Recycling Program Expands

The glass collection dumpster in the Park Street parking lot of the Community Center now has three companions - dumpsters for plastic, cans and cardboard. As with glass, the Town will realize no revenue from the deposited items; however, the savings in landfill costs will be substantial.

This recycling center is open seven days a week, 24 hours a day. Parking spaces close to the dumpsters have been reserved for recyclers. Already there is heavy use of the facility. Our goal is to have every household in town participating in this voluntary program.

These rules should be followed by recyclers:

*Glass - Accepted are soda, beer, ketchup, wine and liquor bottles, and juice and food containers. All glass containers should be rinsed clean, lids and caps removed as well as rings left by twist-off tops. Easily removed labels can be taken off. These glass containers should be separated by color into their designated bins.

*Metal cans - Aluminum beverage and tin food cans. All should be rinsed thoroughly and the labels removed. Also clean aluminum foil and aluminum bakery containers and freezer dishes that have been thoroughly cleaned.

Aluminum cans may still be deposited at the Town's aluminum recycling center on the Mobil station property next to McDonald's. The aluminum is collected by the Northern Virginia Training Academy and provides a source of work and also income to help with the funding of the Academy.

*Cardboard - Corrugated cardboard boxes of all sizes, brown bags and boxboard such as cereal, cake mix and gift boxes. Remove plastic, waxed or laminated linings.

Waxed and plastic-treated boxes are not acceptable.

*Plastic - Milk jugs, twoliter soda bottles, plastic liquor bottles, laundry detergent and other household cleaner bottles rinsed well and flattened. These containers are labeled on the bottom with the recycling symbol with a 1 or 2 inside and "PETE/PET" under the 1 and "HDPE" under the 2. Vegeta-

ble oil plastic bottles are labeled in the same way but are not accep-

table because the oil cannot all be washed out.

Clean plastic grocery bags can be deposited in the labeled receptacles inside the Maple Avenue Safeway Store.

Containers are not the only things that should be recycled. Household furnishings and clothing you no longer want will be welcomed by a number of groups; CHO, Goodwill and the Salvation Army will see that more use is gotten from them.

Grass clippings and leaves are a valuable source of mulch for your shrubs and trees or for the enrichment of the soil itself.

Brush and tree limbs collected by the Town are chipped, stored and delivered free to town residents during a short period in the winter. At other times, citizens can get leaf and chip mulch by calling the Public Works Department for information.

Used motor oil should be taken to the Town property yard on Nutley Street for proper disposal. Dates shown on the Town Calendar are the first Saturdays in March, June, September and December.

The next waste oil disposal day is coming up on December 1.

If we want to have markets for our used materials, we need to help create a market for products made from recycled materials. Purchase recycled paper products and products packaged in containers made from recycled materials. Those containers carry statements to that effect and display the recycling symbol.

The success of Vienna's recycling programs depends on citizen participation, so recycle and use recycled products.



November Is Library History Month

The Town of Vienna's Centennial celebration continues with Library History Month during November.

Members of the Patrick Henry Library staff and volunteers, some in turn-of-the-century costumes, will hold open house each Sunday in November from 1 to 5 p.m. at the town's first library building, now located on the grounds of the Freeman House, 131 Church St., N.E.

In addition to hearing the history of library services in Vienna, visitors can see the books and furniture as they were in the small frame building before it was moved from the corner of Maple Avenue and Center Street, where the Patrick Henry branch of the Fairfax County Library now stands.

Why does Vienna have a street named Library Lane, and why is it a half mile from the library? This street, next to the Jades Shopping Center on Maple Avenue, marks the original site of the Vienna Town Library, built in 1897. The small, square frame building was administered by the Vienna Library Association and staffed by volunteers one or two afternoons a week

In 1913, this building was moved to a more convenient location at the corner of Maple Avenue and Center Street, on land given to the community by Charles Delano Hine. The building remained there until 1970, when it was moved to the Freeman House grounds at Church and Mill Streets.

Vienna's second library location, at 325 Maple Ave., E., in the Maple Avenue Shopping Center, opened in April 1962. This 2,065-square foot facility was Vienna's first branch of the Fairfax County Public Library, and was the culmination of efforts by the Vienna chapter of the Fairfax County Human Relations Council and the Vienna Friends of the Library. These groups worked for a full-time, full-service library open to all residents, black and white. The Friends' fund-raising drive col-

lected \$8,800, enough to pay the branch's first year of rent and utilities. The library was named in honor of Patrick Henry, following the library system's tradition of naming branches for famous Virginians.

Patrick Henry opened on September 7,1971, on the Maple Avenue site vacated when the original library was moved. The 11,000-square foot building is one of the busiest libraries in the county, circulating over 560,000 items in fiscal year 1990.

Patrick Henry Library has scheduled two events to celebrate Vienna Centennial Library History Month. These events are free, but registration is required. Visit the library, or call 938-0405.

Spend an old-fashioned evening at the library with Connie and Mayo Stuntz on Thursday, November 8, beginning at 7:30 p.m. The authors of This Was Vienna, Virginia will join guests in a pie supper and an informal game of "authors," both popular activities in the 1890's.

Fourth, fifth and sixth graders are invited to try their luck with words used at the turn of the

century in the library's Centennial Spelling Bee at 2 p.m. Sunday, November 11. Participants are encouraged to bring family and friends to cheer them on. There will be treats for everyone after Mrs. Charles Robinson awards prizes to the top spellers.
