

Three Load Limit On Special Pickups

Beginning March 1, Special Trash Pickups for Town of Vienna residents will be limited to a maximum of three dump truck loads per pickup. The purpose of the new regulation is to make service more equitable for all residents and to prevent abuse of the program.

The Town's Special Pickup program lets residents dispose of unwanted furniture, appliances, building materials, brush and other items not included in the regular trash collection. Each residence is allowed two free Special Pickups per year. Additional pickups cost \$40 per load.

TOWN COUNCIL ACTION

JANUARY 8, 1990

- Following a public hearing, adopted an ordinance requiring burial sites to be located on preliminary subdivision plats.
- Following a public hearing, adopted an ordinance allowing one inoperative motor vehicle to be stored under a car cover.
- Approved the final plat for Staats Subdivision, 340 Glyndon St., N.E. Waived the requirement for storm water management and for the installation of curb, gutter and sidewalk. Funds for these improvements will be placed in escrow.
- Denied a request to waive posting of a bond or letter of credit for the installation of off-site public improvements for Jennie Lynn Subdivision, 402 Glyndon St., S.E.
- Voted to advise the Virginia Department of Transportation that the Town Council has no objection to including proposed changes in the preliminary plan for the Park Street improvement project. However, Council was satisfied with the original plan, and if pro-

posals for additional widening of the street meet with resident opposition at a future public hearing, Council will find the modifications unacceptable.

- Requested the installation of signs at traffic signals on Maple Avenue eastbound at Branch Road and westbound at Beulah Road warning motorists that oncoming traffic does not stop when those lights are red.

JANUARY 9, 1990

- At a special meeting following a work session, appointed Vincent J. Olson to fill the unexpired term of Richard L. Fisher as the Council representative to the Town/Business Liaison Committee.

JANUARY 22, 1990

- Referred to the Planning Commission for a public hearing and recommendation a petition requesting removal from the Windover Heights Historic District of the properties at 125, 129 and 130 Pleasant St., N.W.; 212 and 224 Walnut Lane, N.W.; 222 and 230 Lovers Lane, N.W.; 243 Church St., N.W.; and 210 Lawyers Rd., N.W.

March Is Centennial Schools History Month

The Vienna Centennial Committee has designated March as Schools History Month. Throughout the month, artifacts and memorabilia from 19 Vienna area schools will be exhibited at Town Hall, the Community Center and Patrick Henry Library. In addition, students of these schools, both public and private, will participate in the Centennial by displaying banners with the theme "Vienna: 1890-1990-2090" in local businesses.

An art show featuring works by high school students and models of historical significance by intermediate school students will be held at the Community Center March 20-25. Check with your school to discover what other events have been planned to celebrate Vienna's birthday.

The desire for better schooling was a major factor leading to the incorporation of Vienna as a town. The first mayor, Maj. O.E. Hine, promoted the issue both publicly in support of the Public School Law of 1870 and privately by deeding land for the black Baptist Church and School in 1867. In 1890, there were two schools in town, Vienna Elementary for white children and the black public school attached to the Baptist Church.

The first Vienna Elementary school was built in 1872. This was a two-story, two-room building. Mrs. M.M. Wright, the teacher-principal, earned about \$25 a month teaching pupils aged 5 to 21. Students walked to school or rode the trolley. For lunch, they went home or packed a lunch in a tin bucket. It was a great privilege to fill water buckets from the open spring. About 1896, a second schoolhouse was built on the site and the first schoolhouse moved to Church Street. In 1914, a modern brick structure was the pride of Vienna. Unfortunately, six years later this new "fireproof" building burned. In 1923, the fourth school, which is part of the present building, was opened.

In 1939, to alleviate over-

crowding at Vienna Elementary, Dunn Loring School was built. Freedom Hill School was built in 1949 as a branch of Dunn Loring.

Meanwhile, black children were going to separate schools. In 1922, Louise Archer began a career of 26 years at the "Vienna Colored School" as both teacher and principal. When she died in 1948, the school was renamed Louise Archer Elementary School. This school continued to serve only the black population of Vienna until it was fully integrated in 1965.

Flint Hill and Cedar Lane Elementary Schools opened in the mid-1950's; Marshall Road and Stenwood Elementaries opened in the early 1960's; and Cunningham Park, Westbriar and Wolftrap Schools began operation in the latter part of that decade. Dunn Loring School closed in 1978, and Cedar Lane merged with Cunningham Park in 1981. The Cedar Lane Center began providing instruction in 1983 for high school students in need of special programs to prepare them to enter the world of work.

James Madison High School, which opened in 1959, is one of the three public high schools serving Vienna. George C. Marshall located near Tysons corner opened in 1962 and Oakton High School in 1966.

The two intermediate schools serving Vienna are both named for American writers, Henry David Thoreau and Joyce Kilmer. Thoreau opened in 1960 and Kilmer in 1967. Several years later, part of the Kilmer building was designated as the Kilmer Center for the Multi-

ply Handicapped/Moderately Retarded.

In addition to the name of a public school, the Kilmer family has had further influence on local education in the private sector. Joyce Kilmer's son Kenton and his wife Frances opened Green Hedges School in 1955 on historic Windover Avenue where today it offers programs from preschool through eighth grade.

Another private school, Our Lady of Good Counsel, opened in 1957 for kindergarten through third grade, staffed by the Sisters of Saint Joseph. The school has grown in 30 years to a full K-8 facility.

Vienna schools have experienced tremendous growth and change in the last 100 years, and education will undoubtedly continue to be a top priority for town residents.




