

Water Line Work

For those who have been wondering about the work underway on water lines in the lower Cottage Street area, they are being cleaned and relined as one of the Town's capital improvement projects. The work consists of cleaning and flushing the existing water mains and then relining them to restore flow capacity, eliminate discolored water, extend the life of the pipes and reduce maintenance problems.

While the work is in progress, temporary lines are installed above ground to provide water to homes in the area. The affected streets are Cottage Street between Hickory Circle and Oak Street; Oak, Dogwood, Battle, Elm and Locust Streets between Cottage and Center Streets; Hickory Circle; and Cherry Circle. The project should be completed this month.

NO SPECIAL PICKUPS OCTOBER 26 - DECEMBER 31

Because of fall leaf collection, no special trash pickups will be made between October 26 and December 31. The Public Works Department crews who normally handle Special Pickups will be assigned to leaf collection during that period.

Used Motor Oil Must Be Recycled

Motor oil never wears out, it only gets dirty. When you take used motor oil to an oil collection center, it is shipped to a refinery where the impurities are removed and then marketed as rerefined oil or industrial fuel oil.

The most dangerous result of not recycling occurs when used motor oil is disposed of improperly, polluting water, contaminating soil, and killing plants and animals. After changing the oil in your car, do not pour the used oil down a drain or storm sewer, put it in the trash or dump it in the yard. Pour it into unbreakable, sealable containers and take it to a collection center.

Constitution Week

Mayor Charles Robinson has proclaimed September 17-21 as Constitution Week in the Town of Vienna. During this week, Vienna residents are encouraged to study our U.S. Constitution and reflect on the advantages of American citizenship.

September 17 will mark the 203rd anniversary of the drafting of the Constitution, guardian of American liberties. Rat Control Tips

Thirty complaints about rats in Vienna were investigated by Fairfax County Health Department inspectors over the last year. The majority of rat infestations found resulted from excessive bird feeding.

Birds will often scratch seeds out of a feeder until they find the ones they like. Rats, which tend to be nocturnal in their feeding habits, may find the scattered seed on the ground during late evening, night and early morning hours. If the ground is free of bird seed at these times, rats are less likely to be attracted to the area.

The conscientious practice of bird feeding need not provide a food source for rats. By controlling the amount of seed put into the feeder so that it is empty by early afternoon, the ground-feeding birds may have the scattered seed removed by dusk, thus eliminating the rats' potential food source.

September Is Centennial Transportation Month

On Wednesday, May 30, 1951, the last Washington & Old Dominion Railroad passenger train came through Vienna. The train consisted of one diesel-powered car with a mail section in front and 32 seats for passengers in the rear. It left Rosslyn at 3:27 p.m. with an overload of 65 passengers and 51 sacks of letters. The Post Office had taken away the railroad's mail contract, which supported passenger service, causing the company to terminate the service.

The yellow and black train traveled up to 15 mph to its western destination of Purcellville, 50 miles and two and a half hours away. It made 37 scheduled stops and a number of unscheduled ones. Vienna was station stop #17. Vienna's Bob Ellis and his son Bill, currently Vienna's Volunteer Fire


