



# TOWN COUNCIL ACTION

#### **SEPTEMBER 17, 1990**

- Held an executive session to discuss personnel matters.
- Following a public hearing, adopted amendments to the conditions under which overhead utilities may be repaired, replaced or improved in commercial zones.
- Approved new entrance signs to the town, subject to approval by the Board of Architectural Review. The signs are a gift from the Vienna Centennial Committee and the Vienna (Host) Lions Club
- Approved the revised landscape plan for Vienna Gateway Office Building, 100 East St., S.E.
- Accepted the public improvements for Ekard Associates Subdivision, 600 block of Glyndon Street, S.E. into the Town's maintenance system along with a two-year maintenance bond.
- Adopted amendments to the erosion and siltation control ordinance.
  - Authorized publication

and recording of the delinquent real estate tax list. Liens are to be recorded against properties delinquent for three years.

- Awarded a bid for a portable air compressor to J.W. Burgess, Inc., Gainesville, Va., at a price of \$12,724.15.
- Recommended to the Fairfax County Circuit Court the appointment of Robert M. Curry to the Town's Board of Zoning Appeals for a five-year term.

#### **SEPTEMBER 24, 1990**

- Following a public hearing, increased the fee for special bulk trash pickups to \$50 per load for all loads exceeding the allotted free pickups.
- Amended the historic register ordinance concerning the design of the marker for historic sites.
- Denied a request for a traffic light or three-way stop at Park and Locust Streets. Approved installation of a pedestrian crossing sign at that location and painting bars in the existing crosswalk to

emphasize the crossing. Requested that traffic studies be made at the intersection.

- Voted to write a strong letter of protest to the Fairfax County Public Library administration concerning the proposed closing of Patrick Henry Library for renovation and the proposed interfiling of children's and adult books.

- Approved a site plan modification for Vienna Center, 102-112 Maple Ave., E., to install an elevator, thus reducing the number of parking spaces by two.

# New Special Pickup Rules Take Effect in January

The Town Council has approved a number of changes in the regulations governing Special Trash Pickups. Beginning January 1, each household may request two free Special Pickups per year, with a limit of one dump-truck load per pickup. Additional pickups will be made for a fee of \$50 per load for all items except brush.

The fee for brush will be \$25 for one additional load, \$35 for the second additional load, and \$50 for each load thereafter.

Residents can call the Special Pickup Hotline at 255-5727 to arrange for a Special Pickup. The amounts and type of debris are limited to the following:

- Discarded furniture, swing sets and playground equipment.
  - Sod and brush.
- 300 pounds of scrap metal per pickup, small automobile parts such as engine blocks, transmissions and tires. All tires must be removed from the rim.
- Trees and limbs of a diameter greater than one and a half inches and no longer than eight feet.
- Two major appliances per pickup. Major appliances include stoves, dishwashers, refrigerators, washers, dryers, hot water heaters, air conditioners, and furnaces.
- Building materials: wood, broken concrete, bricks or block, fences, drywall, and paneling. Each residence is limited to 300 pounds of concrete per pickup.

These items will <u>not</u> be picked up:

- Gas tanks;
- Fuel oil tanks;
- Mounted tires;

- Large tree stumps; and
- Paint cans.

Fuel tanks, paints, solvents, insecticides and other hazardous materials can be discarded through the Fairfax County Hazardous Waste Disposal Program. The drop-off center for hazardous waste is the County Fire and Rescue Academy, 4200 W. Ox Rd., the first and third Saturdays of each month from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. (Call 246-2331 first for information and verification of location.)

Large tree stumps can be disposed of at the Fairfax County transfer station on West Ox Road or at the County landfill in Lorton.

Don't discard usable furniture, carpeting and appliances. Donate them to CHO (Committee for Helping Others). Call Herb Entistler at 281-9040 to arrange for a pickup.

### Hearing December 10 On Library Plans

Vienna residents who are concerned about the proposed building renovations and operational changes at Patrick Henry Library are encouraged to attend a public hearing at the Vienna Community Center on Monday, December 10, beginning at 7:30 p.m. Members of the Fairfax County Library Board of Trustees and the Special Community Committee on the Patrick Henry Library will be present to hear citizen comments on plans for the library.

### Recycling Is Quick and Convenient

Now that the recycling center at the Vienna Community Center is available for glass, aluminum and tin cans, plastic and cardboard, all residents are encouraged to participate in the Town's recycling program.

Many people think that recycling is inconvenient or takes too much time, but a study done for the Environmental Protection Agency indicates otherwise. The study showed that the total "social inconvenience" to the average household is 73 minutes per month, less than three minutes a day.

Recycling uses only a small amount of space in a house or an apartment. Storage of recyclable items for a whole month takes only

nine square feet in the garage, closet or corner of the kitchen. To save space, flatten cans, plastic bottles and cardboard boxes. A home can crusher can be purchased as a substitute for "stomping power."

A home "recycling center" can be set up with a sturdy box for each type of item. The trip to the Town's recycling center takes very little time and can be combined with other trips.

A "Guide to Household Recycling," compiled by the Virginia Division of Litter Control and Recycling, includes practical tips for recycling at home. # December Is Buildings History Month

One of the last activities of the Vienna Centennial Committee will be the celebration of "Buildings Month" in December. An exhibit will be held at Patrick Henry Library on Friday, Saturday and Sunday, December 7, 8 and 9, during normal library hours.

Approximately 30 paintings, sketches and photographs of old buildings in the Vienna area will be on display. As several paintings are privately owned, this exhibit will be a rare occasion to see scenes of Vienna by artists in earlier times. In addition, the Vienna Arts Society will include several recent paintings for sale of older homes and buildings.

The display cases at the library, the Vienna Community Center and Town Hall will be filled with old artifacts and memorabilia of town residences and other buildings.

The oldest standing buildings in the Vienna area are Moorefield, built around 1790, and Ash Grove, also c. 1790, though much of Ash Grove was destroyed in a 1960's fire. The Freeman House, 1859, is the oldest building in the Vienna core, with the Vienna Presbyterian Church, 1874, and Bouton Hall, 1894, following. Older residences in the Ayr Hill and Windover Heights Subdivisions date to just before the turn of the century, with the Salsbury house dating perhaps to the 1870's.

Other early buildings include the Wesley Methodist Chapel at 137 Church St., N.W., which is 100 years old this year; the 1897 Vienna Library, now located on Mill Street; and the old First Baptist Church (now the Knights of Columbus hall) next to the Post Office. The present First Baptist Church is a 1915 building that replaced a very early building that was used for both a school and church by the black population.

The Town will soon begin to honor the importance of old buildings as part of Vienna's heritage by marking them with historic site plaques.

Closing ceremonies will also include a slide show of this year's Centennial events, musical entertainment, and light refreshments compliments of Marco Polo Restaurant.
