Liberty Amendments Month Begins

hat better day to launch a month-long celebration of American freedom than Flag Day? This year, the Town of Vienna Liberty Amendments Month celebration begins June 14 - the 248th anniversary of the adoption of the Stars and Stripes as the official flag of the United States of America by the Continental Congress. Several major events along with dozens of other activities for children and adults will be held to celebrate the American way of life and the four Liberty Amendments that granted full citizenship rights to groups who were previously excluded from the U.S. Constitution.

Juneteenth - It all starts with the Juneteenth and Liberty Amendments Month Parade and Festival on Saturday,



June 14 at First Baptist Church. The parade along Maple Avenue from Mill Street to the church on Nutley Street begins at 10 a.m. The

festival at the church runs until 3 p.m. and commemorates the passage of the 13th Amendment. It features family friendly activities, live music, and food trucks.

Restricted Vienna: Documenting the History of Racial Covenants -Learn about the history of housing discrimination and the role that racial covenants played in the Town of Vienna and in Fairfax County in this lecture and workshop on Wednesday, June 18 from 6:30-8:30 p.m. at the Vienna Community Center. The event will be led by Dr. Krystyn Moon, professor of history and American studies at Mary Washington University. Georgia Brown from the Fairfax County Circuit Courts Historic Records Section will share information about how to research local land records in the historic court archives.

Naturalization Ceremony - Witness this inspiring ceremony in which 15 foreign-born community members will take the Oath of Allegiance to become



U.S. citizens and be granted full citizenship rights under the law. The U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Services Naturalization

Ceremony will take place on Saturday, June 21 at 5 p.m. in the Seeman Auditorium at the Vienna Community Center. Live music and entertainment will begin at 3:30 p.m.

Independence Day - Yeonas Park is the place to be for the Town of Vienna's official commemoration of Independence Day and Liberty Amendments Month. The fun begins at 6 p.m. on Wednesday, July 2 and features family friendly entertainment including live music, food vendors, and a 9:30 p.m. fireworks display. **VA250 Mobile Museum -** The month closes out with an exhibit of the VA250 Mobile Museum, July 10-12 at Vienna Elementary School. This interactive exhibit serves to commemorate the 250th anniversary of the American Revolution, the Revolutionary War and United States Independence as it relates to the Commonwealth of Virginia, its founding ideals and its leading figures.

About the Liberty Amendments -The Liberty Amendments are the 13th, 14th, 15th, and 19th Amendments to the U.S. Constitution. The 13th Amendment abolished slavery and involuntary servitude in the United States. The 14th Amendment sets out the definitions



and rights of U.S. citizenship, and confirmed the right to due process, life, liberty, and property. The 15th Amendment prohibited governments from denying U.S. citizens the right to vote based on race, color, or past

servitude. The 19th Amendment granted women the right to vote.

Town Joins NOVA Parks on Visitor Center Proposal

hat started as an Arbor Day commemoration on the Town Green ended with a surprise announcement that the Town is teaming up with NOVA Parks to explore creating a visitor center along the W&OD Trail in Vienna. The announcement came during a joint news conference on April 25 followed by an Arbor Day planting of seven new redbud trees near the trail just behind the Freeman Store and Museum.

"The goal of the W&OD Trail Visitor Center is to create a sense of identity for this large, regional trail, offer services to trail users, and share the story of the trail's inspiring history," said Paul Gilbert, Executive Director of NOVA Parks. "We believe this location is ideal for trail users to meet, learn, and explore."

The Town of Vienna is at the heart of the 45-mile W&OD Trail. The proposed visitor center represents an opportunity to encourage the trail's 3 million annual users to stop, shop and dine in Vienna.



The vision includes exploring the use of 125 Church Street, an obsolete office building with no existing tenants near the Town Green as the visitor center location. The project also includes purchasing an historic bank building across the street on Dominion Road for future Town use, further integrating the trail into the neighboring historic and commercial districts and establishing separate pedestrian and cycling lanes for safety along Vienna's portion of the trail.

"Thanks to our collective effort with NOVA Parks and Congressman Gerry

Connelly, we have an opportunity to explore the transformative potential of this partnership to create something very special here in the heart of Vienna," said Vienna Mayor Linda Colbert. "The visioning process is just beginning, and if the feasibility study supports the project, the transformation will lead to a monumental boost for the local economy."

"I was proud to secure \$1 million in federal funding in FY24 to help bring this vision of a W&OD Trail visitor center to life," said U.S. Rep. Gerry Connolly. "We celebrated the 50th Anniversary of the W&OD Trail this past year, and I'm excited to see how this project will help shape the next 50 years for the trail."

The process will begin with environmental and structural assessments. It will also include a robust community engagement effort over the next two years that will inform decisions made by NOVA Parks and the Vienna Town Council.



Walk and Roll Memories

Bikers Abandon Vehicles for Bike to Work Day

ired of gridlock getting to work? Try pedal power! Dozens did just that on May 15 for "Bike to Work Day 2025" and enjoyed a quicker commute to D.C. by bike than by car, even with a pit stop for snacks at the Town Green, hosted by the Town's Bicycle Advisory Committee. The annual, regional event is sponsored by the Metropolitan Washington Council of Governments and the Washington Area Bicyclists Association (WABA) to encourage people to leave their cars at home and try cycling to work.





Traffic Signal Upgrades Near Completion

B y early this fall, the long-awaited traffic signal upgrades along Nutley Street and Maple Avenue will be complete. The work to improve 14 traffic signals along the Town's major roadways to modern-day standards was hampered at first by a lengthy construction administrative process, and a recent natural disaster also took its toll on the project, which was expected to be complete in May 2025.

"We experienced supply-chain equipment delays due to Hurricane Helene, which caused widespread damage in communities across the Southeastern United States last September," said Town transportation engineer Andrew Jinks. "The signaling equipment that was supposed to come to Vienna to replace our existing signals was redirected to communities whose traffic signals were destroyed by the hurricane."

The technology currently used for the town's main arteries was state-of-the-art when it was installed in the late 1990s, but the system was not designed to accommodate the volume of traffic that passes through Vienna today, and motorists sometimes grow frustrated by signal delays. Jinks says the signals at the intersection of Nutley Street and Tapawingo Road and the intersection of Follin Lane and Maple Avenue required full replacement, which was largely completed in May. The remaining traffic signals require only equipment upgrades.

Pedestrians will notice another improvement to the intersection at Maple Avenue and Follin Lane. That intersection now has pedestrian crossing signals to help ensure pedestrian safety as they move through the crosswalk.



Crossing into Safer Streets

The intersections of Maple Avenue and East Street and Maple Avenue and Lawyers Road, NW/Courthouse Road, SW, are undergoing summer improvement projects for safety. The existing brick paver crosswalks are deteriorating and present poor roadway conditions for motorists and potential trip hazards for pedestrians. The Town's contractor is replacing the brick walkways with asphalt pavement featuring a stamped brick basketweave pattern like the one at Mill and Church streets that looks like traditional brick crosswalks. The construction will require lane closures and detours, but residents will hardly notice because the work will take place from 9 p.m. to 6 a.m., Monday through Friday, when most people are home or asleep. All lanes are expected to be open at all other times with some short exceptions for asphalt paving and pavement markings.

The project also includes ADA-compliant curb ramps leading to each crossing and traffic markings. The \$739,100 project is being funded by federal American Rescue Plan Act funds. The crosswalk replacements are expected to be complete by the end of July, weather permitting. **V**

Vienna Restaurant Week Serves Up Success

ienna Restaurant Week, March 7-16, 2025, dished out more than just delicious meals; it delivered a significant boost to 45 participating eateries and the Town of Vienna as a whole. Participating restaurants reported an increase in sales, and the resulting meals tax revenue generated by those businesses increased by 27.6 percent over the meals tax revenue generated from last year's restaurant week promotion.

"It definitely brought customers into the store," wrote one participating business owner in a post-restaurant-week survey. "Typically, right after Valentine's Day, it is slower, so this helps."

"We had an influencer visit our store, and that was a huge help," wrote another restaurant week participant.

When asked about restaurant-week successes, a third participant wrote, "...more first-time customers, especially our lunch menu which people liked a lot."

Restaurant Week is organized by the Town's Economic Development Department to encourage diners in the region to explore the diverse culinary options Vienna has to offer. The department promotes the event through a massive, multi-platform marketing campaign designed to raise awareness about the Town of Vienna as a destination



for dining. The result was an economic boost to local businesses and the local economy in a month that is typically slower for restaurants. It also increased awareness of and renewed appreciation for the tastes of the world that await just moments from home. Be Aware: Foreign Threats Target U.S. Government Employees with Fake Job Offers

urrent and former U.S. government employees are increasingly being targeted by foreign intelligence operatives using deceptive and sophisticated tactics. These actors often pose as representatives from legitimate consulting firms, think tanks, corporate headhunters, or networking platforms. Their goal is to lure individuals with what appear to be attractive job opportunities, only to exploit personal or professional information for intelligence-gathering purposes.

These approaches have grown more refined, often mimicking real organizations and using professional language to appear credible. Initial contact may occur through email, LinkedIn, or other online platforms, and may be followed by virtual interviews or requests for resumes and background details. In some cases, these interactions evolve into requests for sensitive information under the guise of employment screening or project work.

As a member of the law enforcement community, I urge everyone to remain vigilant, especially those with past or present access to classified or sensitive information. Carefully vet unsolicited job offers and professional inquiries, and report any suspicious outreach to your agency's security office or the FBI at 202-324-3000 or online www.ic3.gov. **V**

Town Council Passes FY2025-26 Budget

fter a robust process, the Vienna Town Council approved the budget for the coming fiscal year during its May 19 meeting at Town Hall. The \$55.5 million budget reflects no change in the property tax rate of \$0.195 per \$100 of assessed value. While the tax rate was held steady, annual tax bills will go up an average of \$155 due to an increase in property assessments.

The budget also includes a 7.25 percent increase in both water and sewer rates to address rising wholesale water and pipe replacement costs, modest salary increases for eligible employees to ensure the Town remains competitive in the hiring sector, and a workforce reduction of one part-time position. The Town Council also voted to budget \$200,000 for future Annex property needs.

Home Protection Suggestions

ike a good movie that should be watched again, I want to update an article that I did several years ago for the Vienna Voice that residents told me they found very useful. The article focused on two important ways homeowners and renters can protect against electrical surges, storms, sewer and water pipeline breaks and/or leaks.

Install a whole-home electrical surge protector. This relatively inexpensive device provides critical one-time protection from electrical surge damage due to storm and electrical power issues that could result in major damage or destruction to residential electrical equipment. The device should be installed in the electrical service panel by a professional electrician. Once it stops a surge, it must be replaced.

However, the installation will ensure considerable savings in terms of preventing damage and avoiding costly appliance replacement costs and should protect against the risk of losing all your home appliances.

Check your insurance coverage for underground sewer and water line breaks. Coverage is available through homeowner or renter insurance policies for sewer line breaks or backups. Another option I have recommended in the past and that many long-time residents have is special coverage that Dominion Energy (electrical utility) offers thru HomeService Insurance at an affordable rate and as a add



on to your monthly electric bill. Over the years I have seen this coverage proven to be very useful to neighbors when sewer and/or water lines break or leak. Without any coverage, sewer and water line replacement on private property can exceed \$20,000 and is not a Town responsibility. No matter what you choose, the key is to have insurance or other coverage for these occurrences which are not predictable, can depend on the age of the sewer and water lines, and can occur with no warning.

Warmer Weather Calls for Water Conservation

he U.S. population has doubled in the last 50 years, and water usage has tripled! During warm-weather months, water usage goes up, which is why it is especially important to use water wisely. Conserving water saves homeowners money on utility bills and reduces community expenses for water and wastewater treatment. It also reduces the cost of energy needed to heat and pump water, and it keeps the environment healthy by reducing the need to divert water from rivers, bays, and other water bodies.

Most household water usage comes from bathroom and kitchen fixtures, washing machines, and pipe leaks. Here are some simple things you can do to ensure you are using water wisely:



- Monitor your water consumption on your monthly bill. If it increases, check for leaks. Toilet leaks are the most common household leak.
- Purchase high-efficiency appliances and low-flow showerheads.
- Consider adding mulch to flower beds to make irrigation more efficient, learn about the "cycle-and-soak" irrigation method, and purchase native, climate-appropriate plants.
- Use a dishwasher rather than wash dishes by hand and run the dishwasher only when it is fully loaded.
- Take showers rather than baths. A 10-minute shower uses 25 gallons of water, compared to 35-50 gallons for a bath.
