



NEW REGULATIONS EFFECTIVE APRIL 1

Brush Must Be Separated for Recycling

Beginning April 1, Town of Vienna residents will be required to separate brush from household trash. The brush will be picked up on the second trash collection day each week and recycled into wood mulch.

This revision to the Town trash regulations is the result of the recent prohibition of brush at the Fairfax County landfill. The County estimates that brush, leaves and grass clippings constitute about 23% of landfill materials. The ban on brush should eliminate one quarter - or 50,000 tons - of this "yard debris."

Do You Know Flag Etiquette?

With so many citizens flying the Stars and Stripes in honor of U.S. troops overseas, it is important to understand flag "etiquette." The display and care of our national flag is governed by law to ensure that it will be treated with respect.

The flag should be displayed daily from sunrise to sunset on buildings and on outdoor flag poles. It should not be displayed when the weather is inclement nor at night unless lighted.

The flag should never be allowed to touch anything beneath it and should be stored so that it is not damaged or soiled. When a flag is so worn or soiled that it is no longer suitable for display, it should be destroyed in a dignified manner, preferably by burning. (Vienna's American Legion Post 180 accepts flags for disposal.)

Unless flown from a staff, the flag should be displayed flat or in such a manner that its folds fall free. When hanging against a wall with the stripes in either a horizontal or vertical position, the flag should always have the stars in the upper left-hand corner.



The tape may be borrowed from the Freeman House during regular weekend operating hours.



Composting is an easy, inexpensive way to conserve valuable landfill space. Backyard composting can be as simple as putting all vegetative waste into a shallow depression in the ground or as complex as building or purchasing a composting bin.

Composting is a natural process that converts organic kitchen, garden and yard waste into a usable soil supplement. Properly made compost benefits the soil by adding nutrients, improving texture, suppressing weeds and decreasing soil erosion. Anyone with a lawn, trees, shrubs or even planter boxes has a use for compost.

The seminars will teach how to develop and manage a backyard compost pile. For participants' convenience, samples of commercial composting bins will be on display.

Attendance is limited, so register early by calling the Department of Extension and Continuing Education at 246-5326. For information about composting, call the County Waste Reduction and Recycling Program at 246-5052 and request a free backyard composting package, including instructions for building your own compost bin.

*Make more room at the recycling center! Flatten those cardboard boxes and aluminum cans.

*In addition to plastic grocery bags, Safeway and Giant food stores will now accept for recycling the clear plastic bags in which some newspapers and magazines are delivered.

*Litter along the streets, in residential neighborhoods as well as in commercial areas, is an eyesore that spoils Vienna's beauty. To help keep the problem under control, citizens are asked to pick up litter around their homes and businesses.

*Vienna's original aluminum recycling center next to the Mobil station on West Maple Avenue is still open. You may deposit clean aluminum foil and frozen food containers at this location as well as aluminum cans. (Cans only are accepted at the Community Center recycling facility.) The aluminum is collected by the Northern Virginia Training Center, which uses the profits to help support its programs for the mentally retarded.

*When placing items at the curbside for a Special Pickup, please separate brush, appliances, building materials, etc. from each other. This makes it easier for pickup crews to salvage recyclable items, reducing the amount of debris taken to the landfill.

White Paper Recycling Info

A Church Street resident writes:

Thanks to whomever was instrumental in getting the recycling containers at the Community Center.

Since you now have me recycling glass, plastic, cans and cardboard, plus the regular pick-up of newspapers, please tell me where I can recycle white paper. I can come up with one or two grocery bags full each month, depending on what "junk" I get in the mail. It is a shame to throw it out, but where can I put it for recycling?

Currently, there is no place in Vienna where individuals can recycle white paper, although some offices, including those at Town Hall, have begun their own programs.

You may take white paper to the Metro Recyclers drop-off site located at 2801 Dorr Ave. in Merrifield seven days a week, 24 hours a day. Metro Recyclers is the independent commercial recycling company that maintains Vienna's recycling containers at the Community Center.

Recyclable white paper includes bond, letterhead and copier paper; computer printouts; and index cards. Colored ink on white paper is acceptable.

Colored and glossy, coated paper; envelopes; and NCR paper (paper with carbonless copies) are not acceptable.

FREE TAX HELP

Vienna residents who are aged 60 and over, disabled or do not speak English can receive free assistance with their income tax returns. IRS-trained volunteers are available at the Vienna Community Center on Tuesdays, Thursdays and Saturdays from 9 a.m. to 12 noon through April 13 (except March 2).

Rabies Clinic

A low-cost rabies vaccination clinic for dogs and cats will be held on Sunday, March 10, from noon to 2 p.m. at the Fairfax County Animal Shelter, 4500 W. Ox Rd. The clinic is a cooperative effort of the Northern Virginia Veterinary Medical Association and the Fairfax County Department of Animal Control.

Vaccine given to dogs and cats over one year old provides protection from rabies for three years. The charge for this vaccine is \$6. Vaccine given to all dogs and cats under a year old provides protection from rabies for one year and costs \$4. Puppies and kittens should be at least three months old to receive vaccine.

When animals are brought to the clinic, dogs must be restrained by a leash and cats confined to a cat-carrier or other container.

All dogs and cats over four months old are required to be vaccinated against rabies. Certificates of inoculation will be issued to animal owners at the clinic to verify each vaccination.


