

Certain Park Areas Off Limits to Dogs

The Vienna Parks and Recreation Department has posted signs in several Town parks prohibiting pets from athletic fields and courts, playgrounds, and picnic areas. This was done because of the number of people allowing their dogs to defecate in these areas, creating a nuisance and a potential health hazard to park users.

The Director of Parks and Recreation is authorized to take this action under Chapter 20, Article 5, Section 19 of the Town Code.

People are still permitted to walk their dogs outside the restricted areas, in the stream valley parks and in undeveloped parks such as Northside, Moorefield and Beulah Road. Dogs are also permitted on the W&OD Trail as long as they are kept on a short leash to prevent them from crossing in front of oncoming bikers or pedestrians.

Public Hearing On Sewer Rate

Prior to its scheduled adoption of the Town budget for fiscal year 1991-92, the Town Council will hold a public hearing on a proposed increase in sewer service charges. The meeting will begin at 8 p.m. in Town Hall.

An increase of 19 cents per 1,000 gallons has been proposed to offset increased sewage treatment costs and keep the fund self-supporting. The average customer (quarterly water consumption of 25,000 gallons) will pay \$4.75 more per quarter, a 4.7% increase.

No change is proposed in the water rate.

The Activities of Daily Living Program is available to any resident of Fairfax County, including the Town of Vienna, who needs help with personal health care. Services are available Monday through Friday from 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Člients may use the program as needed; no minimum or maximum number of visits is required.

There is an hourly slidingscale fee based on the income of the individual served, not the family. Initial nursing assessments, plans of care and ongoing assessments are provided at no cost.

The goal of the program is to help an older person remain at home or to ease the transition from illness back to independence by providing high-quality, low-cost services that meet the needs of individuals and their families.

Dogs Can Suffer When Left in the Car

When you leave your dog in the car on a hot summer day, you could be risking his life.

The inside of a car heats very quickly. On an 85-degree day, for example, the temperature inside your car - with the windows slightly open - will reach 102 degrees in 10 minutes and 120 degrees in 30 minutes. On warmer days it will go even higher.

A dog's normal body temperature is 101.5 to 102.2 degrees. A dog can withstand a body temperature of 107 to 108 degrees for only a very short time before suffering irreparable brain damage -

or even death. The closed car interferes with the dog's normal cooling process, that is, evaporation through panting.

If your dog is overcome by heat exhaustion, you can give immediate first aid by immersing him in cold water until the body temperature is lowered.

Think Before You Get a Pet

Many pets are abandoned because the owners are no longer willing to take care of them. Make sure you can care for a pet for its lifetime *before* you take it home.

Environmentally Safe Lawn Care

Increased environmental awareness has generated concern about the effects on people of pesticides and fertilizers commonly used to promote lawn growth. Children are of particular concern.

According to the Fairfax County Department of Extension and Continuing Education, the need for lawn chemicals can be reduced or eliminated by mowing at the proper height, cutting with a sharp mower blade, fertilizing at the proper time, and using new and improved insect- and disease-resistant grass varieties.

If you use a lawn service company, find out what fertilizers and pesticides are being applied and read the product labels. Your contract should give you the freedom to accept or refuse lawn service applications, and you should ask to be notified of applications before and after they are made.

You may check with the County Department of Consumer Affairs at 359-9161 to see if a lawn service company has had any complaints filed against it and how they were resolved.

More Trees for Fairfax County

Historically, the first machine on site in the development of any new shopping center, new office building, or new subdivision is the bulldozer. Sometimes a few large trees can be saved, but in most cases the land is leveled, defoliated and denuded. Now, however, there appears to be some hope for the future.

FAIRFAX RELEAF, a program of the Fairfax County Tree Commission and the American Forestry Association, is working to achieve the planting of at least 200,000 trees and the reforestation of at least 100 acres of land in Fairfax County this year. FAIR-FAX RELEAF will be asking state agencies to increase seedling giveaways during the next five years, and urging the Virginia Department of Transportation to step up its efforts to restore foliage to land under its control. In addition, the group will solicit the help of developers, businesses and the media to reverse the county's progressive deforestation.

Vienna's Director of Parks and Recreation, Richard Black, is a member of the <u>FAIR-FAX RELEAF</u> Steering Committee, which also includes representatives of virtually all units of local government in Northern Virginia, the Virginia Department of Forestry, local businesses, and the Fairfax County Park Authority.

Even now, in 1991, 90,-000 acres of land in Fairfax County are in forest, but the county has lost 35% of its tree canopy over the last 10 years, primarily to development. The long-term objective of FAIRFAX RELEAF is to maintain the forest cover in Fairfax County at or above its present level, replace dying and diseased trees, and improve the care and maintenance of existing healthy trees. Studies show that for every four trees removed in urban areas, only one is replaced.

The need to reverse this trend toward defoliation is critical. Trees reduce "global warming" by absorbing carbon dioxide, help conserve energy by providing shade and wind breaks, and improve property values and the appearance of our communities. Even small forested areas supply wildlife habitat, watershed protection and noise abatement.

Most Lawn Mower Accidents Are Preventable

Lawn mower accidents cause 62,000 injuries annually in the U.S. Most of these injuries can be prevented by following safety practices while working with lawn mowers.

Here are some tips for a safe lawn maintenance season from your Fairfax County Fire and Rescue Department:

* Never smoke while refueling your mower. Gasoline is very explosive.

* Never refuel a running mower. Wait for your mower to cool down before refueling. Wipe up spills immediately.

* Inspect electric mower cords for damage. Frayed insulation added to a metal mower and damp grass can cause lethal shocks or severe electrical burns.

* Never leave your mower without turning it off. It only takes a second for an unattended mower to cause an accident. * Never reach under a mower while it is running. Disconnect the spark plug or unplug the electric cord before reaching underneath.

* Leave blade sharpening and electric repairs to the professionals.

* Riding mowers have also injured and killed. Never try to mow an area too steep; mowers can roll over, trapping and injuring the operator.

Citizens Asked to Help Control Grass and Weeds

Grass and weeds growing up through cracks in sidewalks and streets detract from Vienna's beauty and can lead to costly concrete and asphalt repairs. The Town government simply does not have the personnel required to maintain these areas as it would like, and so asks citizens to help in controlling grass and weeds around their property.

Vienna the Leader In Recycling Effort

The Town of Vienna is recycling more than any other Northern Virginia jurisdiction, almost 30% of its trash for the month of April. Recyclers deposited 27.26 tons of glass, 21.27 tons of cardboard, 3.47 tons of cans, and 2.85 tons of plastic at the Vienna Community Center facility.

(REMINDER: Whenever possible, flatten cans, boxes and plastic jugs to save space in the

dumpsters.)

In addition, the Public Works Department collected 80.46 tons of newspaper, 16.38 tons of scrap metal, 2.35 tons of tires, and over 127 tons of brush for recycling.

DID YOU KNOW? Every ton of glass or newspaper recycled saves three cubic yards of critically needed landfill space. It's only waste if you don't make the effort to recycle!

You Can Stop "Junk Mail"

Thanks to a town resident for providing the following information from 50 Simple Things You Can Do to Save the Earth:

Almost 4 million tons of "junk mail" are sent to Americans each year, about 44% of which is never even opened.

The average American's annual junk mail requires 1.5 trees to produce. If only 100,000 people stopped their junk mail, it would save 150,000 trees annually. If a million people did this, 1.5 million trees would be saved.

This service promises to reduce your junk mail by about 75% by keeping your name from being sold to large mailing list companies.

Q & A on Brush Regulations

Here are the answers to some frequently asked questions about the Town's new brush collection policy. If you have additional questions, call the Public Works Department at 255-6382 Monday through Friday from 8:15 a.m. to 4:45 p.m.

- Q. What are the new regulations pertaining to the collection of brush?
- A. Fairfax County now requires brush to be separated from all other trash. Since the Town of Vienna uses County facilities for trash disposal, we have modified our regulations to conform with the County's requirements.

The new regulations pertain to small amounts of tree trimmings, bush twigs, and other brush. The brush must now be separated from the regular trash and placed at the curb on Thursday for the Monday-/Thursday route, on Friday for the Tuesday/Friday route, and on Saturday for the Wednesday/Saturday route.

- Q. If I have a small amount of brush, what do I do with it?
- A. Small amounts of brush less than 1 1/2 inches in diameter should be bundled and tied in lengths not to exceed four feet. Brush too small to bundle can be placed in a container.
- Q. What if I place the brush in a bag with grass clippings and/or leaves and place it at the curb?
- A. County regulations specifically require the separation of brush from all other trash; therefore, if it is mixed with other trash, the Town cannot pick up the brush.
- Q. How do I dispose of grass clippings and loose leaves?
- A. You can either start a compost pile, or bag your leaves and grass clippings and place them out with your regular trash. Please keep in mind that all yard waste (except brush) will go into the County landfill.
- Q. I set out my brush on the second collection day and my trash was picked up by the trash crew, but they did not pick up the brush. Why?
- A. A separate truck and crew follow behind the trash crew picking up just brush.
- Q. What do I do if I have a large amount of brush to be picked up?
- A. For large amounts of brush, you can call the Special Pickup Hotline at 255-5727 and leave the required information on the recorder. The Public Works Department will pick up your brush within 10 working days. If the amount of brush exceeds the two free truck loads allotted each year, you will be charged \$25 for the first additional load, \$35 for the second additional load, and \$50 for each additional load thereafter.

Businesses Must Begin Recycling

Effective July 1, recycling will be mandatory for many businesses in Fairfax County, including those in the Town of Vienna.

The recycling plan is being implemented because of the need to conserve rapidly diminishing landfill space and to meet state regulations. Since businesses contribute 55% of the total waste in Fairfax County, recycling goals cannot be met without business sector involvement.

Businesses meeting or exceeding the following thresholds must implement recycling systems:

- * Single businesses generating an annual total waste of 100 tons;
- * Business complexes and institutions generating an annual combined waste of 100 tons; or
- * Office buildings and office complexes having an annual average occupancy of 200 persons.

The building or property owner will be responsible for providing a recycling system encompassing source separation of recyclable material; collection, handling and storage of recyclables; and transportation of recyclables to a recycler.

All businesses, nonprofit institutions and government agencies in Fairfax County are also required to report recycling data annually, even if the business has a voluntary recycling program. To establish exempt status, small businesses that fall below the mandatory thresholds for program development must file an initial report; reporting thereafter is not required.

Where the property owner is required to implement the recycling system, he or she reports on behalf of the individual tenants. Any recycling initiative outside the mandatory system is to be reported by the individual business.

Violation of these state requirements is punishable by fines of up to \$500 per offense, each day counting as a separate offense.
