Vienna Town Council to Vote on FY26 Budget

fter a months-long process involving Town staff meetings, Council work sessions, and public hearings, the Vienna Town Council is expected to vote on the Town budget, real estate tax rate, and water and sewer rates for fiscal year 2026. The vote to adopt the budget, tax rate and water and sewer rates is scheduled to take place at the Council's regular meeting on Monday, May 19 at 7:30 p.m. at Vienna Town Hall. The adopted \$55.5-million balanced budget reflects a modest 3.2 percent increase over the current year's budget to manage inflationary pressures. It also:

- Maintains the property tax rate at 19.5 cents per \$100 of assessed value.
- Addresses operating cost increases, mainly through tax revenue related to increases in assessed property value of existing structures and new construction.
- Funds compensation increases for eligible employees.



If adopted in its current form, the FY26 Town budget will reflect a plan that has either had no change or a reduction in Vienna's property tax rate for the 13th consecutive year. The FY26 Town budget takes effect July 1, 2025. The adopted budget will be posted online at www.viennava.gov/budget.

Where Do Your Tax Dollars Go?


s a Town of Vienna resident, you may wonder how your tax dollars are invested in the community. Unlike many neighboring areas that rely solely on county or contracted services, Vienna provides its own municipal services to better meet the needs of the residents, timely service delivery, and a strong sense of community.

Your Town tax dollars pay for Public Works Department services such as trash, recycling and yard waste collection. The funding also pays for street, sidewalk and other public property maintenance as well as snow removal and leaf and brush collection - services that many county residents do not receive or obtain only by hiring private contractors.

Town tax dollars also support the Vienna Police Department, which provides dedicated law enforcement services, community outreach programs, and timely emergency response. This helps ensure that Vienna remains one of the safest communities in the region.

In addition to essential services, Vienna's investment in parks and recreation enhances the quality of life for all residents. The Town maintains parks, trails, and recreational facilities, and offers a wide variety of recreational programs and events for all ages.

Vienna residents also pay taxes to Fairfax County. This money is used to provide services that the Town does not provide, such as public health, public library, public school and fire department services. The County also backs up the police department in



situations that require specialized tactical responses that the Town police department is not equipped to handle.

So Long Patrick Henry Library

fter decades of service to the Vienna community, the Patrick Henry Library will close forever on Friday, May 9, 2025, to make way for construction of the new Vienna-Carter Library. The Patrick Henry branch of the Fairfax County library system first operated as a storefront in the Giant Shopping Center in 1962. The branch at the current location, 1101 Maple Ave., E, opened in 1971. Some existing library resources will be moved to the Patrick Henry Temporary Library (PHTL), in the Cedar Park Shopping Center, which is expected to open to the public in June. Service before Self

y family and I were transfixed by the adventures of astronauts Butch Wilmore and Suni Williams in space over the past nine months. Their planned

eight-day trip to the International Space Station lasted 286 days due to several unexpected technical issues with their spacecraft. When they gave their first interview after returning to Earth on March 31, 2025, Butch Wilmore's reaction to the challenge focused on the mission and not himself or his feelings, asking, "What does our nation need out of me right now?" Suni Williams said, "My first thought was we've just got to pivot...Let's make the best of it...What can we do to help?" I was greatly moved by their selfless attitude and "service first before self" responses.

I wondered how our leaders in Vienna would respond to unexpected challenges. I asked a cross section of our leaders two questions: 1) What are you thankful for? 2) What gives you the greatest satisfaction? Their answers give us insight on whether they are focused on themselves or on serving others. No names are given, but a composite of their responses is shown below.

What are you thankful for?

Four themes emerged. 1) Faith and knowing

life is a gift. 2) Family, friends, good health, and community. 3) The opportunity to serve others while working with a great team in a supportive environment. 4) The Town of Vienna.



What gives you the greatest satisfaction?

Similarly, four themes emerged. 1) Serving people and helping them be the best they can be. 2) Doing a job well with a very dedicated and committed team. 3) Seeing what I do is making a difference 4) Good relationships, healthy families, and children growing up to be good adults.

Their responses indicate a focus on serving, and their responses are validated by the results of the 2023 Townwide Survey of residents, which rated Vienna highly for service. Let us be thankful for this attitude of "service before self" among our elected and appointed leaders, staff, volunteers and community groups who so willingly contribute their time and talents to the Vienna community. Their service contributes greatly

to the exceptional quality of life we enjoy here in Vienna. Let us all express our thanks by getting involved ourselves to serve others. **V**



Vienna Police Captain Attains Leadership Distinction



dd another Vienna police officer to the ranks of those who have graduated from the FBI National Academy in Quantico, Virginia. Captain Patrick Kiley completed the rigorous 11-week course in advanced leadership classes, communication courses and fitness challenges on March 13, 2025, alongside other law

enforcement officers from all over the world.

The FBI National Academy develops and enhances future law enforcement leaders through training sessions led by experienced FBI instructors, special agents, and professional support teams. It is internationally recognized for its academic excellence. Candidates must demonstrate a proven record as public safety professionals to even be considered for selection into the elite program.

Nearly 56,000 public safety professionals have graduated from the academy since it began in 1935. Other Vienna police officers who are FBI Academy graduates are Chief Jim Morris, Deputy Chief Dan Janickey and Captain Tu Farhan.





ere's something that rarely happens in the Town of Vienna – police officers kicking in doors and entering a home with guns drawn. This recent situation on Tapawingo Road was no cause for alarm, because it was a police training exercise at a home scheduled for demolition. After purchasing the property, the builder, JDA Custom Homes, allowed police to use the vacant house for training purposes for two days, enabling officers to simulate real-life scenarios and gain hands-on experience in a real-world setting. So, the only "takedown" that took place here, was the old home to make way for new once the training was over.



Build Responsibly!

S pring is a great time for home improvement projects, and many projects require a permit, especially if they're near a flood zone. Be sure to get a building permit before you build in or near a flood hazard area including additions, decks, gazebos, sheds, or other accessory buildings. For a Lush Lawn, Go Easy on Fertilizer

hen it comes to using fertilizer, you can obtain the yard you've always wanted and help keep the chemicals from washing into storm drains that lead to local drinking water sources. Follow these simple tips to protect the environment and create a healthy lawn that's less susceptible to weeds and disease:

- Apply the correct amount of fertilizer only when needed.
- Use fertilizer at the right time of year.
- Leave your mowed grass clippings on the lawn. They can cut down on your need for fertilizer.
- If you need to fertilize early, limit it to a light feeding (half pound of 10-10-10 per 1000 sq. ft.) in May or early June.
- When heavy rain is in the forecast, postpone fertilization to prevent it running off into streams and storm drains.

If you spill fertilizer on sidewalks or driveways, be sure to sweep it up and reuse it later. Doing so will keep it from washing into storm drains that lead to local streams and rivers. \mathbf{V}

Panhandling vs. Soliciting: What's the Difference?

hroughout the greater Vienna area, you're bound to see the signs of panhandling. It could be someone

who approaches you in the parking lot of a grocery store, or someone who asks for a handout while you're waiting for a traffic light to change. Asking for money without offering anything in return is not illegal as it is typically seen as a request for a handout. Police do not have the authority to arrest someone solely for asking for a handout with no service or items offered in exchange.

However, soliciting is a different matter. Soliciting involves asking for money in exchange for goods, services, or promises of future delivery. This activity is illegal in the Town of Vienna unless the person has a valid solicitor's license from the Town. The purpose of this regulation is to ensure that individuals conducting commercial activities are doing so legally and responsibly, without disrupting the peace or safety of our community. If someone is soliciting without the proper license, the Town of Vienna Police Department can take legal action, including arrest. This helps to protect residents from unauthorized or potentially misleading or fraudulent activities.

It's important for everyone to understand the difference between panhandling and soliciting as they apply under local law. Understanding the distinction helps to ensure our town remains safe, organized, and respectful to all residents and visitors.
