Special Pickup News

Fall leaf collection begins November 5. No Special Trash Pickups will be made during November and December because the Public Works Department crews who normally handle Special Pickups will be assigned to leaf collection during that period.

During October, it may take a little longer than usual to receive a Special Pickup. The Public Works Department is resurfacing some streets before winter, and this will reduce the manpower available for Special Pickup crews.

FREE FIREWOOD

Over the last several months, the Town's Special Pickup crews have collected a lot of wood. Rather than paying to dump it at the County landfill, the Town is making the wood available to residents free of charge.

The wood is stored behind the salt dome at the Northside Park property yard, located at the end of Glyndon Street, N.E. Residents may pick up wood Monday through Friday from 7 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. in any amount for as long as it lasts.

The wood is in the form of logs. It is recommended that residents be prepared to split the wood at Northside and then take it home.

JULY 2, 1990

- Authorized an agreement with Metro Recyclers, Inc., to add plastic, cardboard and tin cans to the Town's recycling program.
- Appointed Michael J. Dombrowski to the Board of Architectural Review to fill the unexpired term of Audrey Brown.
- Authorized the competitive sale of \$3.5 million in general obligation public improvement bonds.
- Made the following Town Council appointments for fiscal year 1990-91: Robert B. Dix, Jr., Mayor pro tempore and representative to the Northern Virginia Planning District Commission; Rodger W. Seeman, representative to the Administrative Committee of the Town Employee's Retirement Plan; Martha H. Pruett, liaison to the Fairfax County School Board; George E. Lovelace, representative to the Fairfax County Board of Supervisors; Vincent J. Olson, representative to the Centreville District Citizens Park Advisory Council; Robert W. - Adopted a resolution requesting the Virginia Secretary of Transportation to give the Town full voting powers on the coordinating committee being formed to review the Transportation Plan 2010.

JULY 18, 1990

- Awarded the bid for the 1990 general obligation bonds to Craigie, Inc., at 6.4471% interest.

- Approved Fairfax County's request to construct an asphalt sidewalk on the east side of Park Street between Adahi Road and Moore Avenue. The location and construction of the sidewalk is to be approved by and coordinated with the Director of Public Works. The County School Board will be informed of the Town's concerns and the possible future request of the Town to delete the sidewalk from the County plan, and written confirmation obtained.

- Directed the Town staff to seek a conditional use permit to place recycling containers at the Community Center parking lot.

Town Hall to Recycle Paper

The Town Council recently approved an office paper recycling program at Town Hall. It is estimated that between 43 and 77% of office trash consists of high-grade paper, which can be recovered through recycling. The start-up cost for the program will come from the revenue generated, after which the Town will receive the funds from the sale of the recycled paper.

Buying recycled paper is an important way for individuals and

businesses to stimulate demand for the scrap paper collected from offices and helps the environment in a number of ways. Every ton of recycled paper produced:

- Uses 4,200 kilowatt hours less energy that nonrecycled paper;

- Requires 7,000 fewer gallons of water than nonrecycled paper;

- Eliminates 60 pounds of air pollution effluents that would have been produced if the paper had been manufactured from wood pulp;


- Saves approximately 17 trees; and

- Conserves three cubic yards of landfill capacity.

Even though buying recycled paper obviously makes good environmental sense, many people are unfamiliar with the quality. Does it look as good and perform as well as virgin paper? The answer is <u>yes!</u> Recycled paper comes in almost every kind of grade and color imaginable, from plain white bond or copier paper to colored offset printing paper.






what do you do if your house is on fire? CALL 9 1 1, and the firetrucks rush to your home, hook up to the hydrant and put out the fire. How did people put out fires in 1890? There were few telephones, no hydrants and no fire trucks in our town. Many people lost their homes and their lives in fires.

So in 1903, storekeeper Leon Freeman and some other townspeople set up the Vienna Volunteer Fire Department. They raised \$160 to buy a cart with water. When a fire began, the fireman were called by ringing the bell at a church. The Firefighters ran to Freeman's store to get the cart from under the porch. They pulled the cart to the fire, and put the fire out.

In 1990, we have a modern fire department, with ambulances, on duty 24 hours a day. Our newest fire truck cost more than \$100,000. Most of this money came from donations and money raised by the firefighters and Ladies Auxiliary.

October Is Public Safety Month

This month, the Vienna Centennial Committee salutes the many members, past and present, of the Vienna Police Department and the Vienna Volunteer Fire Department and its Ladies' Auxiliary.

When the first Town Charter was approved on February 28, 1890, it provided for the appointment of a Town Sergeant who would have the authority, jurisdiction and fees of a constable of Fairfax County. The first individual to be appointed to the position is believed to be George Washington Constable, Following him were J.J. Skillman in 1907, J.T. Pettitt in 1924, Russel Waggoner in 1925, W.E. Thompson in 1930, F.M. Fritter in 1931, George Perzel in 1933, John Titus in 1934, Warren R. Bradford in 1936, and James Goldsborough in 1947.

On November 3, 1947, the Town Council approved the purchase of a car to be equipped with a two-way radio for police work. On January 31, 1948, Officer Goldsborough submitted his resignation, and a special meeting of the Council was held to appoint a new Town Sergeant. It was decided that the new officer must live within the corporate limits, would serve

active duty of eight hours a day and be on call 24 hours. Special attention was to be given when children were on the way to and from school.

In 1948, Kenneth M. Carkin was appointed Town Sergeant, and it was under his administration that the Vienna Police Department was organized. The end of World War II brought about a rapid growth in the population and development of the town, and a demand for increased police services.

By 1959 there were 11 fulltime and 5 part-time officers. The Department moved from a space in the Mayor's office to its present location in the basement of Town Hall. It had four vehicles and a dispatcher on duty 24 hours a day. Also organized within the Department were a Detective Bureau and a Traffic Safety Bureau.

Today the Department is staffed by 39 sworn officers and 11 civilian personnel. It is organized into two divisions, Operations and Support Services. The Department has several specialized units, including Traffic, Narcotics, Tactical Services, Community Services, and Criminal Investigations. To main-

tain all departmental records, an automated records system was developed in 1984.

The Vienna Volunteer Fire Department is currently in its 87th year of providing fire and rescue service to the Vienna area. VVFD's Ladies' Auxiliary was organized around 1927 and raises money for the Department through dinners, dances, bingo, bake sales, bazaars and other activities.

No records of the Auxiliary's early years exist; however, some of the original members recall that the group donated \$500 toward construction of the first fire station in 1929. In 1989 and 1990, the Auxiliary contributed \$75,000 to the Fire Department for the new Med Unit, which is now in service.

The Auxiliary has been called out on emergencies such as house fires and plane crashes, and provided support the night the Filene Center at Wolf Trap burned. The Auxiliary has also served lunch to the volunteers while they trained in fighting fires and is prepared to assist whenever they can be useful.
