

Brush Must Now Be Separated

REMINDER - Beginning April 1. Town of Vienna residents are required to separate brush from household trash. The brush will be picked up on the second trash collection day each week and recycled into wood mulch.

This revision to the Town trash regulations is the result of the recent prohibition of brush at the Fairfax County landfill.

Tree trimmings, bushes and other brush must be free of grass clippings, leaves and all other debris and tied securely in bundles no longer than four feet. Small twigs that cannot be easily bundled may be placed in a separate container. Brush that is left lying loose will not be picked up.

Brush will be collected each Thursday for residents on the Monday/Thursday trash collection route, Friday for the Tuesday/Friday route, and Saturday for the Wednesday/Saturday route.

Good news! There is plenty of parking available at the Vienna Metrorail station since the opening of a new parking structure next to the station last October.

Completion of the 1,874-space parking structure more than doubled the number of parking spaces. This, coupled with a big increase in bus ridership to the station, has freed up 500 to 750 parking spaces per day, according to the Fairfax County Office of Transportation.

TAP Offers Help to Renters

The Tenant Assistance Program (TAP) is a new rental assistance program recently established by the Fairfax County Board of Supervisors, and qualified Town of Vienna residents of low and moderate income are eligible to apply.

To qualify for the program, a renter must be:

• the head of a household with one or more dependents under age 18 or

55 years of age or older or
disabled/handicapped or

• families receiving Aid for Dependent Children (ADC), if the head of the household is working an average of 80 hours per month or enrolled in and scheduled to complete within four months an approved job training program that leads to employment.

Maximum gross annual income for a family of four must not exceed \$26,800. (Maximum eligible income varies with family size.) In addition, net assets must be less than \$35,000.

TAP participants will be picked by random computer selection, similar to a lottery, and will generally pay between 25 and 35% of their gross income

for rent, if their rent is below the program's "maximum allowable rent." If the rent is higher that the maximum allowable, then the tenant will be required to pay a larger percentage of his/her income for rent.

The TAP program begins April 15, and applications will be accepted through May 31. Applications and information brochures will be available at Town Hall beginning April 15, or call the Public Information Office at 255-6330.



During this time, she held solo shows at the County Office of Economic Development and the Judicial Center. Several paintings from these shows can now be seen at the library.
