ALUs Provide a New Option for Living Space

ollege students, seniors and others may soon have more affordable living options thanks to a recent zoning-code change approved by the Vienna Town Council at its regular meeting on Monday, Dec. 9, 2024. The change, which took effect on Dec. 30, 2024, enables single-family homeowners to create accessory living units (ALUs) within their home. For example, a homeowner may wish to convert a portion of the basement into a small, apartment-like living space for an aging parent who needs a little family assistance or for a college student who needs an affordable setup while pursuing a degree. The new spaces are limited to a maximum of 800 square feet and must meet additional zoning requirements. Robinson Trust Sidewalk Projects Completed

ienna's longstanding vision for a walkable community is miles closer to reality thanks to a generous legacy bequest left by former Councilmember Maud Robinson. Today, five years after the initiative began, all Robinson Trust sidewalk projects are now complete, providing more than six miles of new walkways, connecting missing links and creating entirely new walkways on well-traveled roads including Courthouse, Lawyers, Beulah and Follin Lane.

"We're very satisfied with how everything has turned out," said project engineer Robert Froh. "These projects aligned with the Town's strategic goals and the Town Council and Town staff were very supportive and helped us get through this process."

Maud Robinson and her late husband, longtime Mayor Charlie Robinson, enjoyed walking around town during their lifetime here. They envisioned a community that provided people of all ages and abilities safe passage through neighborhoods to events, businesses, schools and other locations.

"It's personally rewarding for me to drive around and see so many people using these new sidewalks, safely walking around town," said project manager Alsinia Ervin.

At first, not all residents whose neighborhoods got new sidewalks were in favor of the projects. But Ervin and Froh



worked with each homeowner to explain the work that would take place in the Town right-of-way, address community concerns and replace trees. Ervin says once the sidewalks were in place, even some of the harshest critics became believers.

"We hear stories all of the time about how the sidewalk installations have improved residents' daily lives," Ervin said. "One resident said the sidewalks have helped her get out of her house more, and another said she can now take her son, who has physical challenges, on walks."

Although the Robinson Trust projects are finished, new sidewalk projects are being planned for other parts of town in 2025. American Rescue Plan Act funds will pay for 1.4 miles of new sidewalks, and the Town's capital budget will pay for an additional 1.3 miles. All projects will help lead to the Town of Vienna Comprehensive Plan's long-range goal of having sidewalks on both sides of every street. Temporary Meals Tax Increase Vote Deferred to Jan. 27



or the second time, the Vienna Town Council voted ■ to defer the proposal to temporarily raise the Town's meals tax from 3% to 4% to pay for a new public pool and fitness facility. The move came during its regular meeting on Monday, Dec. 9, 2024, at Vienna Town Hall. The vote was also deferred after a public hearing at the last regular Town Council meeting on Nov. 18.

At issue is the proposal to temporarily raise the meals tax by 1% for a 10-year period to pay for the design and construction of a new aquatics and fitness facility. The center would be located on the former Town Annex site located at 301 Center St., S, which the Town purchased in 2020 from the former Faith Baptist Church. The Town Council deferred its decision on the meals tax proposal to the Jan. 27, 2025, meeting to allow time to gather more information about the proposed facility's long-term operational costs and discuss it at a work session on Jan. 21, 2025, at 7 p.m. in the community room at the Vienna Police Department located at 215 Center St., S, Vienna, Va.

The Town's current 3% meals tax is among the lowest in the region and pays for capital projects such as roads, building improvements and park projects. It applies to prepared, ready-to-consume meals, and does not apply to standard groceries.

A temporary meals tax increase was used once before, from 2002 to 2008 to pay for the Vienna Town Green, which now serves as a central gathering space for public and private events and activities. Now, the Town Council believes a new aquatic and fitness center would further enhance the community's quality of life and fulfill a longstanding community wish. If the temporary 1% meals tax is approved, the facility would be constructed by 2030.


New Online Payment Portal Opens in January

One of my favorite things about Vienna is the coffee and food scene. A day



What's Next for Bambi?

ouncilmember Chuck Anderson's column about deer overpopulation in the September issue

of the Vienna Voice struck a chord with many Vienna residents, including myself. Here's a photo of my aucuba bush after it recently served as an all-night salad bar for three or four deer.



Chuck's column inspired lots of suggestions from residents. In response, the Town Council held a work session on Oct. 7, during which Police Chief Jim Morris explained that the Town does not currently have a deer management program and that the Vienna Town Code generally prohibits the discharge of guns or use of bows and arrows. He also reported that Fairfax County has had a deer management program

since 1998, which primarily uses police sharpshooters to actively hunt and manage deer in many county parks including some surrounding Vienna. This program harvested 773 deer throughout Fairfax County in Fiscal Year 2024, including 63 in parks surrounding the town.

The Town Council authorized Police Chief Morris to contact Fairfax County to schedule deer culling by police sharpshooters in Northside Park and the mulch yard at 442 Beulah Road. On Dec. 2 we learned that the County deer management program approved our request, although their sharpshooters won't start until the Fall of 2025.

I'm hoping for much quicker action, so I intend to press for a Town Code amendment that will allow bow hunting in these same locations. We have heard from bow hunters about how successful the program has been in nearby jurisdictions, both as a means of reducing the deer population and providing fresh meat to programs that provide food for area residents who are experiencing food insecurity.

However, one statistic in Chief Morris' presentation concerned me – the County's FY24 deer management program reported a "nonrecovery" rate of 11%. As I understand it, this means that after the deer are shot, more than one in ten gets away, even though presumably grievously wounded.



For that reason, I want to pursue the concept of setting humane deer traps, which I believe could work in smaller stream parks such as Wildwood Park. These look and function in the same way as small humane animal traps, except large enough to accommodate a deer. When the deer approaches the bait to feed, it steps on a plate that causes the trap door to fall behind it, and it can be quickly and humanely dispatched and then transported to the butcher, and the "nonrecovery" rate goes to zero.

Town Attorney Steve Briglia is working on a set of revisions to the Town Code, and I hope that the Town Council will give final approval to appropriate amendments in a meeting in February.

ith winter weather upon us, snowy and icy roads can make driving hazardous. Here are some key tips to help you stay safe this season:

Prepare Your Car

Before heading out, make sure you have essential items in case you get stranded:

Parks and Rec Program Manager to Retire after 36 Years of Service

f you've ever signed up for a Vienna Parks and Recreation program or attended a Town event, chances are Amy-Jo Hendrix helped coordinate the effort. She started her career as one of two programmers 36 years ago, focusing on developing programs for teens and seniors and supervising evening staff members at the community center. She distinguished herself in the field and rose through the ranks serving as Recreation Program Manager, and for a time

served as interim Director and Community Center Manager.

"I took pride in every program and event we created for the community," Hendrix said as she reflected on more than three decades of service just before retiring in December 2024. "We often worked long hours and on holidays, but in the end, the appreciation of the public made it all worth it."

Over the course of her distinguished career, Hendrix ran classes, camps, special events, Vienna Theatre Company and Vienna Youth Players events, and the Bowman House pottery program. She assisted with two Community Center renovation projects, started the Club Phoenix Teen Center program, and helped to bring pickleball to Vienna in 1988. At one time, she even helped mow and line athletic fields!

The holidays were especially busy as Hendrix helped plan and coordinate holiday programs year-round, including Halloween



parties for kids, Lunch with Santa at the Community Center, and a Stockings for Soldiers event, which won a state award for Best New Special Event from the Virginia Recreation and Parks Society (VRPS) in 2005. And if you ever attended a Town-wide event, such as the Halloween Parade or the 4th of July celebration, you could often see Hendrix in action helping to make sure each activity went off without a hitch.

"One of my favorite memories is from the 4th of July," Hendrix recalled. "We'd be up at 5 a.m. to get ready for the event, and we worked hard to get all the pieces together and enjoyed watching the attendees have a great time."

In addition to her work in Vienna, Hendrix has been an active member of VRPS since 1988. She served in numerous regional and state leadership roles, served as the editor of the organization's statewide parks and recreation magazine for 16 years, and currently serves as a member of the VRPS Foundation board.

As Hendrix begins her next chapter in retirement, she leaves behind an impressive body of work. It's a legacy that will continue to serve the Vienna community for generations to come.

"I will miss the people I worked with every day because they are what made Vienna a great place to work," she said.





A "Hairy" Situation Leads to Lifesaving Campaign

s in years past, Vienna Police officers went "undercover" to take part in #NoShaveNovember to raise awareness about prostate cancer and to generate support for research to find a cure in this year's nationwide Zero Cancer Grow-and-Give campaign.

Police Chief Jim Morris suspended the dress-code rule, relaxing the department's no-beard policy for the entire month of November so officers could participate, and their efforts paid off!

For the fourth year in a row, Town of Vienna Police can claim "victory" over the competition in this year's nationwide Zero Cancer Grow-and-Give campaign. The department raised a total of \$3,439, the most money in the competition for the First Responder category.



Nearly 250,000 men will be diagnosed with prostate cancer in the United States this year alone, and the illness is very treatable if diagnosed early. In addition to raising awareness and funding research to find a cure, the Zero Cancer organization provides educational materials to men and their families and offers screenings for men who would otherwise be unable to afford them.
