glass for recycling. This action should come as no surprise to town residents, since Vienna has always been a leader in recycling efforts.

Our newspaper pickup program was the first of its kind in Northern Virginia, beginning in 1975. Our aluminum recycling center has been in operation for almost 10 years, and in 1980 it received an environmental quality award from the Virginia Municipal League as being "innovative, practical, cost effective, used frequently by citizens and developed with their input."

In 1987, Vienna joined Fairfax County's new Waste Reduction Program, which requires "white goods" - stoves, refrigerators and other major appliances - to be recycled. This is why the Public Works Department asks residents to separate these items from other discards put at the curbside for a Special Pickup. Also in 1987, I suggested that we try out a program for collection of used motor oil from town residents. As far as I know, Vienna is the only local jurisdiction to offer this service, and I am pleased to report that it is very successful, with an average of over 300 gallons brought in each quarterly collection day.

This year the Town Council approved the purchase of a brush chipping machine. Brush and branches have accounted for a large portion of the fee the Town must pay to use the Fairfax County landfill. At almost \$25 per ton, the savings in landfill costs will quickly pay for our new chipper. For a number of years the Town has stockpiled the leaves collected each fall and made the resulting leaf mulch available to residents free of charge. Soon, we will also have an abundant supply of wood chips!

As last month's Newsletter reported, the Town received over \$20,000 from its recycling programs in fiscal year 1988-89, in addition to the savings in landfill charges by recycling rather than dumping. The

greatest benefits, of course, cannot be measured in dollars, and these are protection of our environment, conservation of resources and beautification of our community.







# For a Healthy, Attractive Home-

TROUBLED BY RATS?

Rats are attracted to residential areas by improper storage of trash, pet food or bird seed left outdoors for long periods, brush and debris lying in the yard, and similar causes.

How can you tell if you have a rodent infestation problem? Some of the signs to look for are golf ball-size holes around porches, sheds, wood piles and other places of shelter; narrow trails, especially around bird feeders; and droppings inside sheds and elsewhere.

Grass and weeds growing up
