## License Required for Peddlers

A peddler is defined as anyone who carries goods such as candy or firewood from door to door for sale and immediate delivery. Peddlers are required to pay a license tax to the Town and must display the license on their vehicles. Call 255-6321 for more information on peddlers.

A solicitor or canvasser is defined as anyone who goes from door to door taking orders for merchandise such as magazines or services such as home improvements to be delivered at some future date, or requesting donations for a charitable purpose. Canvassers and solicitors are required to obtain a permit and a license from the Town and to show the license on request. They

are also required to wear a badge issued by the Town containing the words "Licensed Solicitor." Call <u>255-6303</u> for more information on solicitors and canvassers.

Selling merchandise from a vehicle parked on a street or in a parking lot is prohibited.

The Town Manager may grant exemptions from licensing requirements to non-profit groups such as schools, churches and service organizations. If an exemption has been granted, it will be on file at Town Hall.

Residents who suspect that a solicitor or peddler is operating under fraudulent pretenses or that he may be "casing" the neighborhood for burglary targets should call the police, 255-6366.

## Citizen Commentary...

The following citizen comments were received in response to last month's article by Councilman Dick Fisher on the Town's recycling programs:

I added glass recycling to my list about a year ago and I was amazed to see how much was generated in our household alone. I therefore would welcome a glass recycling center in the Town of Vienna.

It seems to me that the saving of landfill space, plus the saving of landfill costs, plus any income the recycling of glass might bring far outweigh any new expenses the program might cause. Such a program already exists in Fairfax County. Shouldn't the feasibility study for glass recycling in Vienna be a short one?

I believe the communities that recycle plastics (and they exist!) are the real leaders in recycling today!

Since Councilman Fisher is competing against David Battaglia in a campaign for a partisan political office, it was inappropriate to use the October 1989 Newsletter to feature Fisher. Since there was no editorial imperative to run a generic article on recycling at this time, the timing of the story exposes the Newsletter to a charge of playing partisan politics. The Newsletter story gave one candidate thousands of dollars worth of publicity at taxpayer expense one month before an important State election.

Perhaps the interjection of partisan politics into the Newsletter was an aberration and a lapse in judgment. Those of us who support the non-partisan nature of Vienna's government certainly hope so.

EDITOR'S NOTE: Town Council members are given the opportunity to write Newsletter columns between June and December each year in order of seniority. Councilman Fisher's turn happened to come in October, and the Council decided to adhere to the established schedule. Their feeling was that although Councilman Fisher is a candidate for State office, this should not affect his normal duties and privileges as a member of Council.

## **New Community Center Fees**

The Town Council has adopted a revised fee schedule for rental of space at the Vienna Community Center. This is the first change in rates since 1982. Highlights of the new fee schedule include:

- The hourly rates for use of meeting and activity space by community organizations remain unchanged. However, the rates for all-day functions (10 hours or more) have been raised 25%.
- A separate classification has been established for commercial users, with fee increases ranging from 20 to 70%.
- Private party rentals will be available only to Town of Vienna organizations, businesses and residents. All private functions will be assessed a reservation fee of \$300 plus an hourly rate of \$40. Provision has been made, however, for children's birthday party rentals at \$45 for a two-hour period.
- The new auditorium facility will be made available for use as either a multi-purpose room for events such as bazaars, exhibits and meetings or as a theater with stage, lights, sound system, and dressing rooms. Theater use will incur a substantially higher fee than multi-purpose functions.
- Rentals have a minimum two-hour charge to help offset administrative, room preparation and cleanup costs. Exceptions are private parties (three-hour minimum)

and theater rental (four-hour mini-mum).

- Any function with anticipated attendance over 100 is subject to a security deposit of \$200 to \$400 per day, depending on facilities and equipment requested and the nature of the event.

Evidence that the dog has a currently effective vaccination against rabies (either a 12-month or a 36-month immunization) is required. You may obtain dog licenses in person at the Town Finance Department. Or cut out and fill in this form and mail with

the immunization certificate and check for each dog to the address shown below. The cost of a license for a spayed/neutered dog is \$5.00. The cost of a license for a fertile dog (male or female) is \$10.00. To obtain a \$5.00 license, certification must be provided that the animal has been neutered by a veterinarian or is infertile. Your immunization certificate will be returned with the tag.

### Countdown to Centennial

## Library Continues Tradition of Learning in Town

On any given afternoon, the Patrick Henry Library at the corner of Maple Avenue and Center Street is one of the busiest places in town. In a typical month, library patrons circulate close to 50,000 items. Vienna is a literate and inquiring community with a long tradition of library use.

Vienna's first library was built in 1897, situated on Library Lane in southwest Vienna. The building is now a historic landmark on the grounds of the Freeman House on Church Street. It is a sturdy frame and clapboard structure with a distinctive hipped roof and intricate interior woodwork. Many books from the old collection still line the wooden shelves, and a visitor can also see file drawers full of the original handwritten borrowers' cards.

In 1913, the building was moved from Library Lane to the corner of Center and Maple. In 1969, the quaint structure was the oldest continuously used library building in Fairfax County. As plans for a modern facility took shape, the Town Council voted to move the old building intact and provide for its preservation. Many

residents will remember the day in 1970 when that old flatbed truck eased its way through town with its precious cargo.

The tradition of learning at Center and Maple was to continue, however, and in the fall of 1971 the Patrick Henry Library opened its doors. The present building is easily recognizable by its distinctive patio

gardens, brick archways and covered walkway. The library is one of 22 branches in the Fairfax County system.

Vienna is fortunate to have both a contemporary library and a preserved structure representing the beginnings of our tradition of inquiry and education. Throughout Vienna's Centennial year of 1990, exhibits of town history and lore will be on display at Patrick Henry, and during November 1990 there will be special tours of the original library and other activities to celebrate the history of Vienna libraries.
